

22 Plane Victims Reported From Northwest Area Cities

Twenty-two of 44 passengers and crew members killed in a United Air Lines plane crash in Colorado Tuesday night were from the Pacific Northwest.

The passenger list included four Seattle-Tacoma area contractors returning from an Associated General Contractors of America meeting at Denver, and several persons flying back to their homes in Oregon. The entire crew was Seattle based.

The dead, as identified by UAL

and relatives, included: E. B. Hickock, 40, manager of the Seattle office of Associated General Contractors. Frank M. Brennan, 36, a member of a Seattle contracting firm. James Purvis, 45, Tacoma, contractor and president of the Tacoma AGC chapter. Clarence W. Todd, 43, manager of the Tacoma AGC office. F. E. Ambrose, United Air Lines senior reservations agent at Seattle.

Mr. and Mrs. B. Beckstrom, Seattle.

John P. Eomelyn, 33, superintendent of the King County Humane Society at Seattle. Mrs. J. W. Bunch, 1804 Birch, Forest Grove, Ore. F. Arthur, pilot-engineer, and Peggy Peddicord

and Jacqueline Hinds, stewardesses.

Miss Hinds, 26, was born in Big Timber, Mont., and reared in Eugene, Ore. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Hinds of Eugene.

Also among the passengers killed were Mr. and Mrs. Gurney Edwards of Providence, R.I., who were on their way to Seattle to visit relatives.

Expansion Of 'Y' Indian Guide Program Planned

An expansion of the YMCA Indian Guide program will be launched Thursday night at the Central Junior High School auditorium. Invitations have gone out to all fathers interested in organizing into tribal units.

The meeting will start at 7:30 p.m. Last week, 46 men indicated interest in the program. They scheduled this meeting to form other Indian Guide tribes throughout the district.

At present four schools are represented in the program—Fullerton, Riverside, Green and Benson. Members of these tribes will assist with the organizational operation. They are Jack Wilton, Harry Hill, Lee Emery, Dr. James Findlay Jr. and Leroy Lafon. Secretary Don Naden of the YMCA will assist.

The tribal program has been in operation here for about two years. Naden explains that the purpose of the program is to foster companionship between father and son at an age when the boy "thinks his dad is the greatest guy in the world."

The program which later was to become a nation-wide was introduced in 1925 by an Ojibway Indian, Joe Friday, an authority on Indian customs. He told a YMCA group in St. Louis of the close relationship of father and son in the tribe. The idea was taken up and became a national program in 1935.

The Guides meet twice a month and neither a boy or his father may attend a meeting alone unless sickness interferes. An evening's program consists of ceremonies, a story of Indian life, work on a craft, a game and refreshments. Meetings are limited to a strict hour and 15 minutes. Other special activities include field trips and a summer camp-out.

McKay Announces Sale Of Business To Son-In-Law

SALEM (AP)—Secretary of Interior McKay, whose automobile agency has been picketed by union men since July, Tuesday announced sale of the firm to his son-in-law.

Picketing continued at the plant, formerly the Douglas McKay Chevrolet Co., now to be known as the Capitol Chevrolet-Cadillac Co.

"It has changed its name, but we believe it is less than a complete change of ownership," McKay's statement that he has sold out brings a smile to our faces. "We'll do some checking," said Milo Holt, AFL Machinists Union official.

"We have been making arrangements for this sale for 2½ years, long before this labor trouble started," Mr. McKay said to it to be because he doesn't believe in absentee ownership," said the son-in-law, Wayne Hadley and Lester Green.

McKay, who left Salem to become secretary of Interior in January, 1953, was not available immediately for comment. The ownership change was announced through newspaper advertising. The machinists have accused the firm and two other Salem car agencies of union-busting. Holt said the firms rejected wage demands some time ago, refused arbitration and finally refused to renew the former contract.

Hadley and Green said McKay has not been active in the firm since 1948, when he became governor of Oregon. McKay earlier said he had disassociated himself from the firm, but the firm remained in his name because the franchise from General Motors was not transferable. He said several weeks ago he planned to sell his majority stock to the son-in-law, who then would seek their own franchise.

He was western manager for Zenith Radio Corp. for many years before he was forced to retire because of his health about nine years ago.

He is survived by his wife, Alice, and a brother, Orlyn J. of Cleveland, Ohio.

Lebanon Man Drowns While On Hunting Trip

CORVALLIS (AP)—David Cunningham, 32, Lebanon, drowned Tuesday in the Willamette River while on a duck hunting trip.

He was the fourth fatality of the bird-hunting season and the eighth hunter to meet a violent death since Oregon's deer hunting season opened Oct. 1.

Coroner Don Durand said Cunningham stepped into a deep hole while trying to retrieve two birds which had fallen into the river after being shot.

Two companions, Frank Keesee and Wesley Veen, both of Lebanon, said Cunningham, dressed in heavy clothing and waders, struggled in the water but went under before help could reach him.

The accident occurred about 10 miles south of Corvallis.
