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West Oregon Grievance To Be Aired At Hearing

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McKay's announced intent to allow Lane County operators into the area to bid on salvage timber.

McKay's announcement, made last month, would mean that the Lane people, and probably Douglas County operators by next summer, would be able to cut timber formerly reserved exclusively for the coast mills under the Bureau of Land Management marketing area regulations of 1947.

Most of the Smith River timber lies within the bounds of the South Coast Marketing Area, in which BLM timber has been set aside for the original bids of the Redport, Coos Bay and Gold Beach area mills.

It wasn't learned how many witnesses will be here from the coastal timber belt. They will share time with approximately 10 Douglas operators who are to testify on problems here. Most unofficially will represent either the Industrial Forestry Assn. or the Western Forest Industries Assn. The first is an organization of large operators; the latter of small millmen.

The chief complaint of the coast people isn't that outsiders will be cutting salvage timber, but rather that a great amount of green timber will have to be removed along with the salvage.

This, they contend, eventually will cut down the annual allowable cut of the Smith sustained yield units.

The BLM estimates that 410 million board feet of beetle-killed and windthrown timber is in need of immediate harvest in the Smith River area, struck by a hurricane of tree-tossing force in December 1951.

It's expected, though, that only about half that amount can be economically salvaged. But in order to remove the timber, an equal amount of green timber will have to be removed.

The green timber includes some of the mature stands that would have been included in the annual allowable cut in the area.

The result, fear the coast people, will be a decrease in available timber at the end of the Smith River salvage program in 1961.

The hearing here by the joint committee will be in the Indian Room of the Hotel Umpqua starting at 9 a.m. Thursday.

There had been no hearing set in any of the coastal cities.

COUNSEL DESIRED

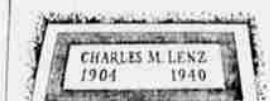

Eminent Psychiatrist Inspects VA Hospital

Dr. Henry Dixon, clinical professor of psychiatry and head of that department in the University of Oregon Medical School at Portland, was a visitor at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital Monday.

A consultant in psychiatry for the VA, Dr. Dixon made an inspection tour of the hospital and came away with high praise for the treatment and care given veterans in the area.

New Sewer Service Needs Outlined At Meeting

authorize a sewer service charge for sewer improvements and maintenance, and (2) a bond issue of \$1,100,000 to pay for a new sewerage treatment plant and main sewers running to sections of West Roseburg, Hucrest and to the east city limits.

West Roseburg, from about Fairhaven Street on west, now has no sanitary sewers. Neither has Hucrest, and parts of the old system in the east side of the city are in disrepair.

It's anticipated that about \$83,000 a year can be raised from the sewer service charges to retire the bonds over a 25-year period. No property tax levy would be required to retire the bonds.

J. E. Boatwright, a member of the Citizen's Advisory Committee on Sanitation, asserted that there is no chance the city will expand in any manner with building slowed down.

Specifically, he stated that "it's senseless to lay out new streets without sewerage facilities below them," hinting that street programs might suffer, or be more costly, if completed before sewers come in.

Farrell explained the proposed sewer improvement program, which would be completed in two stages. First will be an \$830,000 undertaking to build a disposal plant in the vicinity of the Felt airport on Calkins Road and extend sewer mains into sections of West Roseburg and Hucrest. Second would be the extension of a main down the south bank of the river, across the river and up Deer Creek.

The city may retain the present disposal plant for a time, but Farrell pointed out that even during the dry summer months, the plant has been unable to handle a load of twice its rated capacity.

Operation of both plants would be economically unsound, the city manager said. That would double operation costs for sewage disposal, he said.

Farrell said the service charges would be collected quarterly by the city in a system similar to the electricity and water billings.

As for the properties not now served by sewers, they would be forced eventually into forming sewer improvement districts, and costs of extending laterals would be charged to the properties.

A member of the association, the Rev. Arthur Keistrop, appeared at the council meeting. Speaking for the ministers, Rev. Keistrop said: "We don't favor free games on the machines... whatever type." Stevenson, who cast himself in the role of a reluctant contender right up to the time of his nomination in 1952, put in his bid this time, almost nine months before his party will meet in a nominating convention in Chicago.
