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Three New Polio Cases Reported In Nyssa Area

Three new polio cases were reported in Eastern Oregon Thursday—one in the epidemic city of Nyssa and two at Umatilla. Those at Umatilla brought the total in Umatilla County to six in the past two weeks.

The new case at Nyssa was the fifth there since last week Thursday.

It was a 33-year-old Nyssa woman who was the latest stricken. She had not received gamma globulin at the recent clinic operated there to combat the outbreak which now has reached a total of 42 cases in Malheur County this year—32 of them in Nyssa.

There have also been three new cases reported at Payette, Idaho, across the river from Malheur County, this week and officials there expressed fear the epidemic might be swinging that way.

Idaho state health officials had joined with Oregon officials in the Nyssa gamma globulin immunization clinic, and Wednesday Dr. S. B. Osgood, Oregon state epidemiologist, said supplies of gamma globulin had been left with physicians for further use among those who had passed up the clinics.

At Pendleton, Dr. E. E. Berg, Umatilla County health officer, said gamma globulin was available from physicians in that area, too. He said that county had only three cases this year up until two weeks ago. The cases since then have been three at Umatilla, two in Pendleton and one in Milton-Freewater.

Lower Prices On Selection Of Meats Offered In Stores

Lower prices on a wide selection of meats will be offered by the nation's food stores this weekend.

Generally, beef and pork prices continue at around the lower levels reached in recent weeks. A number of stores will be offering smoked hams at marked down prices, and there will be specials on loins of pork, a favorite Sunday dinner item.

Chuck Roast will be cheaper in many markets and some will trim prices on round steak or roast, prime ribs and porterhouse steak. Frying chickens will be a popular feature, with unusually low prices posted in some areas. Legs of lamb will be widely advertised for the weekend. Here and there, you'll find lower prices on veal chops, pork chops and veal legs and shoulders.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture passed the word along this week that your Thanksgiving turkey will cost 2 to 6 cents a pound more this year than in 1954. The reasons: A smaller crop and later marketing. However, the USDA looks for a strong demand for the birds because of high incomes and growing population.

Foods in plentiful supply are usually reasonably priced. Here's the Department of Agriculture's list of such foods for this month: Pork, beef, broilers and fryers, turkeys, potatoes, cauliflower, rice, canned tuna, milk and dairy products, apples, dates, cranberries, grapes, winter pears, raisins, lard

and vegetable fats and oils. Egg prices generally will be lower this weekend, with reductions ranging from 1 to 4 cents a dozen. Butter shows little price change.

From the produce men comes word that beets, potatoes, onions, turnips, radishes and cabbage are outstanding buys this week. Rated as good buys are cauliflower, beans, red cabbage, peppers, iceberg lettuce, spinach, sweet potatoes and artichokes.

Some vegetables are higher than a week ago, including cucumbers, peas, carrots and tomatoes. Worthwhile buys in fruits, include oranges and grapefruit, avocados, apples (although they're a little higher), and grapes.

'Head Bolt Heaters' Offer Meet Diversion

FAIRBANKS (AP) — Talk about head bolt heaters provided minor diversion Wednesday at the constitutional convention.

Mildred Hermann, temporary chairman, read a note from University of Alaska President Ernest Patten that head bolt heaters would be available for delegates with automobiles.

Being from comparatively warm Juneau, she didn't know what a head bolt heater is—but northern delegates knew very well. It's a device attached to car engines to keep them operable in interior Alaska's cold weather. Outside the convention hall it was 16 below.

Eisenhower Says U. S. Won't Take Part In Race

DENVER (AP) — President Eisenhower said this week the United States does "not intend to contribute to an arms competition" in the Egyptian-Israeli fighting "because we do not think such a race would be in the true interest of any of the participants."

The President also said, however, that this country continues "willing to consider requests for arms needed for legitimate self defense."

Eisenhower's prepared statement was read at a news conference here by Herbert Hoover Jr., under-secretary of state, who said in reply to a question that the President's stated willingness to consider such requests left the way open for further study of Israel's request for arms.

Lumber Interest Merger Announced In Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — A lumber interests' merger announced here this week brought formation of Milton Lumber of Oregon Ltd., with headquarters except for sales at Milton-Freewater.

Southland Lumber owned by Park Lumber Co. of Portland, Milton Timber Corp. and Stalings Lumber Co. have disposed of their holdings to Winn, Shinn, Schneider & Co. of Eugene. This Eugene firm in turn has set up the new expanded program under the Milton name, in partnership with Jack Stalings.

Sales will be handled by Park Loading Co.
