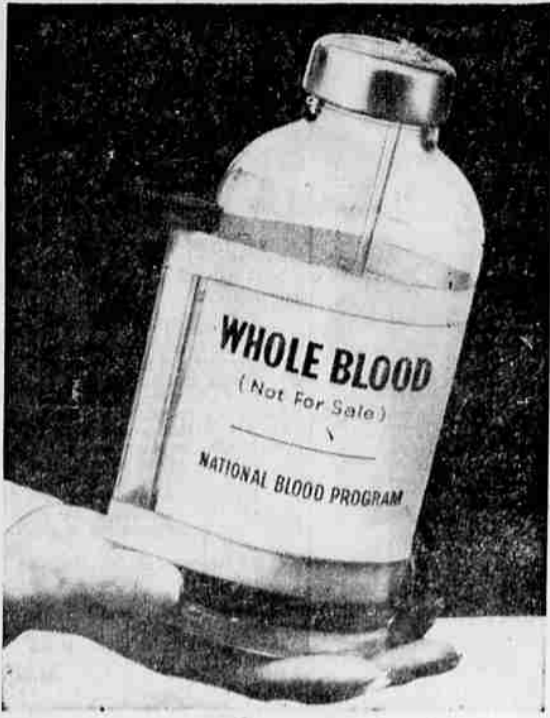


Bloodmobile Will Visit Here On Wednesday, Thursday



The Red Cross bloodmobile will be in Roseburg Wednesday and Thursday in an effort to fill 300 of the above bottles with rich, warm, life-giving blood.

Here is a description of the vital, ruby liquid which may save the life of some relative or friend or even the donor himself. Last year, alone, 1,400 pints of donated blood was used to aid county residents in immediate need.

Mrs. Walter Brittell, blood recruitment chairman for the Red Cross, described blood as a "miracle" in the human system which cannot be manufactured in a laboratory. The only way it can be secured is from the veins of another human.

Briefly, she said, the body contains about a dozen pints like that above. The blood is 55 per cent plasma (water, proteins and minerals) and 45 per cent solids (red or white cells and platelets). It comes in four varieties (O, A, B, and AB).

This "river of life" courses through an estimated 60,000 miles of arteries, veins and little capillaries carrying food, oxygen and water, hormones, chemical regulators, vitamins and enzymes. It also carries off wastes.

These are important enough duties, but still more vital activities are carried on. Blood fights shock, produces antibodies to battle disease.

Three hundred pints of whole blood will help possibly save the lives of 300 people. When converted into its many byproducts, it will aid 1,125 sufferers.

Despite blood's immense importance, Mrs. Brittell points out, an amount to fill the bottle above is painless to give and is easily replaced in a healthy body.

Graveside funeral services are scheduled at 2 p.m. Wednesday at the IOOF Cemetery at Myrtle Creek. The Rev. John Kimmel of the Tri-City Conservative Baptist Church will officiate. Ganz Mortuary of Myrtle Creek is in charge of arrangements.

Probations Of 2 Revoked; Third Man Pleads Guilty

probation, but the judge gave Peterson another chance after the youth promised to "loose the mark."

In June he was given probation again after pleading guilty to theft of equipment from tractors in logging operations east of Sutherlin.

Monday, Jake Leitch, district parole and probation officer, testified that Peterson quit his job without permission, failed to keep in contact with him and had been giving him more trouble than any other probationer.

City police Officer Gerald M. Kane testified to Peterson's recent arrest, with four other youths, on a charge of being illegally in possession of liquor. Kane said that Peterson admitted drinking some of it, that the probationer was very belligerent when told he was under arrest. Charges against the other youths are pending in municipal court.

Dist. Atty. Robert M. Stults recommended Peterson's probation be revoked. In view of Peterson's prior record "the situation appears to be one which cannot be supervised," the district attorney said.

Revocation of probation granted McAllister was recommended by the State Board of Parole and Probation. It was brought out that he had gone to Lewiston, Idaho, to gain employment without getting permission.

Also, when first granted probation, McAllister promised to make restitution on bad checks within 60 days. Stults said this had not been done. McAllister, who served time in Idaho in 1945-46 on a bigamy count, admitted he knew he was violating terms of his probation.

As he put McAllister's two-year term into effect, Judge Wimberly said he couldn't understand why people like McAllister act the way they do. "I give probation to these people," he said, "they don't seem to care whether they go to the penitentiary or not."

- Sixth Street becomes SE Michigan Avenue.
- Council, Chatham and the part of Corey north of Harvard Avenue become W. Chatham Drive.
- SE Overlook (that part lying north of the north line of Vista Avenue) becomes SE Cass Avenue.
- East Second Avenue South becomes NE Diamond Lake Boulevard.
- SE Vista becomes SE Overlook Avenue.
- West 3rd Street becomes NE Polk St.

Police were fearful that many more of the "bombs" had fallen into juvenile hands and broadcast warnings Monday afternoon against their use. They are said to contain cyanide gas.

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Rash Of Eight Traffic Accidents Reported; Pedestrian Hit By Car

A heavy early-week rash of at least eight traffic accidents occurred in Douglas County as rain slickened highways and streets and cut down on visibility for drivers. Two people, one a pedestrian, were injured.

A 65-year-old Roseburg man was sent to Douglas Community Hospital Monday evening with cuts to his face and hands, and shoulder and neck injuries after having been knocked down by a car at the intersection of Spruce Street and Oak Avenue.

He is Forrest L. Winn, who has an address on Military Avenue.

The driver of the car, Richard C. Nickens, 23, of Elizabeth Street, was cited by Roseburg police for failure to yield right-of-way to a pedestrian.

Nickens was turning onto Spruce from Oak. He said Winn was wearing dark clothing in the rain and he failed to see him. Winn was taken to Douglas Community Hospital, where he spent the night. Attendants there say he is in good condition.

A 32-year-old Winston man was slated to go home from Forest Glen Clinic, Canyonville, Tuesday, following treatment for injuries he received Monday when his car struck a log truck near Riddle.

Hospital attendants said W. R. Spurgeon suffered facial lacerations and a broken collarbone. They said he was in good condition.

Riddle News-Review Correspondent Erma Best reported Spurgeon's car left the Riddle River Road, hit a tree and veered back onto the road and into a logging truck. Spurgeon was trapped inside the car. Mrs. Best said. He was released when Riddle Ambulance Driver Ken Hunt pried the front door open.

Heavy damage to both vehicles was reported. The car impact shifted the load of short logs on the truck driven by Calvin E. McCart, Medford, the correspondent said. They did not fall from the vehicle.

State police reported three traffic accidents.

A three-car mixup about 27 miles south of Roseburg on Highway 99 damaged a car driven by Marvin Peterson Sr., Portland, and a pickup driven by Samuel Peck, Myrtle Creek. Officers said Peterson was heading south. He stopped for traffic near the Article Skating Rink Monday about 3:43 p.m.

A following motorist, Earl Adkins, Salt Lake City, was unable to stop, police said, and swerved to the right. Adkins was driving a truck and towing a trailer. Officers said the trailer struck the rear fender of the Peterson car. The impact sent Peterson into the northbound lane and into the pickup driven by Peck.

Officers reported no injuries. They issued no citations.

First Step Taken Toward Comprehensive Study Of County Education Problems

The first step towards comprehensive study of educational problems in the county was taken Monday evening by the Douglas County School Board Assn.

A county-wide convention, called by County Supt. Kenneth F. Barneburg, met in Myrtle Creek. The association elected convention officers and approved a steering committee recommendation on seven areas of study.

The convention met at the direction of the Oregon Legislature which hopes to frame, from such meets, proposed legislation for its 1957 session.

By unanimous vote the association elected its officers to direct the convention. They are: Eugene Fisher, Elkton, president; Fred Albers, Winston, vice president; and Supt. Kenneth F. Barneburg, secretary.

Seven points were selected for study. Chairmen of each were elected and consultants were named. They are:

- (1) State aid, Leo Reagan, Drain, chairman; Supt. Byron Evans, Glide, consultant.
- (2) County equalization, Norman Weatherly, Elkton, chairman; Supt. William Bromley, Dillard, consultant.
- (3) Federal aid, Sid Comfort, Glide, chairman; Supt. Guy Lutz, Oakland, consultant.
- (4) School district organization, Virgil Vance, Dillard, chairman; Principal Leo Crisman, Elkton, consultant.
- (5) Finance, building and equipment, Howard Hatfield, Glide, chairman; Supt. Ken Stuart, Riddle, consultant.
- (6) Teacher shortage, Wayne Crooche, Roseburg, chairman; Supt. Al Neet, Myrtle Creek, consultant.
- (7) Douglas County school office, Gilbert Weaver, Myrtle Creek, chairman; Supt. Marlen Yoder, Days Creek, and Principal Al Petersdorf, Roseburg, consultants.

A complete listing of committee members will be announced later by Pres. Fisher when it has been completed. The countywide report is due in Salem July 1, 1956.
