Two months ago the mid-November date between Oregon State and California figured to be only another football game in the Pacific Coast Conference, but Monday it added up to the top clash on the Saturday West Coast menu.

The boisterous Beavers, riding high in the Rose Bowl race, are in undisputed possession of second place in PCC standings. And California, kicked around by everybody, looms suddenly as a possible spoiler with the sudden discovery of a twin touchdown punch.

The year-long upset wave rolled higher than usual throughout the conference last Saturday to produce the unique situation in the standings.

Stanford Downs USC

Two favorites toppled in the top-heavy derby — and the victim was proud Southern California. The Trojans, who figured all year to decide the championship in their Nov. 19 clash with UCLA, were dumped unceremoniously by Stanford, 28-20, as the up-and-down Indians reached the peak.

Dropped also was Washington, victim of Cal's tiny Don Smith and Nat Brazil, 20-6. The Huskies, once the conference darkhorse, have failed to win a game since their upset of USC five weeks ago.

The rest of last week's slate ran off on schedule. Oregon State racked up a 33-14 win over Idaho, Oregon belted Washington State, 35-0, and UCLA clobbered College of the Pacific, 34-0, to become the nation's top scoring team.

Oregon Meets Indians

Only two other PCC games, in addition to the Oregon State-California clash at Berkeley, are on the nation's top scoring team.

3 Major Grid Powers Still Among Unbeaten

NEW YORK — There still are 29 unbeaten, untied college football teams in the nation, but only three of them—Maryland, Oklahoma and West Virginia—are rated as major outfits.

Maryland has a perfect record in eight games and Oklahoma and West Virginia in seven each. The majors lost one member last Saturday when Illinois defeated Michigan 25-6.

The list includes Idaho State with eight wins and Whitworth of Spokane with six.

this week's program. Washington travels to UCLA and the Bruins can be counted upon to shoot the works while Oregon visits Stanford where the Indians are likely to remain right on the warpath.

Rounding out the schedule are non-conference contests between Washington State and San Jose State at Pullman and Idaho and Brigham Young at Provo, Utah. Southern Cal, perhaps fortunately, draws an open date.

Cal's toppling of Washington was the surprise of the week.

The Bears, completely clueless in the past, discovered midget half-backs Smith and Brazil behind a pile of equipment bags and the two ran the Huskies ragged.

Backs Total 285 Pounds
The pair together weigh 285 pounds—Smith 143, Brazil 142—only a smidgeon less than Husky tackle Fred Robinson, but they had the mookie to get the business done for the Bears' initial PCC win.

John Brodie was the big man in Stanford's triumph. The 188-pound quarter-back passed the Trojans silly with 14 completions for 216 yards. The triumph was the Indians' first in conference play and eliminated USC completely from the championship race.

UCLA turned loose three tail-backs—Sam Brown, Ronnie Knox and Gerry McDougall—to wreck COP's vaulted line and roll up its easy victory. The Bruins now need only to beat Washington and USC to repeat as PCC champs and move into the Rose Bowl.

One loss, though, could ruin the Bruins. They play only six conference games to Oregon State's seven and Beaver triumphs in their remaining two tilts could give them the consolation if UCLA stumbles.

Fish, Wildlife Service Destroys 1 1/2 Million Carp

PORTLAND — U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service crews wiped out some 1 1/2 million carp, weighing about 10 million pounds, in Malheur Lake and tributary systems in Eastern Oregon, Leo Laythe, regional director, said Saturday.

The project was paid for with \$37,500 made available from Interior Department refuge funds, he said.

Laythe explained that the project, centering in the Malheur National Wildlife Refuge near Burns, was necessary to improve food conditions for waterfowl. He said the carp were impairing water vegetation needed by waterfowl for food and nesting cover.

To kill the carp, rotenone was dumped in 12,000 acres of water in Malheur Lake, as well as Boca Lake and parts of the Blitzen and Silvies river systems.

Minor Leagues Eye Limits On Radio, TV Broadcasts

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Minor league baseball, faced with dwindling attendance, is ready to renew its plea that the majors "stay in your own backyard" with game broadcasts and telecasts.

The broadcast restrictions have been approved several times by the smaller leagues at their annual convention, but each time have been voted down by the majors. There are no limitations now.

The radio and telecast question is just one of 16 proposed amendments to the major-minor agreement to be considered in executive session here Dec. 1 at the annual convention of the National Assn. of Professional Baseball Leagues.

Submitted for action by president George M. Trautman of the minors, the executive committee and the radio-TV committee, the delegates are expected to give hearty approval of the curb on broadcasts, but the majors may vote it down at their meeting in Chicago the following week.

Limitations Proposed

The proposal would forbid sponsored broadcasts from stations outside a 75-mile radius of the game site.

Another proposal, by the Atlanta, Ga., club, asks that all clubs (major and minor) be forced to pare down to the player limit by opening day, instead of 30 days later, and that it remain in effect the entire season instead of ending 20 days before the season's close.

The move, if adopted, would spread skilled players more evenly and allow the minor league clubs to be "set" a month earlier.

6 Major Bowl Berths Still Open After Grid Weekend

The bowl selectors, who should stand in bed for all they learned last Saturday, take another look at the somewhat curdled cream of the hopefuls this Saturday as college football takes a crack at determining conference championships.

At least six major bowl berths are open, with the Cotton, Sugar and Gator Bowl committees still unsure who they'll wind up with. And after Illinois bounced Michigan from the unopened - untied ranks 25-6 last Saturday, the Rose Bowl can't print tickets yet, either.

Time was when it looked like Michigan vs. UCLA at Pasadena. The Uclans still are going strong after shelling College of the Pacific 34-0 in a non-league game Saturday, but now Michigan State, beaten only by Michigan, has poked into the Big 10 picture. It looks like the Big 10 choice hinges on the Nov. 19 showdown between Ohio State and Michigan.

Ohio State, the current leader, is ineligible to return to the Rose Bowl even if it repeats as Big 10 champ. With Michigan playing weak sister Indiana this weekend, Michigan State has to smack Minnesota and hope for an Ohio State victory next week since the Spartans play one less game than Michigan.

Maryland, teamed with Oklahoma and West Virginia as the last of the major unbeaten-untied teams, can settle a bowl and title "question" Saturday by beating Clemson. Actually, there's little question the Terps, who made Louisiana State their 13th straight victim last weekend 13-0, can take the Clemson, the Atlantic Coast Conference title and the Orange Bowl berth in one easy sweep.

Sooners Orange Shoo-in
Oklahoma fills the other half of the Orange Bowl bill, after being awarded the Big 7 Conference crown before the season even opened. Nebraska is the lone "threat" to the Sooners and the Huskers may be shaken by Colorado this week while Oklahoma makes Iowa State its 27th straight victim. Nebraska beat Iowa State 10-7 while Oklahoma was banking Missouri 20-0 last Saturday.

West Virginia comes in for another look by the bowl selectors Saturday against Pitt. The Mountaineers won their third straight Southern Conference crown last weekend, but they have left the selectors skeptical in their mere 13-7 decision over George Washington.

Roseburg's first really big tournament got under way last Saturday night with two squads of local teams, followed by minor events yesterday. We can't give you any official figures here, on account of we're writing this before it happens. But you will find the scores elsewhere in the paper.

The only figures which we can give you, and which are only semi-official, are the number of entries, which are surprisingly large considering many facts. A more these facts, the most important is that it is just the beginning of a series of annual tournaments. And from what we hear from those with much experience in promoting tournaments, the first 100 years are the toughest.

ANOTHER FACT is that Eugene, Salem and Portland, which might have sent much larger delegations, were all having their city tournaments or were promoting them for the very near future, which gave us stiff competition.
