Oregon Forest Fire Losses In '55 Reported

SALEM — Forest fires in Oregon burned 40,000 acres of federal, state and private lands, the State Forest Department announced Monday as the forest fire season officially ended.

The burned acreage was six times as much as was burned in 1954. But it was far under what forestry officials consider the normal fire loss.

Any time the loss is less than 125,000 acres, the Forestry Department considers it a successful year.

Most of the acreage burned this year was brush and wastelands.

Wheat Markets' Expansion Urged By NW Growers

PENDLETON — Spokesmen for wheat growers in the Pacific Northwest appealed this week for a chance to expand their markets at home and abroad.

They declared that present federal farm programs are pulling down income and driving producers from the land because of an inadequate sales program, restrictions on production and reduced prices.

Woman Feted On 100th Birthday Actually 103

DOWNEY, Calif. — It was disclosed at Miss Judie McKellar's birthday party that she isn't really the age she always claimed to be.

More than 250 friends and relatives gathered Sunday at the home in which Miss McKellar has lived for 85 years. It was supposed to be a party for her 100th birthday. But a nephew, Wallace McKellar, decided the time had come to disclose her closely guarded secret.

He told her friends that somewhere along the line she had fudged a little and actually she is now 103.

In a statement prepared for a Senate Agriculture Committee hearing, A. Lars Nelson, master of the Washington State Grange, called for a multiple price plan for wheat. Under such a plan, wheat grown for domestic food consumption would be supported at full parity prices. The domestic market would be apportioned among growers. But they would be free to produce additional wheat for export and for sale at home as livestock feed at whatever prices they could get.

In a similar statement, Jack L. Smith, farmer of Gilliam County, Ore., representing the Oregon Wheat Growers League, said such a program would increase use of wheat for feed from 100 million to 250 million bushels a year. Such an increase would allow an expansion of from 10 to 20 per cent in present wheat production levels.

Nelson, who also spoke for the Oregon Grange, said the multiple price plan is favored by dairymen, poultrymen, livestock producers, and fruit raisers, as well as grain producers.

Action, Not Promises, Asked — Criticizing the Eisenhower administration flexible support program, the Grange leader declared, "We want 90 per cent of parity for all-out production if we can't get the multiple price plan."

"We need action, not promises, not some political stopgap solutions to our many ills, but a basic adjustment carefully tailored into a program which will give agriculture equal parity in the market place," Nelson said.

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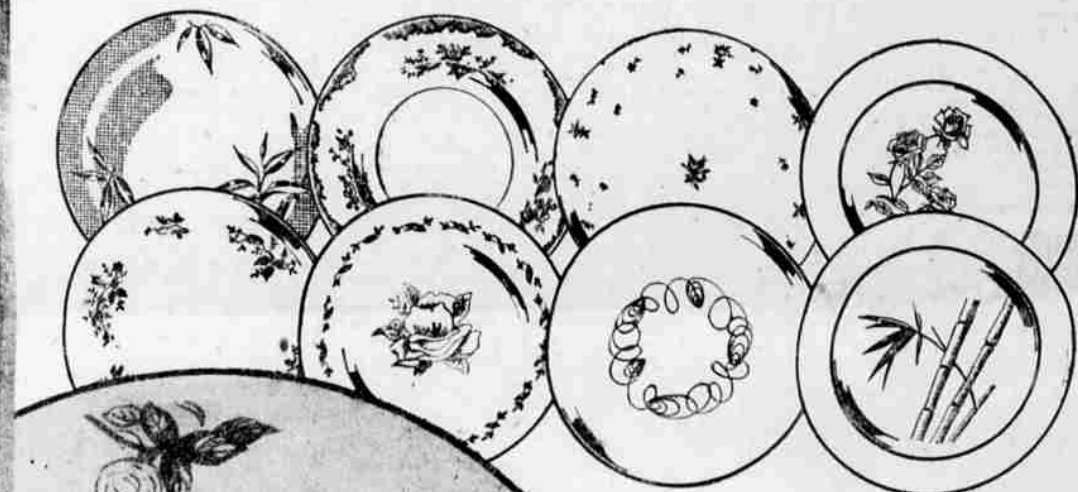
