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of the Southern Pacific railroad from passenger service in southwestern Oregon. He charged the state Public Utilities Commission of failing to protect the area against the loss. He said the PUC had "not even been able to set up hearings before the train was pulled off."

Neuberger said the failure of the PUC to make the SP fulfill at least "the most primitive service" is a dramatic reflection on the state GOP and Gov. Patterson. He also charged the governor and the Republican-dominated state legislature with failure to support the president on reciprocal trade.

The junior senator's blast against Secretary McKay was more direct. "He has done more to fritter away our natural resources than any secretary in our history," he charged.

He cited what he called the "shocking giveaway" of tidelands oil to four states and the "tragedy of Hells Canyon" as McKay failures. Neuberger had advocated directing receipts from tidelands oil to education.

He said he will continue to fight for a large federal dam on the Snake instead of the "pigmy" dams the Idaho Power Co. has promised to build. "I don't think the GOP will survive" in Oregon if the Idaho Power projects are allowed, he said.

The subject of Sen. Wayne Morse was much mellowed. Neuberger said Morse had switched parties as a matter of conscience. He said he did not understand why two Democratic candidates against Morse in previous campaigns, Howard Labouret and Edgar Smith, should be endorsed when they switched to the Republican party and Morse should be scolded as a "turncoat" for reversing the procedure.

For his remarks, Neuberger had some glittering moral support at the head table. One of his fellow members on the Joint Committee on Federal Timber, Rep. Earl Chudoff (D-Pa) was on hand. So was Arthur Perlman, staff director of the House committee.

A scented warhorse from another senatorial campaign, Dave Shaw of Gold Beach, was also on hand.

Russian Chiefs Land In India

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Soviet Premier Nikolai S. Khrushchev and a Russian Communist party chief, Nikita S. Khrushchev, arrived in New Delhi today to begin an 18-day goodwill tour of India.

The two top Russian leaders were greeted by Prime Minister Nehru and other high Indian officials at New Delhi's military airport, where thousands of persons had been assembling since early morning.

The Soviet leaders flew here in a Soviet air force plane.

Bulgarian, wearing a straw hat, was the first off the plane. He was greeted by a roar from the waiting crowd. Khrushchev, followed by Deputy Foreign Minister Gromyko, then emerged from the craft while Nehru moved forward to shake hands with his visitors.

Author Fined For Contempt On Red Issue

WASHINGTON (AP)—Author Harvey O'Connor was fined \$500 and given a one-year suspended jail sentence Friday for refusing to say whether he was a Communist when he wrote books used in U.S. overseas libraries.

O'Connor told U.S. Dist Judge Joseph C. McGarraghy he felt "the real reason I am here in court today is because I wrote books."

He asserted that no O&C timber sales were made in the area during the period of logging, which he claimed was in 1950-1952.

Buchanan said sales finally were made in 1954-1955. These, he claimed, were made under short-term access agreements with the private timber landowners.

He questioned the wisdom of the short-term agreements because of a large allowable cut in the drainage. The Sutherland man said a "government officer" had told him the signing of short-term agreements was up to the district forester.

Later, Buchanan identified the "government officer" as James W. Watts, Roseburg District Forester. Watts, Buchanan claimed, had replied that the forester's decision required no accounting to a superior officer, nor to Buchanan.

A Portland attorney for Evans Products, James Rogers, rose to talk during the questioning of Buchanan, but committee chairman Rep. Earl Chudoff said there would be time in Portland for a reply.

Buchanan followed a fiddle line in the witness chair. He was Paul McKee, general manager of Trico Timber Corp. and allied firms.

McKee was kept before the committee for more than an hour while Reps. Chudoff and Clare Hoffman and Sen. Richard L. Neuberger pumped him of information and opinion.

McKee likened Congress to a "big business" corporation, but said the similarity ended in the lack of an effective sales program. Congress, he said, has timber on a market.

But he claimed that changes in marketing regulations and a demand for better utilization of the timber resource is needed to properly manage the federal timber stands and stabilize the timber economy.

He presented pictures in evidence to show that valuable sawlogs are being destroyed in slash disposal areas after timber purchasers have completed terms of a sales contract.

He disputed the claim of Frank Heath, an Evans Product official, that there are too many mills for the available timber supply. Heath had said, in a statement read by Rogers, that some mills were due for failure because of too much competition.

When Hoffman told him that Heath's argument repeated views taken in Medford Wednesday, McKee replied that "you're now in the heart of the timber country."

In Medford, it had been said by witnesses that there were too few trees left to supply the Rogue Valley mills.

But McKee maintained that through better utilization of the resource and through relogging, the present manufacturing volume can be stabilized.

A case in point, he said, was in Myrtle Creek, where Umpqua Plywood shut down a plywood mill last February.

The former Plywood employees generally have found jobs in the community, McKee contended.

He suggested also that the BLM and Forest Service be allowed to increase cruise staffs by 65 to 85 per cent for speedier preparation of sales. He recommended that salaries be increased for the cruisers, for many leave the services for private industry.

He termed the federal agencies as being "the best training ground for industry," which pays higher than the government.

McKee also said his company hasn't worried about road use fees when going onto a road. At one time, the company found itself apparently blocked from a federal timber purchase, but the area was logged anyhow, and negotiations still are continuing on fees to be assessed by the road owner.

He said he felt that there hadn't been any trespass.

Hunters Believed Dead In Blizzard

DETROIT (AP)—Michigan listed four deer hunters as "presumed dead" today in the wake of a blizzard, which raked the state Wednesday night and yesterday, taking a known toll of four lives.

The four "presumed dead" deer hunters were feared drowned in Gratiot Lake high in the Keweenaw Peninsula that juts into Lake Superior. The deer season, which opened Tuesday, has claimed two deaths by gunfire.

The deer hunters lost include three Michigan professional golfers and the host of an Illinois golf club. They were last seen Wednesday crossing the two-mile-square lake in a motorboat from their camp to deer lands on the other side.

They are Daniel Nowack, 39, and Edward Van Popering, 30, both of Grand Rapids; Ted Lemanski, 36, Spring Lake, Mich.; and Leonard Gillette, 30, both of the Homewood (Ill.) Golf Club.

Facilities at the Forest Service's Steamboat Ranger Station have been doubled.

Umpqua National Forest Supervisor Vondis Miller announced Thursday in Roseburg that the Forest Service has purchased the North Umpqua Resort from Clarence E. and Della Gordon. The resort is located on the south side of the North Umpqua River at the mouth of Steamboat Creek, about 40 miles east of Roseburg. It is adjacent to the Steamboat Ranger Station.

The resort has been in operation since 1942. It is well known to western sportsmen, but Miller said its use had declined since the expansion of highway development in the area.

There are nine buildings on the resort grounds which the Forest Service acquired at an undisclosed amount. The Gordons, in terms of the permit, will continue to occupy for a time the building in which they now live, Miller concluded.

Green residents, some 75 of them, turned out Thursday night to learn more about the proposed financing of the Green sewer system.

A consulting engineer from the Corvallis firm employed by the sanitary district explained the feasibility study recently made in the area by Cornell, Howland, Hayes & Merryfield. He said it was not a complete "nor final" plan. He said costs presented were intended to be on the conservative side.

The study, he said, indicated it was feasible to serve the Green community with a sewer "within reasonable limits." Next step in the study would be a thorough engineering survey to determine which parts of the district could and would be serviced.

Engineer Lawell said ways of financing a district include a combination of general obligation bonds, direct assessment against property, tax levy, cash payment or sewer service charges. The problem at hand, he said, was "how much will it cost the average home owner."
