

Four Children Are Asphyxiated By Monoxide Gas

BECKLEY, W.Va. (AP)—Four children were asphyxiated Saturday apparently by carbon monoxide from the family car after their father went to the basement garage to listen to a football game on the auto radio.

In critical condition, hospital attendants said, were William F. Watts, Jr., 37, a Beckley insurance agent, and his wife, June Hamilton Watts, 29.

Asphyxiated by carbon monoxide fumes, the hospital said, were the couple's four children: Roberta 6; William Jr., 3; Mary Beth, 2; and Michael, 1.

A fire department rescue squad said the children apparently had been dead about four hours when they arrived. Three were in their beds, the fourth on the dining room floor.

Mrs. Watts told hospital attendants her husband was listening to the broadcast of a football game last night when the radio failed. He went to the basement to hear the remainder of the game.

Others in the family went to bed. Mrs. Watts said she did not awaken until she fell out of bed Saturday morning.

The rescue squad reported the car's engine was not running when they arrived, but the ignition key was on, the gasoline tank was empty, and the battery was dead.

Average Young Man Said To Be Soft Physically

PUEBLO, Colo. (AP)—The average young man entering the U.S. Air Force Academy is soft physically, its commandant said here.

Brig. Gen. Robert M. Stillman told a high school assembly that "We are getting young men at the Air Academy who cannot even do one chin-up, who cannot do four or five sit-ups."

He appealed for his teen-age listeners to spend less time in front of a television set and more time in outdoor games.

"The physical condition of the European boys," he said, "is three times as strong as that of American boys. The American people are becoming exceedingly soft."

"I'm not trying to run down our boys. I want to make you realize that we are getting soft to the point of losing our initiative and drive. Poor physical aptitude means less chance for success."

Postal Inspectors Reveal Huge Swindle Of Executive

NEW YORK (AP)—Postal inspectors have uncovered an imaginative swindle which they said cost a 77-year-old Rochester, N.Y. industrialist \$423,771 over the past four years.

The scheme was disclosed Friday following the arrest of Patrick H. Lennon, 50, of New York. Authorities said he was an ex-convict and "one of the slickest confidence men picked up in a long, long time."

Lennon was described by post office men as the principal figure in a swindle in which the victim was baited by the hope of collecting millions on bogus patents left over from a firm that fell in the stock market crash of 1929.

Also arrested in the case was Leo F. Hampton, 74, New York. Like Lennon, he was charged with mail fraud.

Postal authorities said more arrests would follow, including a woman who posed as Lennon's secretary.

The victim was identified as Augustine J. Cunningham, president of a Rochester firm that manufactures plumbing and electrical equipment. The company was founded 116 years ago by Cunningham's grandfather.

The inspectors said this is how the swindle worked:

Cunningham, who had lost \$100,000 when the Intercity Radio and Telegraph Co. collapsed in 1929, was approached by one of a group posing as beneficiaries of a will left by a scientist who they said had been connected with Intercity.

The swindlers told Cunningham he was also named in Dr. Randolph Parker's will and with them was heir to electronic patents on

which 60 million dollars could be collected from the radio, television and movie industries. Parker's name is believed to be as fictitious as the will and the rights.

Cunningham was persuaded to help the group buy up releases from stockholders of the defunct company in order to retain all benefits from the patents for themselves.

The swindle was discovered after Cunningham's banker noticed his large withdrawals and urged him to check on the deal. Since some of Cunningham's payments were made by mail, he reported the case to postal authorities.

Lennon was released on \$20,000 bail and faces removal to Rochester.

Hampton, whose arrest was made about 10 days ago at Newark, N.J. airport, was being held in default of \$20,000 bail.

McKay Says Postoffice Not Of Monument Status

PORTLAND (AP)—Interior Secretary McKay does not believe Portland's Pioneer postoffice qualifies to be included as a national monument under the federal park system.

The government recently announced it plans to dispose of the building.

McKay expressed belief that lack of events of national significance connected with the site would disqualify it for consideration as a national monument.

Dwight D. Eisenhower was the first U.S. President to appear on television.

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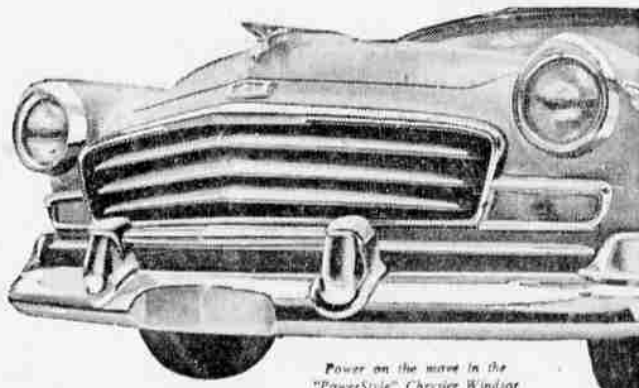
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
