As for the fight game, well, Walcott says he won't even watch a bout any more. They wanted him in the ring at the recent Rocky Marciano-Archie Moore match. Joe stayed at his home in Camden, N.J.

Walcott's main interest these days is in his job as a special delinquent officer for the Camden Police Department. He is a most sincere worker.

Navy was a big hurdle Saturday for the Irish who now face weaker opposition in Penn and North Carolina before finishing up against Iowa and Southern California.

After the 21-7 triumph over Navy, Irish Coach Terry Brennan said: "The main difference was in those seven guys up front. They opened the holes and we controlled the ball."

Control the ball they did. Notre Dame had the ball for 79 plays and ran 68. The harassed Middles tried 32 running plays and went to the air 25 times. Navy had 12 completed passes and 3 Notre Dame interceptions.

Throughout the season in which the Irish have won five of six games, ball control has been the story. The idea you can't lose if you keep the ball.

This calls for a powerful ground attack in which Notre Dame excels. In six games this year the Irish have picked up 1,626 yards on the ground for a 271-yard average. Against Navy, Notre Dame backs piled up 323 yards on the ground.

Van Brocklin, Wade On Rams' Injury List

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Los Angeles Rams will be without the services of their star pass catching end, Bob Wade, and may not have quarterback Norman Van Brocklin when they line up here Sunday against the San Francisco 49ers.

Wade was hurt last Sunday by a crushing tackle by George Connor of the Chicago Bears and left the game for good. Van Brocklin hurt his passing hand early in the game but stayed on for some time. The hand is badly swollen and indications are that Billy Wade will run the Rams Sunday.

The Rams and the Baltimore Colts are tied for first place in the Western Conference of the National Football League.

Klamath Falls Gains TD But Loses Anyhow

PORTLAND (AP) — The officials called a play wrong, against Klamath Falls, in a game at Grants Pass Friday night, but Klamath still was the victor, the Oregon School Activities Assn. ruled Monday.

The association said the officials should have given Klamath Falls a touchdown when Klamath's Dan Taucher recovered a fumble by Ron Taylor of Grants Pass in the final minutes. So they changed the score to 33-31 for Grants Pass, instead of 33-25.

Taylor had intercepted a Klamath pass in the end zone. He fumbled before he could run it back across the goal line and Taucher fell on the ball. The officials called it an automatic touchdown and gave Grants Pass the ball on its 2-yard line. The OSAA ruling is that it was a touchdown.

The decision eliminates Klamath Falls from contention in district 6-A-1. The district championship will be decided in a game between Grants Pass and Medford Friday night.

Oregon Trackmen Drawn To Sugar Bowl Event

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The University of Oregon's two crack milers will run in the 1956 Sugar Bowl 1,500-meter race Jan. 1.

They are Jim Bailey the 1955 NCAA mile champion, and Bill Dellinger, who won the NCAA title last year and placed second behind Bailey this year.

Among their opponents will be Bill Grim, Maryland; Bill Tidwell, Kansas State; and Sture Linquist, Oklahoma.

Canadian Boat Racer To Try New Speed Mark

PICOTON, Ont. (AP) — Bill Baden of Hamilton hoped to break the world mark of 178.6 miles an hour for motor-driven speedboats Tuesday and perhaps crash on past the 202.32 record set by Donald Campbell's turbo-jet Bluebird last July.

Baden warmed up the attempt by establishing a Canadian record of 134.0 over a "beautifully calm" Picton Bay Monday in his Miss Supertest II.

North American racing officials recognized the 178.6 mark set by Stan Sayers of Seattle with Slo-Mo-Shun in 1952 as the world record for speedboats, ranking Campbell's record of 200-plus in a separate category because of the Blue bird's jet power.

Injured Idaho Grinner Leaves Eugene Hospital

EUGENE (AP) — Eivind Resa, standout football guard for the University of Idaho, left a hospital here Sunday, despite the desire of doctors to keep him in for further observation.

Resa was injured as Idaho lost to Oregon, 25-0, here Saturday. Doctors said he suffered a concussion that started a two-week-old cut bleeding over the right eye. He was removed early in the game and sent to the Sacred Heart Hospital.

After Resa left the hospital, no further trace was found of him. He was presumed to have headed for the Idaho campus at Moscow.

Larceny Charge Fails In Theater Speaker Incident

A 19-year-old Roseburg youth, Fred James Combs, was acquitted of a petty larceny charge Monday in a trial before District Judge Warren A. Woodruff.

The judge decided the state failed to establish beyond reasonable doubt that larceny actually occurred.

Testimony brought out that Combs had left the Pine Motor Theatre on Oct. 13 with an in-car speaker which was snapped off as he drove away.

But Combs and a girl friend maintained the act was accidental and that they intended to return the speaker, valued at about \$7.50. The speaker was recovered from the girl friend's home.

The judge said he doubted that Combs intended to return the speaker, but there was still no evidence that there was a real intent to steal.

Midway in the trial, defense attorney Elmer G. Baldwin asked for dismissal of the complaint, but the judge overruled the motion.

Dep. Dist. Atty. Don H. Sanders contended that had the incident been solely an accident, there would have been no reason to look for the speaker, that it would not have been carried away. This was not the act of a person who had an accident, Sanders said.

Voluntary Give-Up Cited Testifying for the state were a Roseburg police officer, theater official, a man who witnessed the incident and Combs' 16-year-old girl friend. Called to the stand by Baldwin were the girl's mother, and the defendant himself.

Baldwin pointed out that there had been no attempt to hide the speaker or use it, that Combs had turned himself in to city police when he learned of the charge.

Sanders noted that there was nothing to indicate Combs intended to return the speaker, that the court had only the defendant's word to go by.

Baldwin said he believes the case was one which should have been handled in small claims court, rather than prosecuted as a criminal case. Judge Woodruff agreed with another statement by Baldwin that Combs should pay for damage done to theater equipment, and after the trial Combs indicated he would do so.
