Ameche Challenged As Ground Gainer

PHILADELPHIA — Howie Ferguson, the Green Bay Packers veteran running mainstay, cut sharply into the ground-gaining lead of Alan Ameche, the Baltimore Colts' fullback, National Football League statistics showed Wednesday.

Ameche is still the top man in the league with 707 yards gained on 142 carries for a 5-yard average per carry. Ferguson has gained 633 yards on 128 attempts for a 4.9 average and during the last two weeks has cut Ameche's lead from 194 to 74 yards.

Third place in the ball-carrying department is held by defending champion Joe Perry of San Francisco with 541 yards.

Another challenge popped up in the passing department where Eddie Brown of the Chicago Bears has bounced from fourth to second place. Otto Graham, the Cleveland Browns ace who was throttled by the Philadelphia Eagles, keeps the lead with 108 attempts, 58 completions for 987 yards and five touchdowns. Brown has thrown 118 times, completed 64 for 1016 yards and five touchdowns.

Tom Fears, veteran Los Angeles end, jumped all the way from seventh to first place in passing with 9 nabs for a total of 36, one more than Harlon Hill of the Bears. Billy Wilson of San Francisco and Pete Pihos of Philadelphia.

Norm Van Brocklin of Los Angeles retained the best punting average for the sixth straight week with a 46 yard average.

The buck charged, driving an antler through McDonald's right thigh. Pulling away from the maddened beast, McDonald rolled down a steep 30-foot hill into a small stream.

Looking back up the hill he saw the deer was going to charge again. He retrieved his rifle, which had dropped down the bank, and fired point blank, killing the buck.

CAB Says Patch Of Fog Caused Crash On Plane

WASHINGTON — The Civil Aeronautics Board said Tuesday a patch of dense fog near the Chicago Midway Airport probably confused the pilot and caused the crash of a Braniff Airways plane there last July 17.

The plane collided with a billboard sign near the field and hurtled to the earth, taking the lives of the captain, the hostess and 20 passengers. The remaining 20 passengers and one other crewman escaped.

Morse, Neuberger Ask For Hearing On Boxcar Shortage

WASHINGTON — Oregon's senators Wednesday asked a congressional investigation of the boxcar shortage and the adequacy of Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) policing of car-short areas.

Sens. Morse and Neuberger, Democrats, requested the hearing in a letter to Chairman Magnuson (D-Wash.) of the Senate Commerce Committee.

It is considered likely that Magnuson, now on the West Coast, will call such a hearing shortly after Congress convenes in January.

The Oregon senators said in their letter the shortage of railroad cars for lumber in Western Oregon has revealed totally inadequate efforts of the Interstate Commerce Commission in exercise of its powers.

Many Western Oregon mill operators, served solely by the Southern Pacific Railroad, are receiving from 25 to 50 per cent of their box car needs, they said.

"The result is that their sawmills are operating at an average of less than half capacity," the senators continued. A great deal of blame can be laid directly on the railroads themselves, but these failures do not relieve the Interstate Commerce Commission from exercising the utmost vigilance to assure a fair distribution of existing freight car facilities.

Morse and Neuberger also criticized what they called lack of effective action by the ICC in letters to Hugh W. Cross, commission chairman.
