Consultant Nurse Explains Civil Defense Agency Role At Nurses Assn. Meeting

The consultant nurse of the Oregon State Civil Defense Agency, Mrs. Nova B. Young of Salem, was in Roseburg Wednesday to acquaint nurses with the "implications of national disaster."

Mrs. Young was special guest speaker at a meeting of the District 11 chapter of the Oregon Nurses Assn.

"Purpose of her visit was to tell nurses of their responsibility during a natural or man-made disaster. The next step, she pointed out is up to local residents."

The state-wide civil defense program has "good paper plans," Mrs. Young said. Some counties have soared ahead in assigning people to work teams. She cited Josephine County as one that was well organized.

Nurses work under the direction of a county civil defense medical director appointed by the county defense director. In Douglas County Gen. J. T. Pierce is that director, and Dr. E. J. Waincott, as

Adm. Burke Sees Submarines As Biggest Threat

BOSTON (AP) — Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Arleigh A. Burke says submarine launched weapons "tipped with atomic warheads" could constitute a threat to our coastal areas, to our port cities and to our sea lanes.

Burke spoke here at the commissioning of the USS Forrest Sherman, a new type destroyer which he called "the U. S. Navy's latest submarine killer."

He said one of the Navy's foremost challenges today comes from the submarine.

"The submarine is becoming more versatile than she has ever been," he said. "Today's Submarines are capable of laying many types of mines, landing commandos, fueling and arming seaplanes; they are capable of launching torpedoes and guided missiles."

"Nuclear-powered submarines provide even a much greater threat for they have increased speed and range and staying power. They are tougher to find and tougher to kill."

Burke described the Forrest Sherman like this:

"She has the very latest equipment to detect, to pinpoint and kill the submarine. She is more livable and she is more deadly than her World War II predecessors."

"Antisubmarine warfare is only one of the many missions that this ship is prepared to accomplish. She is prepared to kill enemy aircraft and destroy surface raiders."

"She is truly the workhorse of the fleet."

Local Teachers Have Fine Profession Service Marks

A common belief that teachers nowadays don't remain in the field is knocked asunder by many instructors in District 4, Roseburg.

For example, the 10 men and women with longest teaching records tote up an impressive combined 284 years of public service. All their years have not been spent locally.

This week, as the nation observes National Education Week, a quick check with local administrators unveiled the fact that a Benson teacher, Miss Florence Snedaker, has been longest in the profession.

Miss Snedaker first taught 32 years ago in Linn County. Twenty-eight years ago she came to District 4.

After several years at Rose School, she transferred to Benson, where she's been since 1942. Currently, she works with second graders, but she has taught other grades.

The sandy-haired little woman this week said she'd want to do anything else. "Ever since I was in the fourth grade, I wanted to be a teacher." And she achieved her ambition.

Her principal, Robert McKee, says she is "one of our fine teachers. We're very happy to have her on our staff."

Rose School Principal Eli Hall has 29 years in teaching. Mrs. Alvia Wetherell, Benson, chalks up 28 years as a teacher. High school instructor and FFA Advisor Homer Grow has taught for 27 years. Joseph Lane Principal R. R. Brand has a quarter century in the profession. And Miss Ina Farnsworth, Benson, has notched up 22 years of instruction.
