tary trial after being discharged. Captured by the Communists in Korea, they refused repatriation when the fighting ended. After 18 months in Red China, they changed their minds, asking repatriation. They returned to this country last July.

They flew to Portland Thursday for the church speeches. Davis said he was paying for the trip to Portland.

The three said they were coerced by the Reds into staying in China. Asked about their statements in China that they willingly accepted communism, Cowart said, "Nobody in Communist hands has a free choice about what he says."

Bell, whose wife lives in Olympia, said the Reds told him they would have Communists in this country kill her unless he stayed in China.

They also told him he had been sentenced to death in this country, he said.

"This really hit me. I had a nervous breakdown. They put me in the psycho ward a couple of times. Then tension built up and I didn't know what to do."

"I figured I could get out for sure about that death sentence when I got to Panmunjom. Then they told me 'if you go over there (to the explanation tent) and find out there really is a death sentence waiting for you, and if then you come back to us, we'll give you a death sentence.'"

"Then they told me my wife already was on her way to China. So I stayed. It wasn't for seven months that I really found out they'd lied about all of it," Bell said.

Griggs told of their plan to team in writing a book about their experiences. He also said he was thinking of becoming a church missionary.

Griggs said he was not surprised at the court verdict that freed them.

"This is a democracy, after all," he said.

The President wore a camel's hair top coat and a brown hat.

Standing on the sixth step of the ramp, he spoke simply and with no word about any major domestic or foreign policy.

"Again, it is time for Mrs. Eisenhower and me to say goodbye," he began.

"We leave under somewhat unusual circumstances this time."

He then paid the medical staff, nurses, corporals, enlisted men and others at Fitzsimons Hospital "my very grateful thanks."

"They have done so much," the President added.

The crowd around the airport was chilled to the bone by the time the President left as the temperature dropped from 36 degrees at 8:30 a.m. to 31 degrees 30 minutes later.

A crowd of several thousand persons turned out to bid farewell to the beaming President along the six-mile drive from the hospital to the air strip.

PHOTO TIPS

Photography with flash lamps, since its introduction in 1930, has grown to such large proportions that it is difficult to find a camera today without provision for its use.

As common as the flash lamp now is, it often seems that the major difference between a flash and sunlight photography is not realized. Light reaching the subject from a flash lamp varies according to its distance.

If the flash is too close, too much light falls on the subject, causing overexposure. Conversely, if it is too far away, insufficient light reaches the scene and underexposure results. Whether the flash lamp is too near or too far depends on lamp size, film, and camera settings. Instruction booklets for fixed-focus cameras list bulb distances for these variables and they should be adhered to if good results are to be had.

Proper settings for cameras with adjustable lenses can be found by the use of guide numbers listed on bulb cartons and by film manufacturers. There is a guide number for each bulb-film-shutter speed combination which is simply divided by the f-stop to obtain the bulb distance, or else divided by the distance to obtain the f-stop.

If your flash pictures are consistently light or dark, chances are that by paying closer attention to distance, you will be rewarded with an improvement of quality in your photographs.

No other items extend the scope of a camera as much as flash. Whether or not you are now using it, we would enjoy discussing with you the wider photographic horizons made possible by its use.

Farewell Party Ends In Death For Group Of Six

GLENCOE, Minn. (AP)—An impromptu farewell party for a youth group going into the service Monday ended in death for the six teen-aged participants Thursday night when their car was struck by a Milwaukee Road passenger train.

The crash came at the depot crossing in little Plato, a community of about 250, five miles east of Glencoe.

Sheriff Leon Odegaard of MeLeod County said the car was so badly smashed "I doubt if a junk yard would want it."

He reported bits of metal and the broken bodies of the four boys and two girl victims were scattered over 250 yards along the tracks. Frank Webster, engineer on the train, estimated it was traveling from 70 to 75 miles an hour.

Assessor Explains Equalization Efforts To Roseburg Lions

Assessor Morris Boxer discussed methods of assessments and efforts now under way to equalize the differential between real property, personal property and public utilities, in a talk before the Roseburg Lions Club Thursday night.

Real property has been assessed at 20 per cent of value, personal at 20 and utilities at 20, according to Boxer. This will gradually be changed until 1961 when all assessments are on the 20 per cent figure, he said.

Reminding that taxes paid are for services the public demands and that the amount of individual taxes depends upon individual property, the assessor reviewed briefly the history of taxation, and then traced the vast change in Douglas county since 1920, when property valuation was \$29 million.

While property valuation has gone up 200 per cent, taxation, in the meantime has gone up about 400 per cent, throwing the picture slightly out of balance.

The Lions are planning the sale of light bulbs in the city the latter part of next week to raise funds for their light conservation program. Edell Bryant is chairman in charge.

California Brush Fire Brought Under Control

VENTURA, Calif. (AP)—A brush fire that has blackened more than 18,000 acres in the Santa Monica Mountains in five days was brought under control early Friday except for a two-mile mountain-side front.

Hundreds of firemen from four counties fought for final victory over a blaze that has narrowly missed burning a number of luxurious ranch homes.

"If the wind comes up, no one knows how far this thing can go," said C. D. Little, Ventura County fire warden.

Salem-Portland Freeway Records First Fatality

SALEM (AP)—A collision on the new Portland-Salem freeway cost the life of Beatrice E. Newton, 84, of Salem Thursday night. It was the highway's first fatal mishap.

Newton was a passenger in a car driven by Glenn L. Adams, 74, Salem.

Police said that Adams started to make a left turn, discovered there was no exit, and his car stalled. It then was hit by a car driven by Lee Fred Gallegos of Woodburn.

Gallegos, who was not cited, suffered minor hurts. Adams appeared unharmed.

Baby Kidnap Will Go To Mental Institution

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Housewife Betty Jean Benedict will go to a state mental institution instead of standing trial for the kidnapping of a 2-day-old boy from a hospital here.

The 27-year-old Stockton, Calif., woman was declared insane Thursday by Judge John B. Molinari after four psychiatrists testified she is insane.

Mrs. Benedict had confessed she took the infant Sept. 19. Nine days later she telephoned the father, Dr. Sanford Marcus, to come to Stockton and recover his son.

Judge Molinari said Mrs. Benedict would have to stand trial for kidnapping if she regains her sanity.

Missing Elk Hunter's Body Found Near Ukiah

PENDLETON (AP)—The body of a missing elk hunter, Andrew J. Douglas, 59, Portland, was found seven miles south of Ukiah Thursday.

Coroner Pat Folsom tentatively blamed a heart attack. He said an autopsy indicated collapse of arteries near the heart.

Douglas had been expected to return from the trip Nov. 3. Fred L. Cornelius, 72, Portland, said at Portland he went on the trip with Douglas Oct. 27, but left the hunting camp after a quarrel Oct. 31.

PRISONERS EAT AGAIN

BOSTON (AP)—Sixteen hunger-striking state prison convicts were eating again Friday after quitting their two-day fast on the word of a prison official that "they could starve for all anybody cared."

The prisoners' quit eating Wednesday with the announcement that they wanted the State Correction Commission to go to the prison to hear their complaints.

contention that the plan would increase the risk of war because it would give countries information about each other's military establishments and therefore make surprise attack more easy.

To this Dulles replied that the Soviet Union "has ample information about the U. S. military establishment and the United States is not totally ignorant about the Soviet military establishment."

He declared "both of us know enough to attack each other and what is required is a deterrent to attack"—such as mutual aerial inspection.

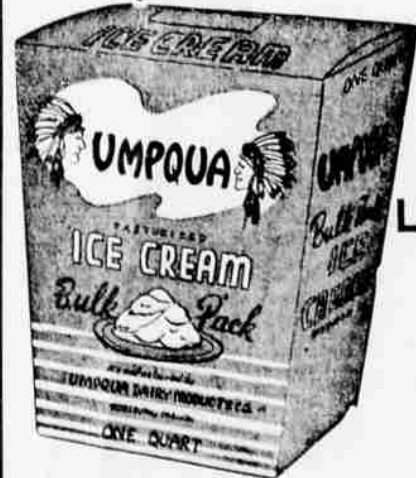
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
