A man wanted here for passing bad checks has been sentenced in Blaine County to a five-year penitentiary term, according to Sheriff Ira C. Byrd.

George Byard Bevel, 54, Klaimath Falls, has three Douglas County warrants out against him, the sheriff said, and holds will be handed on Bevel for his return here to face charges at a later date.

Bevel, released from the penitentiary on Aug. 26, is charged with writing his first worthless check in this county on Oct. 8.

The Byrds offered Bevel four hundred checks in their possession. Four of them were passed at Sutherlin, totaling \$100. Two were passed at Canyonville, totaling \$50. Bevel has previously been imprisoned three times, twice on burglary counts and once for burglar-slavery.

It is conceded that election board members did sign petitions, but the law merely provides that such signatures of prohibited persons should not be counted in determining the number of names on petitions.

In this case there were enough names anyway. No claim is made by the plaintiff that there was misconduct on the part of the election board officials or that the result of the election would have been different without the alleged violation of law.

It is also brought out in the memorandum that election board members should not be termed officers of the school district. They are not beholden to school directors for their well being, it is found.

No substantial right of the plaintiff was affected by the effect in notice of including the date of the recall petition was filed.

Judge Woodrich concludes that "The plaintiff had no vested right in the retention of a public office of school director in the face of the manifest will of a majority of the voters."

The decision upholds the district trial after election in which Edward C. Ward was elected to fill the vacancy left by the recall of Himelwright.

Sen. Mundt (R-S.D.), on one Bender's fellow (R-S.D.) on the Senate Investigation subcommittee, has urged a delay in the hearings until after Congress next convenes in January.

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COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — One of America's top military men says Russia's attitude of "sweetness and light" has caused a "tendency to let down" among the countries of western Europe.

Gen. J. Lawton Collins made the statement Wednesday in a talk to the Associated Press Managing Editors Assn. which is holding its annual convention here.

Collins, U.S. representative on the North Atlantic Treaty Organization staff, said Russia is trying to destroy NATO by fostering complacency among the 13 nations in the alliance.

He said the Communists feared NATO not because of any threats of a military attack but because the organization gives western Europe strength and courage to withstand the pressure from Russia.

western Europe must be convinced as well.

He told the managing editors they have a responsibility to report news that shows "we do progress" strengthening unity among the NATO countries.

Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther, supreme commander of NATO, originally was scheduled to address the convention. Collins agreed for him after Gruenther was unable to attend because of an expected delay in a physical examination at Walter Reed Hospital in Washington.
