Man Isn't Worried About New Sentence

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — A Texas convict, Jesse B. Montague, yesterday was sentenced to six months for collecting a tax refund on a mythical income but he isn't worried.

The judge specified he can serve his term for making a fraudulent income report along with the 25 years he's doing for robbery.

The Internal Revenue Bureau sent Montague a \$195.80 check in care of the State Prison as an 1951-1952 income tax refund.

U. S. Judge Allen B. Hamann heard the case.

Defense Atty. Jimmie Duncan argued that reference to Montague's imprisonment would prejudice the jury. The judge agreed.

Asst. U. S. Atty. Edgar O. Botler couldn't produce the income tax returns which were lost in a fire.

Duncan argued Montague's confession shouldn't be presented, the judge disagreed. The jury convicted Montague.

Montgomery Says Ike Is Very Valuable Man

DENVER (AP) — Field Marshal Viscount Bernard Montgomery visited President Eisenhower at the hospital Saturday and said afterwards that "Ike is a very valuable man in the world today" in the struggle against communism.

But the British official declined to say whether he thinks the President, recuperating from a heart attack, should run for a second term.

"That is entirely a matter for him to decide and we did not discuss that," Montgomery told a news conference.

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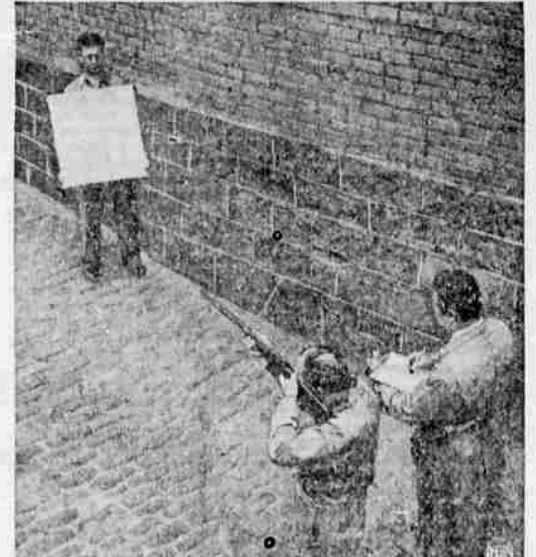

Mrs. Cornett said she had not decided yet whether she will try again for the office.

Mrs. Oscar Kittridge, Klamath Falls, who also has been mentioned as a possible candidate for the post, reported that she has not yet decided whether she will seek the office.

Snaggled-Tooth Cherubs Group Formed At School

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — The only requirement for membership in a new club of second graders at the Lafayette Grade School is loss of two or three front teeth.

The organization, complete with officers and a club song, is known as the Snaggled-Toothed Cherub Club. It was formed by Mrs. Grace Cochran, teacher of the 7-year-olds.

She says the main aim is to teach children good dental care and general health practices. Instructional material is compiled on how to clean teeth and the proper foods to eat to protect new ones.

Mrs. Cochran says she knows from experience that all 39 of her pupils soon will be members.

"We keep adding names as they lose teeth," she said.

The youngsters wrote their own song:

"We're the Snaggled-Toothed Cherubs—
We've lost on tooth or three—
"We laugh and lip
"Since our teeth we have missed
"Snaggled-tooth cherubs are we."

Principal Wade Davenport, pleased with the new club, commented, "I think they'd pull teeth to get into it." But nature makes that unnecessary.

Mrs. Cochran says the No. 1 lesson is: "Regardless of what you eat, the baby teeth come out, but if you eat an adequate diet and take care of your teeth, the new ones will 'come in strong and pretty'."

"Every year I get these little snaggled-toothed things," Mrs. Cochran said, "and I love them so."

"It's just a sideline," she explained. "When you have 39 of them, you have to keep a sideline going to keep it interesting. And I think they all love school."

October Unemployment Down 9,300 From '54

SALEM (AP) — Oregon had 21,100 unemployed persons last month, or 9,300 fewer than a year earlier, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission estimated Friday.

The total was 5,000 more than in September.

Heavy rains and mountain snows caused the increase.

Payments to jobless workers totaled \$492,964. That was 3 percent more than in September, but only half of the total a year ago.

There have been 31,983 claimants since July 1, compared with 50,038 in the similar period of last year.

100 Are Injured In Effort To Halt Air Base Survey

SUNAKAWA, Japan (AP) — About 100 persons were injured Saturday, some seriously, in a wild melee between Japanese police and screaming villagers and labor unionists trying to halt surveying for a U.S. airbase expansion.

Twelve hundred steel-helmeted police pushed through about the same number of rock-throwing, mop-waving demonstrators and advanced into fields the farmers had smeared with human waste to block the survey.

Behind them came 28 surveyors who then completed all but about one week's remaining work on plotting runway extensions to permit U.S. jets to land at nearby Tachikawa Air Base. The Japanese government promised the United States it would make the extensions.

Incomplete reports said about 60 policemen and 40 demonstrators were hurt and some will need almost a month to recover from serious blows received in the pushing, tugging, and rock-throwing. The police did not use their arms.

Woman demonstrators stood by with straw mops dripping human waste in an effort to make the police turn back.

Just as in September, when the first surveys were made, the police used restraint and refused to be goaded into violence.

Surveyors were turned back three times earlier this week.

Consumer Said Forgotten Man

DETROIT (AP) — "The American consumer is the 'forgotten man' in the nation's economy," CIO president Walter P. Reuther said recently in a plea for "industrial statesmanship to lead America down the road to lower prices."

Reuther said in a speech before the Aircraft Club of Detroit that automatic price increases following negotiated wage boosts have "left the consumer with the short end of the deal."

"With profits at unbelievable heights, industry ought to be willing to demonstrate industrial statesmanship to lead America down the road to lower prices, bigger markets and more prosperity," Reuther said.

"I personally believe that Ford and General Motors are in the most favorable economic position to take the first step in a substantial reduction in the price of their cars," he said.

Both General Motors and Ford declined comment on Reuther's suggestion they cut automobile prices.

Jaycees Planning Another 'Voice' Essay Contest

Plans to conduct another annual community-wide "Voice of America" contest among high school pupils, was announced today by Junior Chamber of Commerce President Robert Tripodi.

"Voice of America" is a writing and oral competition in which high school pupils consider, write and speak on a subject of democratic fundamentals which have made America great. Contest entries are judged according to content, delivery and originality of five-minute scripts. The subject is titled "I Speak for Democracy."

This is the ninth year the contest has been sponsored on a national basis.

Eligible are pupils in the 10th, 11th and 12th grades. President Tripodi urged all those eligible to enter. The local winner will be entered in the state contest to vie for honors and awards, including a television set.

Four national winners, selected from state entries, will receive expense-paid trips to Washington, D. C., during the week of Washington's birthday. While there, they will be received by the President, members of Congress and other top-level government officials. Each will get a \$500 scholarship check.

Contest rules are now being made available to four high schools, Tripodi said. They are: Glendale, Douglas, Myrtle Creek and Roseburg.

U. S. Warned To Keep Ahead Of Foreign Planes

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) — The U.S. deputy chief of naval operations says the United States must exert its "maximum effort" to keep ahead of foreign aircraft engineers.

Vice Admiral Thomas S. Combs Friday addressed a group of 650 military officials, engineers and politicians at the dedication of a 41-million dollar naval air turbine test station at West Trenton.

Combs said:

"During these times fraught with uncertainty, it is required that the United States retain supremacy in the air, in the interests of our national security."

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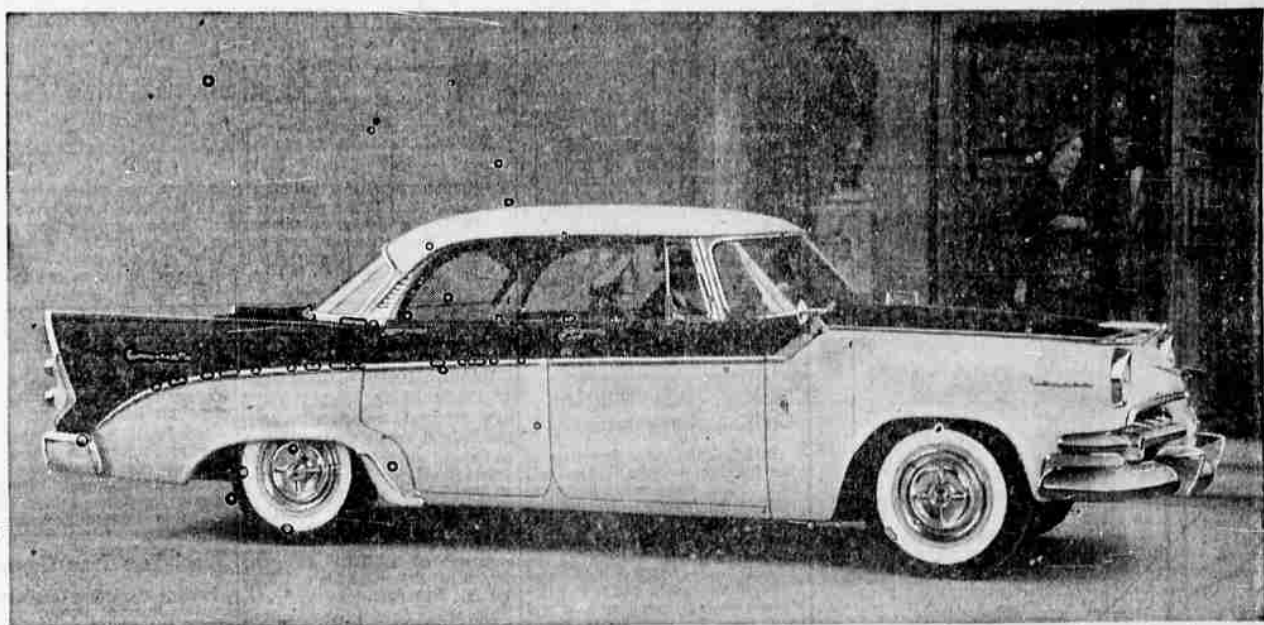
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
