

Officials Split Over New Funds For Middle East

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Eisenhower administration began drafting its new foreign aid program Wednesday with officials apparently split over whether to step up spending in the strategic Middle East.

The disagreement came to the fore as foreign aid and Budget Bureau representatives met to start working on fund requests to Congress next year.

Some top officials are reported to favor such a hike in spending in order to compete more effectively with what they regard as a major Soviet drive to extend Communist influence in the area.

Communist arms sales to Egypt, accompanied by offers of economic assistance, they believe, foreshadow similar Soviet aid to other Middle East nations, especially Arab countries.

Opposing this view are officials who would keep American military and economic assistance at about the same level as this year—some \$300 million.

These officials argue it would be foolish to increase American spending in this area substantially at a time when Arab-Israeli clashes make long-range planning risky.

The rumors have persisted since the 500-acre former Walton Mill site on Fidalgo Island, was reported as being up for sale.

Clyde Walton of Everett said no deal has been made for the mill site and that he does not know of any in prospect.

Liquor Stores To Close Friday, Veterans Day

State liquor stores and agencies in Douglas County will be closed Friday in observance of Veterans Day, a legal holiday.
