worth of the ship or her cargo. The Yacoma headed for Astoria.

An Elk hunter, Ralph T. Kuhl, 56, of Tacoma, died when a wind-torn tree fell on the trailer in which he was sleeping 30 miles west of Yakima. Lester Monetti, a companion also from Tacoma, escaped.

Traffic accidents claimed the lives of John Downie, 16, Seattle; Marilyn Plumb, 23, Greenacres (Spokane County); and Mike J. Malicki, 32, Seattle.

Downie died when the jeep in which he was riding overturned in snow east of Enumclaw. Two others in the skiing party escaped serious injury.

Plumb was killed when in an auto-truck crash on an ice-slick highway in the Spokane Valley.

Malicki lost his life when the car in which he and two other men were riding skidded out of control and plunged into the Tyre River five miles east of Skykomish. The others escaped but Malicki was trapped in the car.

In Oregon, Rolfe F. Axley, 61, of Portland, was listed as an indirect victim of the weather. He died of a heart attack as he put chains on his car at Government Camp near Mt. Hood.

The opening concert of the Roseburg Symphony Orchestra's fifth season will be presented Tuesday, Nov. 29, in Central Junior High School.

Director Wendell Johnson said the program would feature two ballet sequences by dancers from the Ralph Patterson School of Dancing. The orchestra will accompany them in the selections: Two movements of the Vivaldi Concerto in D Minor and Alfred Newman's "Street Scene."

The dance numbers mark a departure in orchestra programming. Choreography is by Patterson, who will also be seen in the ballets.

The 1955-56 symphony season will feature three concerts. A second is slated for late February. It will include Mozart's Third Horn Concerto with French horn player Glen Garrett as soloist. The number will honor the 200 anniversary of the birth of Mozart.

A third concert in the spring will bring its audience a special double attraction: The winner of the orchestra's Young Artist Auditions and the Roseburg High School's capella choir.

The 1955-56 symphony group shows a slight increase in size. Some 40 Douglas County residents participate.

Ticket Chairman Mrs. Morris Bowker announced Saturday that the Roseburg Symphony Orchestra Society board of directors had voted to award a \$10 prize to any person selling 50 season tickets. 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First W. German Army Founded; Recruits Called

BONN, Germany — A new West German army was founded today.

Standing under a 10-foot replica of an Iron Cross — the ancient symbol of German military might — Defense Minister Theodor Blank handed callup papers to the first 101 volunteers for the 500,000 man force.

They were the first of the men who will be enrolled in the next three years into 12 army divisions, a 1,300-plane tactical air force and a coastal navy.

The Germans donned their new uniforms just over five years from the time Western allies decided to rearm West Germany to bolster the Atlantic Alliance against the threat of Russian aggression.

The men taking part in today's ceremony were the initial installment of 6,000 volunteers authorized by Parliament under temporary legislation. When detailed legislation has been passed, 150,000 volunteers will be enlisted as a permanent cadre. They will be the leaders, instructors and technicians to handle the 350,000 conscripts due to be drafted in 1956.

Blank said the new Wehrmacht had only peaceful aims — the establishment of security in a peaceful and united Europe.

Turncoats Say God Helped Them Escape Chinese

PORTLAND — Otto Bell, 21, and two other turncoat former prisoners of war, Friday night told an audience of 400 that God helped them escape from Communist China.

Speaking at a religious service at the Wings of Healing Temple here, Bell was applauded when he said he escaped 50 Chinese police officers in Peking after he had publicly criticized Communism. He said he turned a Chinese mob against the police.

William A. Cowart, 22, Dalton, Ga., and Lewis Griggs, 23, Jacksonville, Tex., also spoke.

Bell, a native of Hillsboro, Miss., was joined on the platform by his wife and little daughter, Paula.

Bell opened his talk with a plea that the audience "pray for prisoners of war behind bars who fought Communism and came home to be tried and put in jail while real Communists walk the street free."

Cowart, in his talk, quoted a White Russian in Peking as saying that "if General MacArthur had stayed in the war, we'd have been free too."

The three are to speak again Saturday and Sunday.

Child's Custody Will Be Determined By Court

HILLSBORO — The custody of a year-old boy, wanted both by his parents and the family that has had him since he was five days old, will be determined by next Wednesday.

Circuit Judge Harry M. Seabold said after a hearing here, he would make the decision by that date.

The parents are Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Casteele. The other family is that of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Remington, who testified the Casteeles offered them the child before he was born.

They took the boy and began adoption proceedings. But before final papers could be signed, the Casteeles asked to get the child back. The Casteeles got the boy back briefly, but he now is in custody of the Remingtons while the case is being decided.

Building Permit Totals Show Seasonal Decrease

Building permit totals for Roseburg dropped 10 per cent, from \$136,425 to \$123,095, between the months of September and October, according to a report from the Equitable Savings & Loan Assn. statistical department.

However, the total was up 32 per cent from the October 1954 total of \$85,395.

The drop from September followed a trend in the Northwest where dollar volume of building fell 16 per cent. The drop, however, was termed a "seasonal" decline. Total building in the Northwest reached \$24,249,953. For Oregon, the total was \$8,627,107, down 27 per cent from September.

Jobless Waiter Survives 65-Foot Fall To Patio

SAN FRANCISCO — "I don't want to just hurt myself. This is going to be a complete job. Here goes."

And with a scream, Warren K. (Kim) McCintock, a jobless waiter, plunged head-first from the roof of a three-story building to a concrete patio 65 feet below.

It wasn't a complete job. The 33-year-old man survived the fall Thursday, although he suffered critical injuries.

Policeman Peter Williams, a witness, said the jump apparently was the result of a quarrel with a neighbor.

Beck Would Oust Airlines Pilots

LOS ANGELES — Union leader Dave Beck said today he has voted to recommend that the AFL convention in New York next month suspend the AFL Air Line Pilots Assn.

But the AFL Teamster president and AFL executive council member said he has not been informed of the result of a telegraphic poll taken among executive council members.

The AFL Flight Engineers have been on a strike for about three weeks against United Airlines, protesting a company policy of hiring only engineers with pilot experience.

"I think it is a vicious thing the way these airline pilots are taking the jobs of flight engineers," Beck told a newsman.

Beck said he has written all teamster locals and urged them to support "in all ways possible" the strike against United Airlines.

"The Teamsters have loaned \$500,000 to the striking union," he said, "and are prepared to loan a million dollars if necessary."

Yoncalla School Census Shows Increase in '55

The Yoncalla school census this year shows an increase of 18 children over last year in the age group of 4 through 19 years, reports correspondent Mrs. George Edes.

The district clerk reports the total was 302 children, including 241 boys and 261 girls. This year, the enumerating Yoncalla Parent-Teachers Assn. established an individual card system for each child for greater accuracy and ease in consolidating the results.

Protest Rally Draws 700 To Church In Portland

PORTLAND — A "protest rally" drew an estimated 700 persons to the Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church here Thursday night to hear the Rev. Moses Wright and others tell of the kidnapping and death of Emmett Till, a 14-year-old Chicago Negro, who was killed in Mississippi where he was visiting his uncle, the Rev. Mr. Wright.

Two white men charged with his death were acquitted.

Mrs. Ruby Hurley, secretary of the Southwest region of the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People, said that the trial was a victory of a sort, for it was the first time since 1890 that a white had been tried for murder of a Negro there.

Cold Arctic Air Touches Rockies

Cold arctic air toppled temperatures below zero in the northern Rockies today. The frigid blast spread westward to the Pacific Northwest and southward into the Plains states. Snow gave the areas a mid-winter setting.

It was 11 degrees below zero in Cutbank, in northwestern Montana, this morning. Great Falls reported -8 and it was -5 at Helena.

The cold air spread into Washington and Oregon and southward into Wyoming, the Dakotas and Nebraska.

Snow depths measured 3 to 5 inches over much of Montana and Wyoming. Falls in the western Dakotas and Nebraska ranged from 1 to 2 inches.

Early morning temperatures in Washington dropped into the teens and they were in the 20s in Oregon. Light snow fell in most parts of Washington. Flurries were reported in Oregon.
