Yakima Officials Leave To Question Arrested Couple

YAKIMA — Two Yakima County officials were en route to Los Angeles Tuesday to question a man and a woman arrested there in connection with the death of Hollis Boone, 36, whose body was found in an auto trunk here Friday night.

The dead man's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Willie Boone, Monday identified the body as that of their son, an itinerant harvest worker of Shafter, Calif.

The parents said they last saw him six weeks ago at Yuba City, Calif., and the son told them he planned to go to Medford, Ore., to work in the pear harvest.

"We didn't know anything about him coming up to this part of the country," the father said.

Hollis Boone's body, clad only in GI trousers, was found Friday night when officials checking bloodstains in his car which had been parked several days at the fairgrounds here opened the trunk.

Complainant Fails To Press Charges; Is Assessed Costs

The complainant in a criminal case ended up paying the tab, and the defendant got off free, in a district court trial at Roseburg Monday afternoon.

Defendant Wilbur Thomas, 31, Glendale, was acquitted of a charge of assault and battery. But Judge Warren A. Woodruff assessed \$28.00 against Thomas' wife, Eleanor, who brought the charge.

Judge Woodruff said it appeared Mrs. Thomas brought the charge through malice, so the judge charged her for witness and mileage fees, pointing out the state law under which he acted.

The action came after Dep. Dist. Atty. Don H. Sanders presented the case against Thomas despite Mrs. Thomas' statement on the stand that "I refuse to press charges."

Mrs. Thomas was an uncooperative witness for the prosecution, blaming the whole thing on herself. "I keep nagging, nagging, nagging," she said. Under questioning, she said her husband had only slapped her once but hadn't hurt her to any extent.

When she said her husband had not been drinking on the night in question, he frowned and shook his head.

In a surprise move, Sanders called Dist. Atty. Robert M. Stults to the stand to give the circumstances under which the complaint had been sworn out against Thomas.

Stults said Mrs. Thomas told him her husband had beaten her on previous occasions, that she had received a broken nose and two black eyes. He said Mrs. Thomas had bruises on her face when she went to his office on Oct. 28, and he said Mrs. Thomas called him Sunday night and asked that the charge be dropped because her husband was quite angry with her.

Before telling Mrs. Thomas she must pay for the costs of the action, Judge Woodruff let it be known he frowns on the idea of anyone using taxpayers' time and money to bring a charge without the intent of prosecuting it.

\$5 Million Air Station Planned

CORVALLIS — A five million dollar Air Force installation concerned with defense communications is planned north of here on the World War II site of Camp Adair.

Test drilling is now under way for building foundations.

The office of Col. Paul Stevens in Portland confirmed local reports and said that 19 permanent type buildings are planned including mess hall, dormitory, warehouse and motor pool.

Several hundred personnel will man the station whose precise nature has not been divulged. It is officially termed a SAGE installation but meaning of those letters is classified.

While most of the Camp Adair property, where four divisions trained during the war, now has been returned to private ownership, the federal government retains about 400 acres.

About 20 buildings from the camp are still to be sold. This is expected to be done before the SAGE installation is complete.

Crippled Radar Warning Ship Towed Into Port

NEW YORK — The Navy radar warning ship Searcher, powerless but still afloat after a raging oil fire Sunday, has been towed into port, bearing the bodies of two men who died in the blaze.

The two had been sealed alive in the flaming engine room, officers and crewmen reported Monday night after the Searcher docked at the Brooklyn Navy Yard.

"We could hear them screaming and moaning for help but we couldn't reach them," one crewman told reporters. A third man died of fire injuries in a Navy hospital ashore.

Kidnap-Murder Is Confessed

SAN FRANCISCO — An Arthur Ross Brown, arrested here for crimes reaching from the corn belt to the Pacific, was held under \$100,000 bail today after the FBI said he confessed the kidnap-murder of wealthy Mrs. Wilma Allen of Kansas City Aug. 4.

Technically, Brown is held on a charge of transporting a stolen automobile across state lines. He was arrested yesterday while sleeping in an automobile stolen in Omaha. He had two loaded weapons in the seat beside him.

The FBI had been hunting him since Aug. 31 for the shooting of Sheriff Willard H. Marshall at Sheridan, Wyo. The sheriff was a questioning Brown about a burglary there.

The FBI said that Brown while being questioned about that shooting yesterday, suddenly burst out: "Where I'm really wanted is in Kansas City" and then described the kidnaping and slaying of Mrs. Allen, 34, wife of William R. Allen Jr., a wealthy Kansas City automobile dealer.

Mrs. Allen was kidnaped while shopping in south Kansas City. Her nude body with the hands tied behind the back was found three days later in a cow pasture south of Kansas City.

FINED FOR DRINKING

Arnold Welzel Mills, 44, Porterville, Calif., was fined \$25 in district court Monday after he pleaded guilty to being drunk on a public highway. Mills was arrested by state police.

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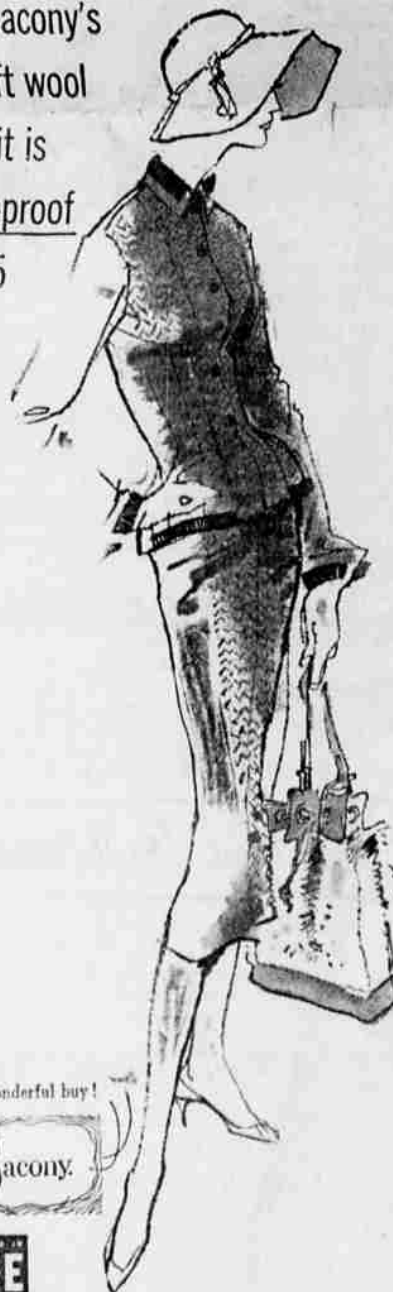
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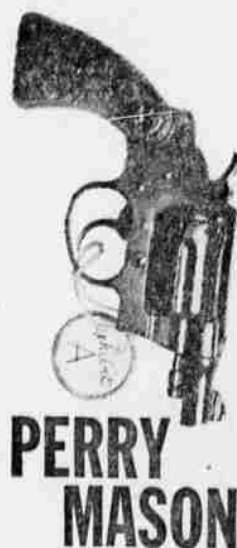
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
