Chevrolet Gets All Year Business On Oregon Autos

SALEM (AP) — The state of Oregon will buy \$400,000 worth of Chevrolet cars in the next year, giving that company all of its automobile and light truck business.

The State Department of Finance and Administration announced that General Motors' Chevrolet division submitted low bids on all classes for 500 vehicles, with the state having the option to buy an additional 150 if it needs them.

It is the first time that the state has accepted bids for a whole year's business. In the past, bids have been called for a few cars at a time.

The prices the state will have to pay range from \$1,105 for business coupes to \$1,612 for 4-door station wagons. Four-door sedans will cost \$1,205.

General Motors was the only firm that bid direct from the factory. Five Oregon automobile dealers also bid.

The other bidders were Valley Motor Co., Salem; Oregon City Motor Co., Oregon City; Stan Baker Motors, Salem; Francis Motor Car Co., Portland; and International Harvester Co., Portland.

Great Masters' Paintings Slated For Oregon Show

PORTLAND (AP) — One hundred paintings from the collection of Walter P. Chrysler Jr. will be shown in Portland early next year and then taken on a tour of the United States and Europe.

The paintings, the work of 16th to 20th century masters, will be shown in Portland from March 3 to April 15.

Thomas C. Colt Jr., director of the Portland Art Museum, suggested the tour to Chrysler in 1951. Colt had become acquainted with the collection while he was director of the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts in 1941.

Among the works to be shown are those of Rubens, Rembrandt, Van Dyck, Gainsborough, Romney, Titian, Poussin, Chardin, Gercault, Goya, Corot, Renoir, Van Gogh, Cezanne, Matisse and Picasso.

Top Surgeon Says Salk Shots Cut Paralysis Threat

WASHINGTON (AP) — Surgeon General Leonard Scheele said Monday that results of using Salk polio vaccine this year "give strong evidence that children who receive even one dose were substantially protected against paralytic polio."

"Preliminary data show," he added, "that paralytic attack rates in vaccinated children have been lower by 67 to 90 per cent than in unvaccinated children of the same ages."

He gave the appraisal in an address prepared for the 62nd annual convention of the Assn. of Military Surgeons of the United States.

He predicted the eventual elimination of paralytic polio as "another triumph of preventive medicine and public health," which he said have made progress also against other diseases.

"It would seem then," he added, "that in another generation—two or three decades hence—the population of the United States could be as free of venereal disease, tuberculosis, paralytic poliomyelitis, rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease, and the complications of streptococcal infections as it is today from smallpox, typhoid fever, yellow fever and malaria."

MP To Spend Millions For New Street In '56

SEATTLE (AP) — The Northern Pacific Railway is planning to spend 33 million dollars for new equipment and improvements next year, Robert S. Macfarlane, president, said Monday.

The total includes \$12,500,000 for diesel locomotives and 1 million for 1,000 box cars. Other purchases will include 500 oil cars and 100 mechanical refrigerators cars, Macfarlane said.

At a Seattle Transportation Club luncheon, Macfarlane urged an increase in retail charges on bus fare as a practical step toward meeting the cost shortage problem.

The present fare is 45¢ a day. Macfarlane did not suggest a new figure.

Western States Unite On Transport Truck Text

SALEM (AP) — Nine Western states have signed an agreement under which they would tax each other's transport trucks on the basis of the mileage they travel.

These states have been operating under a reciprocity agreement under which the states permitted out-of-state trucks to operate within their boundaries without payment of fees.

The agreement, signed in Denver over the weekend, involves Oregon, Washington, California, Montana, Idaho, New Mexico, Nevada, Colorado and Kansas.

Newly predicted the plan would become nationwide in the next two years.

Kidnap-Killing Trial Of Burton Abbott Opens

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Burton W. Abbott, freshly shaved and newly dressed, was placed on trial Monday as the accused kidnap-killer of Stephen Drury, 14.
