

Argentine Coup Seats Another New President

'Totalitarian' Fear Ousts Lonardi, Seats Maj. Gen. Aramburu

Buenos Aires, Nov. 13.—Post-Peron Argentina walked a dangerous new path today with provisional President Eduardo Lonardi overthrown and with his friends vowing revenge.

Lonardi, the major general who led the September revolution against the dictatorship of Juan Peron, was pushed out of office in a bloodless coup Sunday.

Maj. Gen. Pedro Eugenio Aramburu, another general who took part in the anti-Peron movement seven weeks ago, was sworn in to succeed him.

The ringleaders of the coup said they did it to stamp out "totalitarian" influences in the Lonardi government and to make sure "true democracy" was built on the ruins of the Peron dictatorship.

But Lonardi's friends called it a "treason" which would be punished.

Crowds shouted "Nazis no, democracy yes" as the new president took over his office.

Labor Gains Pledged

Aramburu, who commands widespread respect within the armed forces, said his government "will maintain and increase the conquests of labor" in Argentina.

Labor organizations had played a key role in supporting the Peron regime and the Lonardi government had run into continuing difficulty with the big General Confederation of Labor. Several general strikes had been threatened.

Observers said the Roman Catholic Church, the state church in Argentina, played no part in the latest government shakeup. Lonardi had taken steps to improve state-church relations after a long and bitter dispute during Peron's rule.

In Washington, the State Department declined comment, saying it was an internal affair.

Restored Sultan Plans To Eye U. S. Air Bases

PARIS — Sultan Sidi Mohammed Ben Youssef of Morocco, who is to be restored to his throne in Rabat this week, says he intends to investigate the agreement by which the United States built four big air bases in his country.

The sultan, deposed by the French in 1953 for sympathies with Moroccan nationalists and about to be reinstated after exile in Madagascar, said in an interview Sunday he never was consulted about the bases deal.

The United States started building the bases, by agreement with the French, after the Korean War broke out in 1950. United States negotiators desired to consult with the Moroccans at the time, but the French who handled Morocco's foreign relations under a protectorate, refused.

Eighteen persons were killed over the weekend in Morocco and 11 were wounded in terrorist acts.

Attempt To Kill Two Sons Charged To Father

VAN NUYS, Calif. — A drafting engineer is in jail today on suspicion of trying to kill his two young sons with sleeping pills.

Peter Ramsey Stittick, 39, was arrested Sunday and booked on suspicion of assault with intent to commit murder.

Police said Miss Clara Morgan, a friend of Stittick, visited his home Saturday night and found the boys unconscious in their bedroom. The boys were rushed to an emergency hospital where their stomachs were pumped. Doctors said they would recover.

Police said Stittick told them "I gave them those pills, all right. I had no reason. For six years I've been father and mother to those kids."

Officers said his wife has been in a mental institution for six years.

Russian Writer Tells Of Insults, Friendship In U.S.

LONDON — Moscow Radio Monday broadcast a report of a Russian newspaperman's experiences in the United States—ranging from insults in Cleveland and Los Angeles to an especially friendly reception in Hollywood.

"Our delegation," Boris Polevoy cabled Moscow, "has traveled many thousands of miles in the U.S.A., has visited towns big and small, and talked to hundreds of Americans from every walk of life."

Polevoy, one of the Soviet Union's outstanding military correspondents during World War II, a novelist and playwright added: "The first and foremost impression is that the Soviet policy of friendship is bearing fruit on this continent."

But he puts in his rap: "In the city of Cleveland the delegation was blockaded in its hotel by a crowd of drunken hooligans. The disgusting spectacle of Cleveland was repeated in Los Angeles where we were delayed for nearly an hour and were late for our press conference."

Summing up, the Soviet writer said "Fascist hooligans" in America will be unable to wreck the development and consolidation of friendship between the two nations.

Partnership Plan For Power Backed By Young GOP

PORTLAND — The Young Republican Federation of Oregon closed its annual convention here Saturday by electing Jim Hatfield of Salem chairman.

He was unopposed. Others re-elected without opposition are: Ronald Johnson, Adams, assistant chairman; Dr. Venz Anderson, vice chairman at large; Ann West, Salem, secretary; and a Robert Bachelder, Portland, treasurer.

David Belch defeated Kenneth K. Maher and Marjorie Wooten defeated Jane Arthur for the positions of national committeeman and committeewoman. All are from Portland.

Among resolutions approved by delegates were those calling for: Federal highway aid legislation to be financed by a combination of fuel and excise taxes and borrowing; commending Rep. Conn (R-Ore) for his series of debates with Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore) on Conn's bill for "partnership" construction of John Day Dam; Oregon residents to urge the state's two U.S. senators (Morse and Neuberger) "to cease to obstruct development of power for the people of the Northwest" more free trade; a swift end to communism; and continued support for the United Nations.

Sales Tax Rejected

They tabled a resolution calling for a sales tax and opposed one calling for 90 per cent of parity for farm products.

Gov. Paul Patterson, principal speaker at Saturday night's banquet, said the Eisenhower administration had not yet found a way to permit farmers fully to share the nation's prosperity. He said the administration had "inherited" a bad farm situation from the Democrats.

He said labor had no real grounds for criticism of the administration as the nation now has more jobs than ever before and wages are at an all time high.

Russian Planes' Range Could Reach London

MOSCOW — Nikita S. Khrushchev, boss of the Soviet Communist Party, told foreign correspondents Saturday the U.S.S.R.'s new twin-jet medium bomber has a range great enough to reach London, northern Europe, North Africa and Turkey.

In a free and easy chat with correspondents during a reception honoring Premier Einar Terland, son of Norway, the Communist boss gave the first public mention by a top Soviet leader of any technical aspects of Soviet aircraft.

The Russians, said Khrushchev, developed a jet airliner modified from the bomber. There is a possibility he and Premier Nikita A. Bulganin will use such a jet liner for a trip to London next spring, but they will not use it for their trip to India next week. They are going by easy stages in conventional aircraft.

Smiling, and in a gay mood, Khrushchev told the correspondents gathered around him: "I'm going to tell you a secret, but don't tell Gen. Gruenther (Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther, supreme allied commander, Europe) because NATO is a dangerous organization. Our jet airliner is developed from a medium bomber with a range of 3,000 kilometers (about 1,800 miles). This is enough to reach London, northern Europe, North Africa or Turkey. I suppose it is all right to tell you, but of course when you tell someone a secret it gets out anyhow. I have been too talkative and careless."

Army Aide Stricken By Penicillin Reaction

SPOKANE — Charles C. Finucane, undersecretary of the Army, was in a Spokane hospital Monday recovering from a "delayed penicillin reaction." His wife said his body was covered with "huge hives."

Mrs. Finucane said he had a tooth pulled in Washington, D.C., Oct. 27 before leaving to inspect Army installations in Texas and Colorado and that he was given two doses of penicillin to prevent infection and check a cold.

Elkton School Census Shows 2 Per Cent Jump

The school census of Elkton School District 34 recently completed by C. W. Henderson lists 405 children age 4 to 19 inclusive. Of the total, 206 of them are boys and 199 girls, which represents a 2 per cent increase over last year and a 28 per cent increase over the 1951 census. A check of children age one day up to 4 years of age, taken in conjunction with the regular school census, lists 117 children as compared with 138 last year.

Plan Of Battle In Hells Canyon Dam Fuss Told

PORTLAND — The National Hells Canyon Assn. was told Saturday the grounds on which a court fight is planned against the Idaho Power Co.'s Snake River development program.

C. Girard Davidson, attorney for the organization which favors a single high dam in Hells Canyon on the Oregon-Idaho border, said he hoped the Federal Power Commission's license for Idaho power to build the two low dams could be set aside on grounds that: 1. The FPC did not follow provision of the Federal Power Act, which call for maximum resource development; 2. It failed to state reasons in law or fact and that its findings were evasive and misleading; 3. The decision was not made on the examining record, nor did it purport to be, and that material outside the record was used.

Davidson, an assistant secretary of the Interior department under the Truman administration, said he did not think Idaho Power would be able to get financing for the dams until the courts have ruled on the association's complaint. And he pledged a fight to the Supreme Court, if necessary.
