**Heltzel Orders Existing Train Speeds Continued**

SALEM — Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel ordered here that existing speed limits be maintained for Southern Pacific trains in all cities except Portland and Canby.

In Portland, the city can regulate train speeds, Heltzel having authority in all other cities.

As to Canby, Heltzel will hold a further hearing.

At the same time, Heltzel announced a hearing would be held in Portland Dec. 7 to deal with speeds of Union Pacific, Spokane, Portland & Seattle, and Oregon Trunk trains.

Until recently, all cities regulated train speeds within their limits, but the Supreme Court ruled that Heltzel is the only person who can set limits outside of Portland.

Heltzel said all of the speed limits ordered Friday are the same as those previously set by the cities.

These limits include: Albany, 30 miles per hour; Ashland, 20; Eugene, 30 and 50; Grants Pass, 25 and 35; Klamath Falls, 55; Medford, 10 and 35; Oregon City, 40; Roseburg, 25; Salem, 20 and 35; Springfield, 40 and 55.

**Income Taxes Up; No Property Tax Seen Next Year**

PORTLAND — Income tax collections are running heavier than expected, and so there will be no state property tax in Oregon this year and probably none next year, Gov. Paul Patterson said here.

He made the prediction at the annual meeting of the Assn. of Oregon Counties, which was considering resolutions.

Earlier R. H. Baldoek, state highway engineer, told the association that a national highway bill is essential if damage to the nation's economy is to be avoided. What plan of financing may be used is secondary, he said, to an early start. He urged county judges and commissioners to ask the state's congressional members to try to help get a bill passed.

Forrest Cooper, counsel for the public lands committee, said that a congressional study committee on reassessment of the government's policies on sharing revenue, reflects Midwest and Eastern views. The West, he said, lacks adequate representation on the committee.
