placed the bundle under the back of his head like a pillow would be used. Ross apparently then touched off the dynamite, on the night of Oct. 18 in a boxcar on a siding near Paul B. Hult Lumber Co. Dillard. The body was discovered the following morning after the car had been moved to the site of the Stebbins Lumber Co. mill nearby. The body was decapitated by the blast.

Only one factor puzzled officers Friday before the case was closed: In a stack of papers collected in the search for identification is a Social Security application filed in Montana in 1937 on which Ross' birthdate is listed as Oct. 4, 1884. A photostat of the application was forwarded to the coroner by the Social Security Administration, Baltimore, Md., after a number found on a withholding statement Ross was carrying was sent to the office. It is possible, it was pointed out, that the year of birth had been recorded erroneously or that Ross had more than one number. The office has about 2,900 Robert Rosses on file.

Doctors Will Probe Welfare Medical Needs

PORTLAND (AP)—A proposal for employing county medical consultants to review requests for welfare medical care was approved Friday by the State Welfare Commission. Mrs. Loa Howard Mason, welfare administrator, was directed to put the plan in effect throughout the state as soon as possible, pending final approval by the State Department of Finance.

Physicians taking part in the program will receive not more than \$10 an hour for their services. No doctor would get more than \$100 per month. Purpose of the plan, proposed by the Marion County Public Welfare Commission, is to keep a further check on medical costs and at the same time insure adequate medical care, the state commission said. The plan has been approved by the Marion-Polk County Medical society and by the committee on charitable medical care of the State Medical Society.

\$2 Monthly Per Residence Recommended For Retiring Of Proposed Sewer Bonds

Sewer service charges recommended to retire a proposed \$1,100,000 bond issue for construction of a new sewer system and treatment plant would start at a base rate of \$2 per residence. This schedule of charges was compiled for both residences and commercial operations after a study by a subcommittee of the Roseburg Citizens' Sanitary Committee. The schedule is based on the amount of water used. It will be recommended to the City Council Monday night. (Also see story Page 1.) If the council approves the schedule and a date for an election, each will probably be made into ordinance forms to be presented at the election as charter amendments. Educated estimates show the collection of such sewer service charges would bring in \$84376 in the first year to cover first year of bond retirement.
