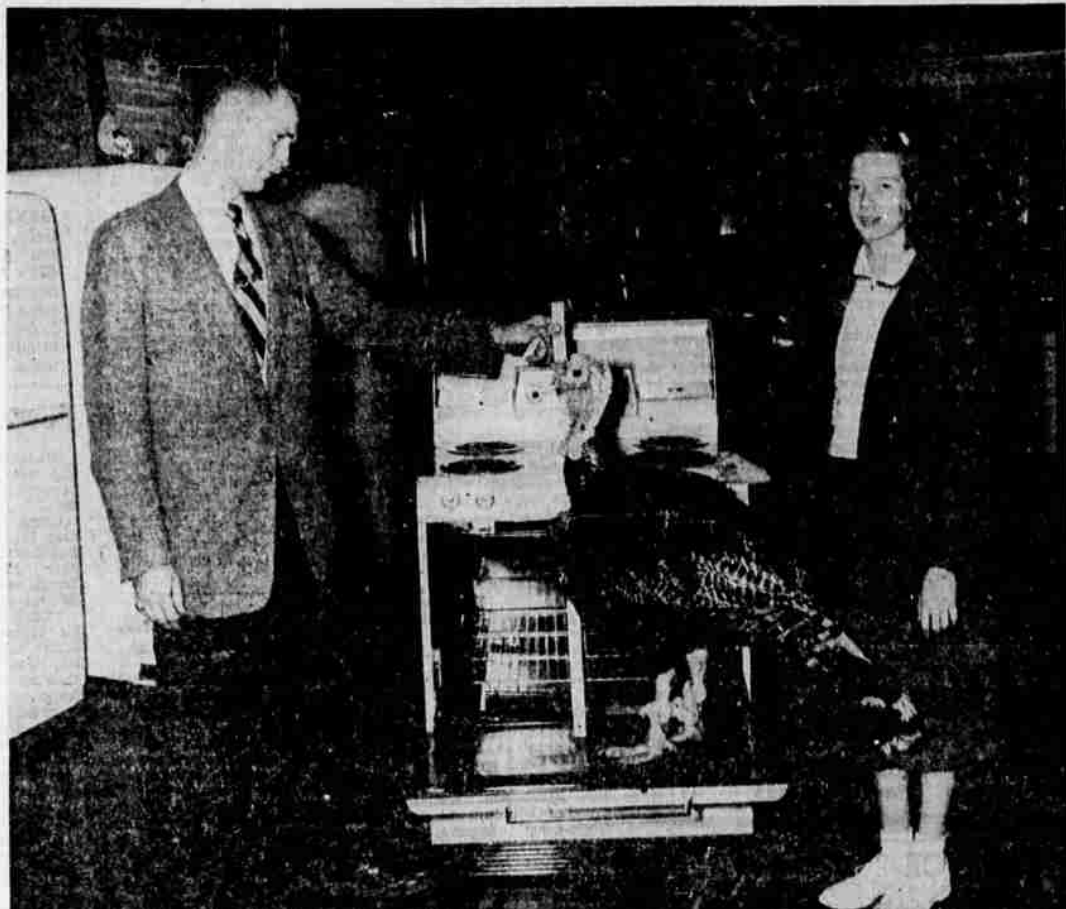
According to word received by Mrs. Ned Dixon, her brother who has been seriously ill in Fishtail, Mont., is somewhat improved.

Don Kruse made a trip to Dundee with a load of walnuts for W. C. Thurlow on Tuesday.

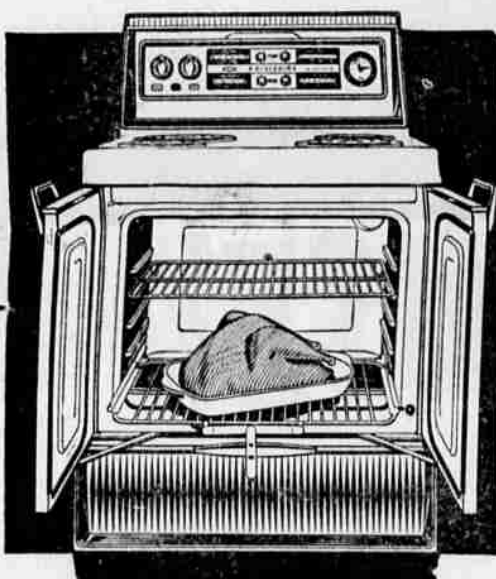
Mr. and Mrs. O. W. Butts have moved into their new home on Fisher Road which they built last summer.
