

Ailing Chancellor May Be On Shelf Until Next Year

BONN, Germany (U.P.)—Ailing Chancellor Konrad Adenauer may not be able to resume his full political activity until "early next year," it was indicated here.

Adenauer's Christian Democratic Party has postponed its annual convention, which was to have been held in Baden-Baden on Nov. 21.

His fourth medical bulletin since Adenauer was put to bed in his home on Oct. 7, his doctors Friday night said that they expected him to make a complete recovery from his attack of bronchial pneumonia.

The bulletin said: "It is not to be expected that the acute illness which he has overcome will leave behind any traces after the completion of a certain period of convalescence."

The doctors' reference to "a certain period of convalescence" and postponement of the party convention indicated, however, that it will be at least early 1956 before the 79-year-old statesman will be able to take full control of his country's affairs.

Publishers Sue Rival, Typo Union For Big Damages

SEATTLE (U.P.)—A \$1,083,000 suit was filed in federal court here Saturday by the publishers of the Tri-City Herald of Pasco-Kennewick against the publishers of a rival daily newspaper and the International Typographical Union.

The suit by the Scott Publishing Co., Inc., asks treble damages. It is against the Columbia Basin Publishers, the union and others. Columbia Basin Publishers publish the Columbia Basin News.

The Scott firm charged the defendants with seeking a monopoly in violation of federal laws. Scott Publishing contended it lost \$381,000 in profits since a typographers' strike against the Herald in 1950. Treble damages sought bring the total in the suit to \$1,083,000.

Scott also asked \$50,000 for attorney fees for preparation and trial of the suit and \$25,000 for additional attorney fees if the suit should be appealed.

Complaint Detailed
The suit alleged the defendants extended financial aid and credit for publishing the Columbia Basin News without adequate security; that the defendants are trying to induce Scott Publishing workers to refuse to work; that the defendants threatened advertising agencies dealing with Scott Publishing; and that the defendants are selling advertising space below cost.

An injunction against the allegations was asked.

Gen. L. B. Puller, Much Decorated Soldier, Retires

CAMP LEJEUNE, N.C. (U.P.)—Major Gen. Lewis B. (Chet) Puller, 57, the only marine to win the Navy Cross five times for heroism and gallantry in action, retired in ceremonies here Monday after more than 37 years of active service, 27 of them at sea or overseas.

One of the most colorful and highly decorated marines in the history of the corps, Gen. Puller participated in World Wars I and II, the Korean War, and the Haitian, Nicaraguan and Chinese campaigns. He commanded the 1st Marine Div. in its offensive operation as a division at Hoesong, Korea, in 1951.

Excluding medals from foreign governments, Gen. Puller has won 14 personal decorations in combat, plus 39 campaign medals, unit citations and other awards. He holds five Navy Crosses, a step below the Medal of Honor, the Army Distinguished Service Cross, the Silver Star, the Legion of Merit with one star, the Bronze Star, the Air Medal with two clusters and the Purple Heart.

Administration's Foreign Trade Policy Described

PORTLAND (U.P.)—The Eisenhower administration's foreign trade policy was described here as one of encouraging as much trade as possible, but not at the expense of this country's gains in other fields.

Harold C. McClellan, assistant secretary of commerce, gave the description in a speech before the Portland Chamber of Commerce.

The talk climaxed a two-day meeting here of the West Coast foreign trade group.

McClellan also urged an increase in international trade as a means of bringing about better understanding among peoples of the world.

He said, "I am convinced that if the relations between nations are to be established as to insure lasting peace, those relationships must go far beyond government-to-government conferences. There must be increased contact between the peoples in nations, contact which will permit better understanding at the broad level of citizenship. This, I believe, can only be accomplished by a tremendous increase in international trade, international travel, and the international flow of private capital."

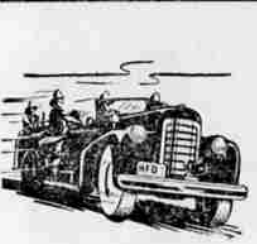


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Navy Jet Probe Is Wound Up

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—The House investigation of the Navy's program for the F3H Demon jet interceptor wound up last week with the Navy again defending its action while conceding the plane did not fulfill original hopes.

Hear. Adm. James S. Russell, chief of the Navy Bureau of Aeronautics, said the Navy will use every one of some 50 planes now standing idle at the St. Louis plant of the McDonnell Aircraft Co., the manufacturer.

He said they will be used on the ground for air dynamics tests and to train mechanics and other aircraft technicians.

Some members of the government operations subcommittee which inquired into the history of the Demon have contended that the

Navy spent some 200 million dollars without getting a combat worthy plane.

Russell indicated that the Navy has abandoned any plans to fit 51 planes on hand with Allison J71 engines, in place of the less powerful Westinghouse J40 around which the craft was originally designed.

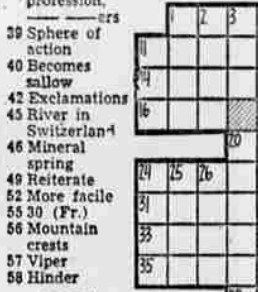
MOROCCANS TOO JOYOUS

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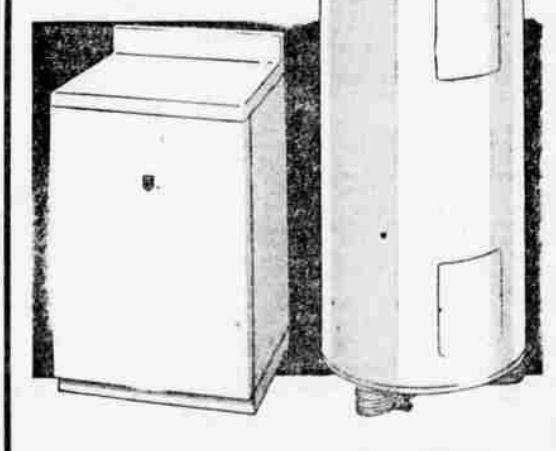
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
