

Peron Continues Flight Up Coast To Nicaragua

SALVADOR, Brazil (AP) — Juan D. Peron, exiled former dictator of Argentina, left Salvador Thursday morning, heading for Nicaragua to visit his old friend, President Anastasio Somoza.

The Paraguayan air force DC4 carrying Peron apparently intends to stop over at Belem, on the equator in the extreme north of Brazil. But there were reports here that the flight might be along the coastline, with a halt at Natal to refuel en route across the jungles of the Brazilian lumps.

The flight direct to Belem is shorter, but there is added safety in flying over the populated coast.

Peron's plane is to proceed to Caracas, Venezuela, Thursday night or Friday and, from there, make the last hop across the Caribbean Sea to Managua, Nicaragua's capital.

However, the ex-President's journey so far has failed to follow the route announced before takeoff.

Peron flew here yesterday from Assunção and said he was going to Nicaragua. But there was speculation that his ultimate destination might be Europe.

Peron was granted exile in Paraguay after he was overthrown by the September revolution, but his presence caused disagreement within the government in that country on Argentina's northern border.

Peron told reporters here he decided to leave Paraguay in order not to prejudice that country.

Coon Says Demo Senators Working Against State

ENTERPRISE (AP) — Oregon's two Democratic senators are "working against the best interests of the state" in opposing the partnership power policy at the John Day Dam, says Coon (R-Or.) said Wednesday night.

The Eastern Oregon congressman, winding up a series of talks on power policy in the eastern part of the state, told the Enterprise and Walla Walla Chambers of Commerce that Sen. Neuberger and Coon wanted "federal power or nothing."

He said they had "a 100 per cent record of standing in the way of new power development in the Northwest."

Coon, who favors a John Day Dam constructed with funds of private power firms and the federal government, said the important issue is whether the region's resources will be developed or limited to that which the federal government will undertake alone.

Coon earlier debated on this issue with Neuberger in 10 Eastern Oregon cities.

Large Farm House Burns, Killing Three Children

ELKHART, Ind. (AP) — A 10-room frame farmhouse burned Wednesday night, killing an Amish farmer and three of his 13 children inside. Sheriff Vernon Cripe said the dead were Simon Slabaugh, 47, and his sons, Glenn, 10, Simon Jr., 9, and Larry, 5. The boys were asleep in an upstairs bedroom.

The sheriff estimated damage at \$12,000.

Six of the Slabaugh children were away when fire broke out and set off an explosion.

Mrs. Slabaugh and four children who were sleeping downstairs escaped unhurt. The mother said her husband helped them to safety and then went back into the house for the other children.

The Slabaugh farm is 12 miles southwest of Elkhart.

Grant, Thornton Named In Timber Claim Suit

PORTLAND (AP) — Within 24 hours of the time two Indians got \$387,432.50 each, claims for more than \$100,000 were filed against them. Jasper Grant and Harold Thornton received the money. It came from sale of their timberland on the Southern Oregon coast, land that they nearly lost in a fraud four years ago.

The claims against them were made in federal court by Henry and Elizabeth Taylor, who four years ago paid \$135,000 for the timber lands that sold recently for \$1,175,000.

Three persons were convicted of fraud in the first sale, but the Taylors were not involved.

Earlier the Taylors got back part of the money they had paid the Indians, but asked in a federal court suit for the rest of the money — \$19,533 from Thornton and \$50,343 from Grant.

Mrs. Woodward May Be Questioned By Grand Jurors

MINNEOLA, N.Y. (AP) — Nassau County Dist. Atty. Frank A. Gullotta says the November grand jury must decide whether Mrs. William Woodward Jr. should be required to reenact the shotgun killing of her husband.

Woodward, 35-year-old socialite and turlin, was shot to death early Sunday in the dark hallway of his Oyster Bay home by a blast from a shotgun wielded by his blonde wife, Ann, 39.

Mrs. Woodward has told police she fired in panic outside her bedroom door after being awakened by what might have been the barking of the family dog. Reports of a prowler in the fashionable neighborhood caused the couple, who occupied separate bedrooms to keep guns by their beds for protection.

Police said a young man, arrested and charged with burglarizing a home in the area, has admitted breaking into the Woodward's six-car garage and a cabin beside their swimming pool last Friday night. He is 22-year-old Paul W. Wirths, a German refugee bricklayer. Wirths has denied, however, being on the Woodward property at the time of the shooting.

Wirths, arrested Tuesday, is being held in lieu of \$5,000 bail in Nassau County Jail pending grand jury action.

day. One Israeli official said the situation was quiet at 4 p.m. after exchange of fire which he called "not serious."

El Sabha is about 9 miles south of the El Ajia-Nizana U. N. armistice headquarters and dominates a strategically important plateau on the border.

The Israelis said in addition to the 4 dead, their casualties numbered 19 wounded. They claimed capture of 40 Egyptians. The spokesman in Cairo said the Egyptians had taken "some" Israeli prisoners and listed 70 Egyptian soldiers as killed or missing.

Egyptian general army headquarters has taken over command of the Egyptian troops in the area, previously controlled by the Egyptian Palestine department. Gen. Abdel Hakim Amer, Egyptian commander in chief, has gone to the front.

Army headquarters in Cairo said the Israelis had thrown 3,000 troops against 100 Egyptians at the El Sabha post. The attack was supported by armored cars and heavy guns, the Egyptian communiqué said.

McCarthy Says Red Cell Located In NLRB

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) wants the Senate Investigation subcommittee he has created to undertake an immediate probe of the National Labor Relations Board, already under study by a House group.

"I have succeeded in uncovering facts which, if true, establish the existence of a currently functioning communist cell" in the NLRB, McCarthy wrote Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.), present head of the subcommittee.

McCarthy made his letter public late yesterday. McClellan was out of the city, and there was no indication what stand he would take.

Acting NLRB Chairman Philip Ray Rodgers declined immediate comment.

Woman's Illness Halts Deliberation Of Jury

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — A woman member of the jury became ill Thursday morning, forcing a temporary halt in the deliberations of the jury considering murder charges against Dr. A. Arnold Axilrod, Minneapolis dentist.

Judge Leslie L. Anderson said he was informed by a bailiff that the woman wanted a few more hours of sleep and rest. Anderson said it did not appear the illness was serious or that it would cause any prolonged delay in the jury's study of the case.

The panel has been weighing the case since 2:35 p.m. Tuesday.

Wounded Cougar Said Prowling Prineville Area

PRINEVILLE (AP) — A wounded cougar is believed prowling around the southern part of Prineville.

The big cat first was reported Sunday. Jack Rogers, who operates a tavern in that area, said a man told him of shooting at the cougar, which escaped, leaving a trail of blood.

Pete Bakken next reported he shot at a cougar Wednesday morning in a field three blocks south of a grocery store. The animal escaped.

Chartered Bus Loaded With Students Crashes

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — A chartered bus loaded with student nurses from Charlotte crashed into a big truck 15 miles north of here early Thursday morning. One nurse was killed and 22 were injured. Some of those hurt are in critical condition.

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Brazil President Suffers Light Heart Attack

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — President Joao Cafe Filho suffered a heart attack during the night and physicians said he would be compelled to undergo a period of complete rest. They said however, his condition is not serious.

Cafe, 56, became president in August of 1954 after President Getulio Vargas committed suicide following a drive by 58 army generals who forced his resignation.

Cafe was hospitalized at about 1 a.m. after suffering the attack in his apartment.

Brazil recently elected a new president and Cafe is due to turn over his office Jan. 31. There is some speculation that he will be unable to take up his duties in the three months remaining. In that event the duties of the presidency would be discharged by Carlos Luz, president of the House of Deputies.

Luz is a member of the Social Democratic Party, which holds a majority in Congress and whose candidate, Juscelino Kubitschek, won the presidency in the Oct. 3 elections, on the basis of still incomplete returns.

they planned to get the money from Smith's estate and go to Alaska together.

Defense attorney Bruce Spaulding said there was no doubt Wolf did the killing, but asked what proof there was that Mrs. Smith was involved.

Spaulding said Wolf made up the story to involve Mrs. Smith because the secret, unexpressed love he once bore for the woman had turned to hate.

Spaulding hammered at the state's attempts to corroborate Wolf's story and questioned whether "beyond a reasonable doubt" Mrs. Smith had been connected to the crime.

Circuit Judge Arlie G. Walker told the jurors there were four possible verdicts: acquittal; conviction of second-degree murder, which calls for a life sentence; conviction of first-degree murder with a recommendation for life imprisonment; and conviction of first-degree murder, which calls for the death penalty.

The jury could split 10-2 on the first two verdicts, but the first-degree murder convictions must be unanimous.

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Roseburg Lumber Pays Highest Price For BLM Timber

Roseburg Lumber Co. paid a whopping \$706,186.46 for 14,345,000 board feet of BLM timber Wednesday. The company paid the highest price ever received in the Roseburg BLM District for Douglas fir when it bid \$55.30 per thousand board feet in one sale.

Previous high had been \$54.25. The timber had been appraised at \$25.10. The BLM high does not set a local record. Top price for Douglas fir was received by the U.S. Forest Service here. That figure was \$60.25 paid in the Bohemia Ranger District by Bohemia Lumber Co., Culp Creek.

The BLM timber sold was in three tracts, two in the Rock Creek area and a third in the vicinity of Yellow Creek, northwest of Sutherlin.

The winning bidder paid \$321,501.75 for one Rock Creek tract appraised at \$152,260.95. The sale included 5,604,000 board feet of Douglas fir out of a total volume of 6,157,000. Record high for the

Douglas fir was chalked up in this sale which found five bidders entering 182 bids. Other bidders were Umpqua Plywood Corp. and Evans Products Corp., of Roseburg; Martin Bros. Box Co. of Oregon; Oakland; and Trico Timber Co., Dillard.

A second Rock Creek sale of 7,006,000 board feet of timber brought \$337,153.65, which had been appraised at \$165,811.65. The total included 6,346,000 board feet of Douglas fir. Roseburg Lumber Co. paid \$51.60 for Douglas fir appraised at \$24.60. Other bidders were Umpqua Plywood Corp., Evans

and Products Corp., Martin Bros. and Trico. They entered 23 bids in all.

A tract northwest of Sutherlin, 1,182,000 board feet, appraised at \$28,916.60 sold for \$18.53. Douglas fir, 1,108,000 board feet, appraised at \$25.45, sold for \$12.25. Five bidders entered 97 bids. Losing bidders were Floyd Ross, Oakland; Hub Lumber Co., Roseburg; Trico and Martin Bros.

The upper Olympic Peninsula was hit hard by the storm. One highway was closed by water and slides and topping trees knocked out telephone service between Port Angeles and Neah Bay. Winds up to 60 and 70 miles an hour were reported overnight at Neah Bay.
