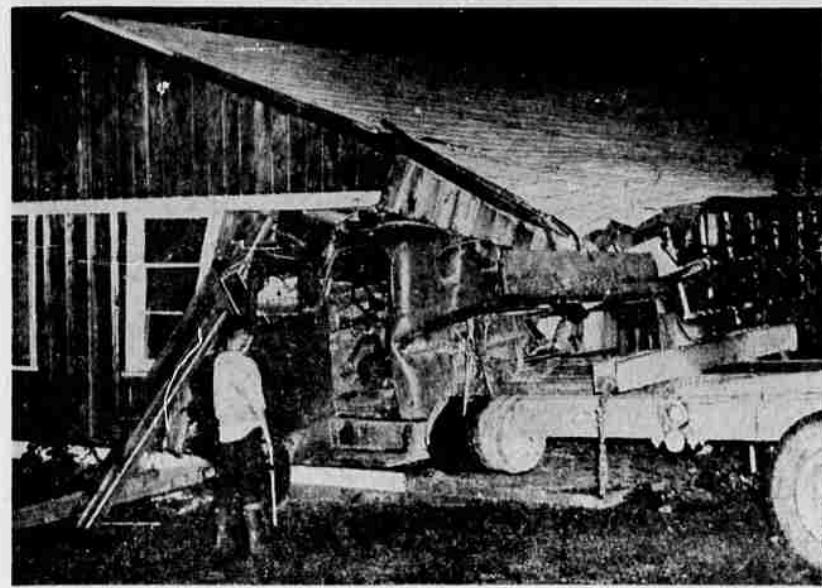


ACCIDENTAL SHOT KILLS CANYONVILLE BOY

GENEVA (AP) — The United States will make a new effort this week to get Russia to join promptly in disarmament measures designed to make impossible a massive surprise attack by either of the world's great atomic powers.

Russia Plays Down Arms Part Of Fete

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union celebrated the 28th anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution Monday with a massive parade which played down Soviet military might.

No new guns, armor or aircraft were displayed in a brisk 20-minute arms demonstration, the briefest observers ever witnessed on this holiday.

Defense Minister Marshal Zhukov, who took the salute, made a mild opening address.

Some spectators thought the Soviets were bending over backwards to support their contention they are peace-loving, unaggressive and friendly and thus help their own position at the Big Four foreign ministers' conference in Geneva.

Zhukov set the tone of the parade in his opening address. He hailed the technical progress of Soviet agriculture and industry under communism. He listed such developments as the normalization of Soviet-Yugoslav relations as an example of Soviet striving for lessening of international tensions. He made no mention of the United States or a capitalist threat.

Two Boys Face Charge Of Liquor Possession

Two boys, Jerrald Linson and Larry Kacemeyer, both 12 and of Roseburg, were to appear in municipal court today after admitting illegal possession of liquor to Roseburg police.

The boys said they got the beer, a half-case, from a "drunk" at Oakland Saturday night.

Sunday morning early, they ran from a policeman near the Greyhound Bus Depot. But the officer obtained the license number of Linson's car, and the arrest followed at dawn Sunday.

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Hospital Stay May End This Week For Ike

Decision Of President Depending On Advice Of Doctors, Due Today

DENVER (AP) — President Eisenhower will leave the hospital Friday and fly back to Washington, but his doctor said Monday it may be late January or early February before he is in a position to decide whether to seek reelection.

Dr. Paul Dudley White, noted Boston heart specialist, told a news conference it will be entirely up to the Chief Executive to make a decision whether to run again.

Hunger, Bad Heart Send Escapade Back To Prison

WALLA WALLA (AP) — Cold and hungry and needing medicine for a heart condition, William Jesse James, 37, gave himself up Sunday leaving at large only one of 10 convicts who tunneled their way out of the Washington State Penitentiary last week.

Warden Lawrence Delmore said James, still dressed in prison clothing, went to a farmhouse near Lowden, 19 miles west of here, and telephoned to officers to come and get him.

Delmore said James, who was serving 20 years for robbery from Yakima County, had been hiding in nearby fields since he and nine other convicts crawled through a tunnel to freedom last Thursday night.

He had about \$5 in cash but said he was afraid to use it. He said he had not eaten since the escape and was worried about his heart condition—he had forgotten to take heart pills with him when he fled from the prison.

James' capture left only William P. Lee, 42, serving 20 years for robbery in King County, still at large. Eight others were caught at various points not far from the prison in the last three days.

Mother Drowns After Saving Two Children

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — A mother drowned but saved her children by holding their heads above water when they were trapped in a car that overturned in a canal Sunday.

The dead woman was Mrs. Hazel Wolen, 33, She and the children, Irene, 8, and Roy, 3, remained in the upside-down car some 15 minutes until her husband, Martin, got out through a window and frantically tried to rescue them.

The bottom of the car remained above the water, leaving a narrow breathing space inside. Rescuers tipped the car on its side. Efforts to revive Mrs. Wolen were not successful. Wolen and the children suffered minor injuries.

Neuberger Opposes Aide Nominated By McKay

PORTLAND (AP) — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Saturday he will wage a "vigorous and victorious fight" against Senate confirmation of Wesley D'Ewart of Montana as assistant secretary of the Interior Department.

D'Ewart, a former congressman, recently was nominated for the post by Secretary of the Interior McKay.

Neuberger said he objected to D'Ewart because of a public grazing lands bill D'Ewart introduced while a member of Congress.

Off-Year Elections Tuesday Beckon Voters In 12 States

WASHINGTON (AP) — Voters in 12 states ballot tomorrow in off-year state or local elections. The results promise little in the way of national significance since most campaigns have been local and no congressional seats are being filled.

The featured contests are for governor of Kentucky and mayor of Philadelphia. Most political observers forecast Democratic victories. Both posts now are held by Democrats.

State legislatures will be elected in Kentucky, New Jersey and Virginia. Mississippi is the only other state electing a governor but the winner of the Democratic primary, Atty. Gen. J. P. Coleman, is unopposed.

Ford Motor Co. Will Sell Stock To Public In Change Of Half Century Financing

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock of the Ford Motor Co., which revolutionized America with its mass production methods, is to be sold to the public after the first of the year.

The price and precise timing have not yet been set, but nearly seven million new common shares with voting rights will be offered. Financial analysts say it is expected to bring between 400 and 500 million dollars, indicating a price of \$80 to \$70 a share.

Announcement that Ford, richest private business enterprise in the world, would desert the ranks of family-owned firms, was made last night. It came from the Ford Foundation, multi-million-dollar philanthropic trust set up by Henry Ford, who died in 1947.

The new stock will be offered by the Ford Foundation — not by the company.

Henry Ford II, grandson of the founder and president of the Ford Co., has agreed with other Ford heirs to transfer 60 per cent of their exclusive voting control of the company to the new common stock, was reported by H. Rowan Gathers Jr., Foundation president.

The other 40 per cent of voting rights will remain with the Ford family.

With the public sale of its stock, the company will have to disclose for the first time its assets and earnings, one of its most carefully guarded secrets for 52½ years.

Only last Wednesday, Ernest R. Breech, Ford board chairman, declared the company's 1955 earnings, before taxes, would surpass the firm's total earnings for the 21 years before World War II. Neither figure was revealed, however.

One reason for the decision to let the public share in the company ownership and control is that no one pushed sale of new products with more zest than an enthusiastic shareholder. Ford management may have had that in mind when it agreed to reversal of the private ownership credo of founder Henry Ford.

Directorate Issue Due For Sanitary Dist. Vote

Voters in the North Roseburg Sanitary District on Dec. 5 are to decide whether the district will have a five-man board of directors to replace the present three-member body, according to Howard Harris, manager.

Harris said either one or three directors also will be elected on that date, depending on whether the board change is authorized. Deadline for petitions for director or will be at 5 p.m. Nov. 24, he said, and he pointed out that no one has filed yet.

Should the board change be made, the two persons receiving the highest number of votes will be elected to three-year terms; the man with the third-highest vote being elected to a two-year term.

Otherwise, the man with the highest number of votes will be elected to a three-year term. Balloting will be in the district office on Alameda Street.

Harris said the proposed increase in the number of directors was authorized in the last legislative session.

Money Stolen From Car, Also From Skating Rink

A Roseburg woman reported to city police Sunday that a pocketbook containing \$20 in currency was stolen from her car while she was taking her mother to 1302 Fullerton St.

Police identified the victim as a Mrs. Cummins, 750 Ivan St. She said her children were sleeping in the car at the time.

About \$5 in change was taken from the Rolletta Skating Rink, Diamond Lake Boulevard, sometime after midnight Friday, E. C. Erickson, the proprietor, told Roseburg police Saturday.

Entry to the rink was made through a high window.

Dale Lander Reported Worse In Polio Attack

Dale Lander, the 26-year-old Roseburg appliance salesman who was stricken with polio last Tuesday, is getting progressively worse, according to his doctor at Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene.

Tuesday an impressive array of speakers and information sessions await OMCA members.

Three members of the Oregon State Highway Interim Committee will speak to motel owners at 9 a.m. They'll discuss Highway Legislation and Highway Problems. Committee members are Robert L. Elstrom, Salem, E. A. Lattrell, Medford, and Fred Meek, Portland.

Later in the morning at a combined session the group will discuss legal matters, legislation, reports and resolutions. They'll also elect officers and directors before adjourning to a 1 p.m. luncheon where Ray Conary, manager of the Oregon State Motor Assn. will comment on "Profitable Handling of Tourist Wants."

Drunk Driving Charge Jails Cecil A. Long

Cecil Arthur Long, 49, Mill Street, had to be forced to jail early Sunday morning after Roseburg police arrested him on a charge of driving while under the influence of liquor, officers said.

Long was stopped on Stephens Street near the northern city limits, police said, after he had been seen zig-zagging his car down the street and at one time forcing another car to head for the curb to avoid a collision.

Police said Long repeatedly tried to punch the arresting officers and kicked one of the policemen in the leg. He was to answer the drunk driving charge in municipal court today.

Marine Gets Life Term For Assaulting Girl, 7

NAHA, Okinawa (AP) — A U.S. Marine court martial Monday convicted Marine Pfc. Raymond E. Parker of raping a 7-year-old Okinawan girl and sentenced him to life imprisonment. The nine-man board of officers deliberated only 20 minutes to convict the 21-year-old Memphis, Tenn., negro.

Marland Theiss Victim Of Gun Held By Brother

Other Weekend Oregon Accidents Up Tragic Death Toll To Eight

A 14-year-old Canyonville boy, Marland Theiss, died in Forest Glen Hospital Sunday evening 10 minutes after being struck in the chest by a .22-caliber bullet accidentally fired by his brother, Ronald, 16.

Coroner L. L. Powers said Ronald and Marland were waiting outside a friend's home to meet the third boy, whose name wasn't learned, before going to the movies.

Ronald had a new holster for the .22 automatic pistol and was practicing drawing, according to Powers.

The gun fired, the bullet passing through Marland's right lung. Death apparently resulted from hemorrhaging, the coroner said.

Marland was rushed immediately to the hospital, only a block away, but the youngster died before he could be helped. The accident occurred at about 5:35 p.m., and Marland died at 6:05 p.m., Powers said.

The parents of the brothers are Mr. and Mrs. John Theiss. The shooting happened about three blocks from their home, the coroner said. Canyonville police investigated.

The body has been taken to Ganz Mortuary, Myrtle Creek. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Other Oregon Fatalities

Seven other deaths in Oregon accidents occurred over the weekend. These, as reported by the Associated Press, follow:

John A. O'Connor, 3, Lakeview; James B. Adams, 42, Idanha, and Jack Quinn, 17, Gresham, drowned in separate accidents.

The body of the O'Connor child, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sidney E. O'Connor, was found Sunday in a creek which runs past the family's home.

The winner in the regional quartet contest in Roseburg next May will also compete in the international contest. The Roseburg Chorus will also take part in the regional contest as the hosting chorus.

Horse Shot As Climax To Long-Standing Feud

A long-standing feud over control of livestock erupted with gunfire early this morning, resulting in the death of a horse on the George Michaux property just south of Roseburg.

Sheriff Ira C. Byrd said Michaux shot one of three horses belonging to W. B. Glenn of Winston, who owns property next to Michaux' at the end of Booth Street southeast of Nielsen's Market.

The horse was hit in the right shoulder and later had to be killed by a veterinarian.

Byrd said Michaux told him he heard noises in his garage about 4 a.m. He first thought prowlers were in the garage, where feed is kept for his own horses.

Michaux said he tried to chase three horses away, then shot one with his 30-30 rifle. The sheriff said Michaux and Glenn have been having difficulty for some time over control of livestock. Apparently Glenn's horses went through a fence and made their way to Michaux' garage, the sheriff said.
