

U. N. Supervisor Thinks Arab Dispute Not War

LONDON (AP)—Maj. Gen. E. L. M. Burns, U. N. truce supervisor in Palestine, said Saturday he did not believe "the Israeli-Arab dispute will grow into full-scale war."

Burns made the statement to reporters at the airport as he boarded a plane for Jerusalem. He has been conferring with British diplomats in London on his way back to the troubled Middle East from U. N. headquarters in New York, where he reported on the tense Israeli-Arab border situation.

"I think there is a fair chance of getting a pause in the fighting to enable the situation to be stabilized," Burns said. "I don't think the Israeli-Arab dispute will grow into a full-scale war. It is possible but my guess is that it is not likely to happen."

Clashes along the demarcation line brought a demand in London Saturday that the British stop supplying arms to Egypt.

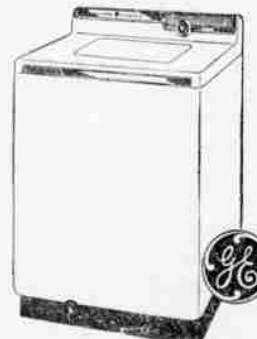
