Old Cold War Hasn't Returned

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Young (R-ND) said Saturday he agrees with Secretary of State Dulles that the Big Four foreign ministers' impasse at Geneva has not brought back the cold war. "As we've known it in the past," he said, "the 'spirit of Geneva' never was very much alive and is 'now dead.'"

The two senators were among the first to comment on Dulles' report to the nation on the foreign ministers' conference which ended this week without East-West agreement on any major issues.

Dulles put the blame for failure on Russia, but said the Geneva spirit born at the big four summit meeting last summer is not entirely dead and declared nothing will deter this country's search for lasting peace.

"He put a good face on a story of failure," O'Mahoney commented.

"I never could see any reason for expecting success, and the spirit of Geneva—now dead—never was more than imagination. We can not settle the international dilemma until we realize that it is economic in character."

Crash Survivors Homeward Bound

SEATTLE (AP)—Nineteen of the soldiers who survived the crash of an airliner here Thursday night were homeward bound again today — and at least two of them chose to fly.

The Army reported, however, that most of them went out by train or bus.

Twenty-one injured remained at the Ft. Lawton hospital. The Army report said only Cpl. J.S. Thomas of Philadelphia was in grave condition.

Mrs. Edward McGrath and her three small children also have been released from the hospital. They were aboard the plane with their husband and father, who had signed on recently as a pilot with Peninsular Air Transport Co. and was bound with his family for Miami.

Peninsular's big DC4 pancaked into a residential hillside just after the takeoff, killing 27. All but McGrath were service men homeward bound after returning from the Far East.

People Released From Fear Of Atom, Claim

DENVER (AP)—An Atomic Energy Commission spokesman said Saturday that the Geneva atom-for-peace conference was a important news story because, for one reason, "people were being released from fear of the atom."

Charles Heston, chief of the commission's public information service, said in an address to the Radio-Television News Directors Assn. that such fear had been "the only reaction they (people) had known to atomic energy until the Geneva conference."

Testimony Being Taken In Trial Of Mrs. Clark

FORT WORTH (AP)—Testimony began Saturday in the murder trial of Mrs. Mary Clark, charged with hiring gunmen to kill her estranged wealthy husband in their 22-room mansion here.

The special venire summoned for the case had long been exhausted and the court had to turn to the regular jury panel to complete the eight-man, four-woman jury.

The 41-year-old Mrs. Clark was indicted along with three men in the May 1953 slaying of her husband.

Oregon To Send 16 Delegates To Demo Convention

CHICAGO (AP)—Oregon will send 16 delegates to the 1956 Democratic convention as a result of action proposed at a party meeting here Friday by Monroe Sweetland, Oregon national committeeman.

The party officials voted to double the number of at-large delegates from states which voted predominantly Democratic in 1952 or which elected a Democratic governor.

Sweetland proposed an amendment, which later was approved, doubling the number of at-large delegates from states which elected Democratic senators. These included Oregon which elected Sen. Neuberger in the last general election.

At the last Democratic nominating convention, Oregon had two delegates from each of the state's four congressional districts and four from the state at large.

Under the revised rule, the at-large delegation will be increased to eight for a total of 16 delegates.

REPARATIONS PARLEY SET

TOKYO (AP)—Japan's parliamentary vice minister for foreign affairs says reparations talks with Indonesia probably would begin early next year. Sunao Sonoda said negotiations would be possible as soon as final results of the Indonesian election are known.
