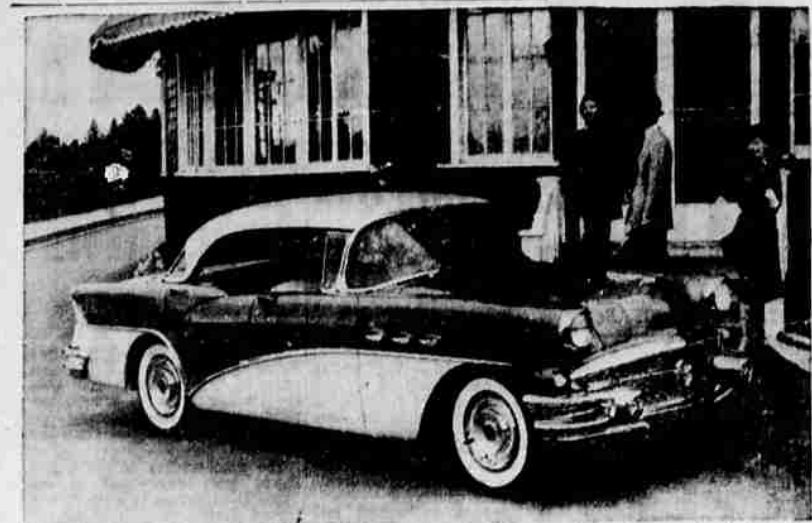

Overweight covers a broader field and is a much more prevalent problem than most persons realize. There is a huge army of people in the United States who suffer the disadvantages of and also the dangers of overweight, without being so excessively fat as to be termed obese. (One has only to watch the crowds in some public place frequented by the "easy-livers," to have a graphic demonstration of how large a proportion of our population is overweight. And how few of these people actually realize that they eat too much, or that they are more efficient and feel better if they weigh less. Many of them are unaware that they are overweight or regard the matter as something determined by Fate rather than by themselves.)

The Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, some time ago compiled some tables which are good guides to ideal weights for adults, of different heights and body builds. Because of the present prevalence of overweight, among otherwise normal adults over forty years of age, the average weights actually found in later years of life do not represent the optimum weight so far as health is concerned. Although a well-filled-out body and moderate store of fat constitutes a desirable reserve for the child or young adult, the gradual accretion of weight which so often comes in the latter half of life is undesirable and should not be accepted as normal.

Worthless Check Charge Brings 2-Year Sentence

A 43-year-old Sutherlin man, Andrew Virgil Ball, was handed a two-year penitentiary sentence Friday afternoon when he appeared before Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich.

Ball pleaded guilty in the court on Oct. 31 to a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. He was charged specifically with passing a worthless \$5 check. Other checks, totalling \$50, also were mentioned by Dep. Dist. Atty. Don H. Sanders.

The judge, glancing at a sheet listing Ball's previous convictions, took note of a "rather impressive list of prior convictions," mostly in regard to bad checks.

Under the circumstances, he said, he couldn't grant probation.

Another Given Probation

Another man, charged with issuing a check without sufficient funds in the bank to cover it, fared better. He is Joseph Coyte Taylor Jr., 28, Tillamook.

The judge imposed a one-year term and granted Taylor probation. Taylor, who says he came from England eight years ago, claims he has no previous criminal record.

He was charged with passing a \$50.23 check at Chuck's Coffee Shop in Roseburg on Oct. 23. He promised to make restitution. He was arrested at Eugene earlier this week.

Judge Woodrich told the defendant the penalty could have been anything from six years, in such a case where the amount of the check exceeds \$25.

Taylor waived his right to a grand jury hearing, then entered a plea of guilty to the charge before sentence was imposed.

Molotov Flies To Russia; Speculators Say He Wants Instructions From Bosses

GENEVA (AP)—With Secretary of State Dulles playing the leading role, the Western powers appear to have won the Big Four conference battle with Russia with a proposal for German-wide elections next September as a first step toward carrying out the Western unification program.

Molotov promptly indicated he would reject the proposal.

Dulles, Molotov, British Foreign Secretary Harold Macmillan and French Foreign Minister Antoine Pinay held their seventh session yesterday and then broke up until next Tuesday. Thereafter they will have possibly 10 more meetings before adjournment of the conference, tentatively set for about Nov. 19.

Since the Russians normally do not make concessions or spectacular moves until after much hard bargaining, the position developed thus far by Molotov is not necessarily final—although he has so far fought hard to defend it. But the ultimate results of the conference cannot be known until the final hour.

With the three-day recess in prospect, all four ministers made plans to quit Geneva.

A host of activities in Douglas County recognizing American Education Week were expected today.

Plans were being laid by many educational groups to celebrate the week of Nov. 6 to 12. Mayor Ernest M. Barker Jr. set the hall rolling in Roseburg by proclaiming the week here.

"It is most appropriate that in these critical days all citizens come to realize the importance of education in the American way of life," he said.

Practically every school in Roseburg is scheduling "open house" during the week. Each school will announce its date and time soon. Window displays have been scheduled from the elementary, junior high and high school at J. C. Penney's.

Joe Richard, Allen's Store and Miller's Mercantile, also, buttons made by school children will be given out to those who visit schools during the week, according to Mary Ann Phelps, who is in charge of the observance here.

The American Education Week theme this year is "Schools: Your Investment in America." It is being designed to emphasize the role of citizen responsibility toward the public schools of America, Miss Phelps declared.

Thefts Epidemic Causing Police Plenty Trouble

An epidemic of thefts from cars is being investigated by Roseburg police. All apparently occurred Thursday night.

There were two attempted thefts. Mrs. Irene Hunt, 1021 Estelle St., and Walden Davis, 3029 W. Sherwood Ave., both said their cars were broken into and the glove compartments searched. In each case, nothing apparently was taken.

R. R. Brand, 500 W. Chatham Dr., claimed a lady's wrist watch and a small diamond in an envelope were stolen from a dresser in his home, probably on Wednesday.

Rita Hayworth Files To Divorce Dick Haymes

RENO, Nev. (AP)—Rita Hayworth moved Friday to divorce her fourth husband, singer Dick Haymes, in a complaint filed from Paris, where she has been visiting her third mate, Moslem prince Aly Khan.

The complaint was aimed to the actress' attorney, William K. Woodburn. It said Haymes had caused her "great unhappiness and injured her mental health."

Haymes said in Chicago: "I will not contest the divorce in any way."

Miss Hayworth, 36, and Haymes, 37, were married at Las Vegas Sept. 24, 1933, shortly after he had divorced his third wife, Nora Edington Flynn Haymes.

Hoodlums Quizzed After Bomb-Slaying Of Film Racketeer

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—A nationwide quiz of hoodlums was under way today in the search for the bomb-slayer of pudgy Willie Biuff, a retired film racketeer credited with talking a few of his pals into jail.

Biuff, 35, was killed when his pickup truck was blown apart as he was starting it at his home in northeast Phoenix Friday. He had been living here about six years under an assumed name with his wife, who said after the explosion: "He didn't have an enemy in the world."

Lt. Ralph Edmundson, in charge of the investigation for the sheriff's office, said authorities here have "very little to go on."

"We were not too well acquainted with the man or his acquaintances," Edmundson said, "but we're going to take time to get acquainted."

He said material on Biuff—who lived here under the name of William Nelson—is being sent here from several cities and that known acquaintances of the former Hollywood film union leader will be questioned anywhere they can be found.

The blast mutilated Biuff's body and threw wreckage over a radius of several hundred feet. It tore a hole in the roof of the garage, shot two chunks of metal into the wall of a home about 100 feet away and shattered windows in several houses.

Biuff, who once told a grand jury in New York that he had received more than a million dollars from film producers as a front man for an underworld syndicate, got his start in labor in 1932 when he became a chauffeur for the late Mike Galvin, head of the AFL Teamsters Union.

Parent-Teachers Of Green Back Ruling Of State

The Green Parent Teachers Assn. executive committee will recommend to the School District 4 board of education that the principles and policies governing the administration of elementary athletics be adopted as recommended by the State Dept. of Education.

The Green executive committee met this week and voted unanimously to accept the state department's recommendations.

District Supt. M. C. Deller has asked PTA's and Dad's Clubs to express their opinions on the new state ruling governing elementary athletics. He said the decisions of the clubs will be used by the board in "formulating its course."

Elsewhere in the county, both Riddle and Glendale have reported their present policies are in line with the new ruling.

ent ordinance also included consideration of establishment operators who own their own machine rather than leasing from a distributor. The new license fee schedule agreed on by the committee headed by councilman James Knudtson would include the following licensing rates:

1. Pinball machines and any skill operated game using balls propelled by a player and giving free games as awards, \$45 a quarter per machine for those also paying for a distributor's license; \$60 per machine for an owner without a distributor's license.

2. Shovel games such as bowls, shuffleboards, guns or any games or devices not awarding free games, \$15 a quarter per machine for those with a distributor's license; \$30 per machine for those without.

3. Music devices, \$6 per quarter per machine for distributor; \$12 per quarter per machine for owner.

The council committee also discussed the possibility of setting a city ordinance on highway signs, boards or devices not awarding free games, \$15 a quarter per machine for those with a distributor's license; \$30 per machine for those without.

Meanwhile, the committee decided not to enter any contracts for outdoor signs until a policy is worked out.

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Child Confirms Mother's Story About Shooting

KINGSVILLE, Tex. (AP)—Five-year-old Marie Teresa Canales was reported Saturday to have confirmed her mother's story of the slaying of Don Worden on Padre Island.

Mrs. Sunny Canales Worden, 42, the wealthy San Antonio woman charged with murder in Worden's death Oct. 22, has said her little daughter was the only other person present at the time.

Officers questioned the curly-haired youngster Friday but reportedly found her unwilling to talk to strangers. County Atty. Royce C. Johnston said, however, that she did talk to a ranch employee and longtime friend, Beto Gonzales. Johnston said Gonzales quoted the little girl as telling a story which agreed with details of the shooting as given by Mrs. Worden.

Johnston, Sheriff Jim Scarborough and Texas Ranger Joe Bridge went to the Prexides Canales ranch Friday and talked to Maria Teresa for half an hour. Canales, 32, is the wealthy oil man and rancher from whom Mrs. Worden was divorced Aug. 3, only a month before the woman married Worden at Bend, Ore.

Authorities delved Saturday into the past of Worden, a 43-year-old San Antonio real estate man.

She told officers she shot Worden after he forced her to dig a grave in the windswept sands beside the Gulf of Mexico and said he intended to kill and bury her daughter.

Mrs. Worden remained free on bond.

The victim's son Friday told authorities his father had been a police officer at Weatherford, Tex., where he was reared, and had also been an officer in the state of Washington and in an unnamed suburban California town in 1949 and 1950.

Officers here said an uncle of Worden had turned over to Dist. Atty. William Langley at Portland, claim checks for several trunks containing Worden's personal possessions. They said that when the trunks arrived in Oregon they hoped to find papers that would throw more light on Worden's background.

he wired the bomb in Kermil Smith's car at Mrs. Smith's urging, and because he was in love with her. He said she asked him to commit the slaying so they could share Smith's \$20,000 estate and live together in Alaska.

Wolf admitted the slaying in open court and asked the court to determine the degree of his guilt. A date for this hearing is expected to be set soon.

The 45-year-old handyman, who did odd jobs for the Smiths in the slaying, said: "I just wish they'd make her take a lie detector test. I was willing to take a lie detector test, but when they asked her, she refused. I don't know... I just don't understand."

Mrs. Smith's attorneys said at the trial that Wolf apparently dreamed she wanted her husband done away with and that his love for her turned to hate after he was caught.

Asked if he still loved the woman that he said he committed murder for, Wolf replied: "I don't feel anything about her. Nothing. She's got all that money—and I don't know what's going to happen now."

The verdict for acquittal was 10-2 with F. C. Lukes, a retired McMinville barber switching his vote after 15½ hours deliberation. That broke the deadlock—which started at 7:35 for acquittal—and freed Mrs. Smith.

Couple Severely Burned In Auto Court Explosion

GRANTS PASS (AP)—A Mitchell Ore., couple suffered extensive burns in an auto court fire caused by an unexplained heating unit explosion early Saturday.

The husband, E. H. Spool, was reported in critical condition at a hospital here. His wife was treated for severe burns. She said she was in the bathroom when the blast occurred.
