

Medford Man Asks Permission To Run Diamond Lake Camp

A Medford man has applied for special permission to run, as a private enterprise, the Diamond Lake Camp Ground.

The request from Larry Neeley is the first of its kind received at headquarters of the Umpqua National Forest in Roseburg. Supervisor Vondis Miller this week said the Neeley request included the overnight camp grounds and the trailer camping spot on the east side of the lake. It excludes the picnic area and the swimming beach on the southern shore of Diamond Lake.

A letter concerning the matter has been sent to the Forest Service regional office in Portland.

Supervisor Miller said he hopes to have a definite answer before next spring.

While such an application has not been sent to the Roseburg office before, the supervisor says it is not unique. At present there are several such camp grounds in the region, including Mt. Hood and Eagle Creek.

The Forest Service will consider all such applications. If one is granted, it would be for a trial period which could be extended. The usual fee procedure calls for the lessee to pay a base fee, plus a per cent of the gross receipts.

The lessee would assume maintenance and replacements of tables and fireplaces now on the grounds. If any area extensions were necessary during the life of the permit they would be done by the lessee.

If the request is granted, it would release two Forest Service employees (guards) now at Diamond Lake, for use in developing and maintaining smaller camp grounds along the North Umpqua River, the supervisor said.

There are now 140 camps in the area requested, and there is a potential for 100 more, Miller concluded.

French Assembly Backs Faure, But Plan Confused

PARIS (AP)—The French National Assembly early today voted 330-211 in favor of holding new general elections next month, but a cloud of parliamentary confusion hung over the future of the plan.

Endorsement of the government's bill to end the present Assembly Jan. 2 — thus advancing the elections from June — came on a vote of confidence for Premier Edgar Faure. The support of 88 members of the 94-member Communist group gave the government its victory.

But what happens now was anything but clear.

The fate of the bill is up to the Council of the Republic or Senate. If the upper House does not act within the next two weeks the whole early election project may have to be tossed out the window.

The Assembly debated the bill under a government demand for urgent consideration. Under this procedure debate must be concluded within three days. It also requires urgent treatment from the Senate.

Adults Seek More Educational Help, AE Classes Show

Adults are seeking more educational help.

Verification of the statement comes from Adult Education Director Richard Boss, Roseburg, who this week announced that 25 AE classes are now underway locally. The figure is nearly 50 per

cent above the 1954 high of 18 classes.

Boss says he believes the number may go higher.

Contributing factors, he believes, are improved instruction and the desire by many persons to prepare for a new type of work "rather than a hobby." This year, for example, the AE Department is running, simultaneously, classes in bookkeeping and typing. It's the first time such has been the

case since Boss came to Roseburg in 1953.

He says he's had surprises all fall. More than 20 women turned out to learn how to understand their cars. Eighteen men enrolled in a general mathematics class. Last week 18 men signed up for an insurance sales class.

Already, the director has received numerous requests for new classes when winter term, 1956, starts.

They include: A preparatory course to help persons planning to take the test for a second class radio operator's license; English for aliens, musical appreciation, fundamentals of public speaking; a general course to understand what is taken from the worker's paycheck, study in preparation of income tax returns, advanced welding and advanced mathematics.

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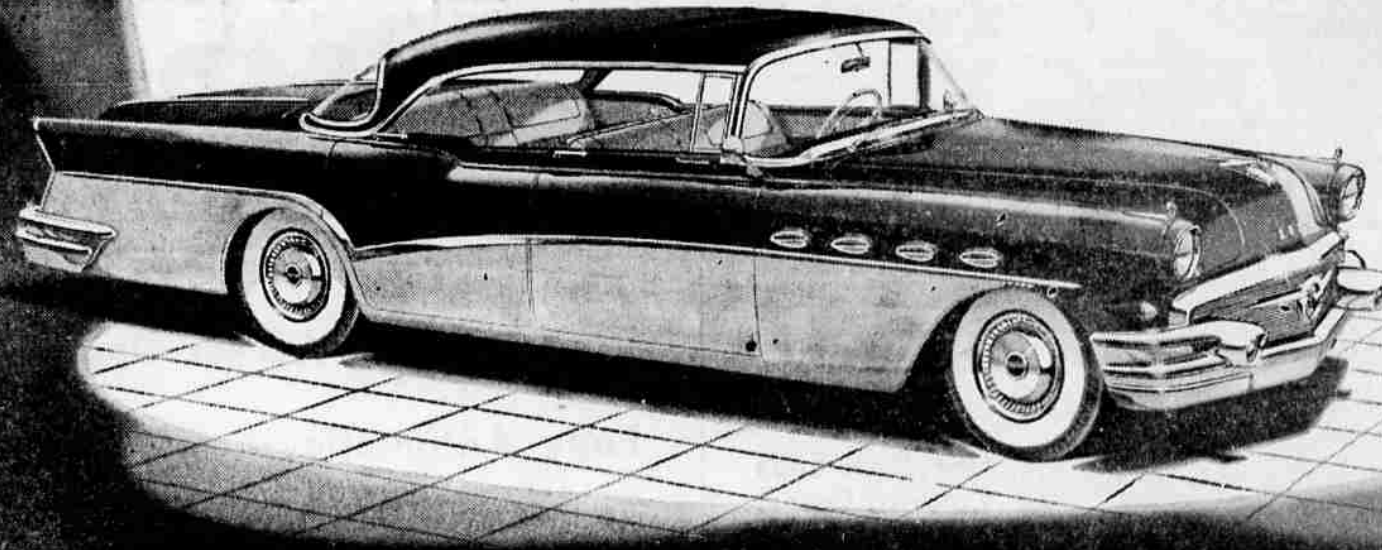
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
