

**TAX LIEN DISCHARGED**

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP)—The Internal Revenue Service has discharged a \$352,605 tax lien against the late Albert Bacon Fall, secretary of the Interior under the Harding Administration.

S. P. Vidal, IRS director here, said the lien was filed in 1936 for alleged unpaid income tax for the years 1921, 1922 and 1923.

**Soldier, Afraid To Ride Plane, Rescues Child**

SEATTLE (AP)—A soldier who was afraid to ride an airplane reentered the flaming wreckage of a crashed plane Friday and rescued an 8-year-old boy.

Specialist J.C. Peter R. Tamburin, of Wheeling, W. Va., said he was sitting next to Mrs. Edward McGrath, 28, in a Peninsular Air Transport DC4 when it crashed after taking off from Boeing Field.

Mrs. McGrath was the wife of Edward McGrath, a pilot who was moving his family to Miami, Fla., to take a job with Peninsular. With them were their three children.

Tamburin said he went out through a hole in the plane after the crash.

"Then I saw the woman (Mrs. McGrath). She was screaming that one of her kids was still in the plane."

"I got the kid and then she started back to the plane for her husband or something. I stopped her and just then the plane blew up."

McGrath is listed as missing and presumed dead.

Tamburin, interviewed in a hospital, added:

"I was afraid to ride that plane. I prayed Thursday when I got off the boat that I'd get home safely."

The soldier was one of 2,833 servicemen who returned here Thursday from the Far East.

**Truck Driver Files Suit For More Compensation**

Truck driver Arthur W. Goodwin has filed two suits in Douglas County Circuit Court for additional compensation for injuries received in accidents on Aug. 14, 1954, and on May 12, 1955.

Named defendant in each action is the State Industrial Accident Commission, which has refused to grant more than 10 per cent permanent partial disability in each case.

Goodwin was hurt last year when struck on the head and shoulders by a log coming off a load while he was driving truck for Kindred Logging Co.

For the injuries, he seeks an award of compensation equal to 70 per cent loss of use of an arm.

In the later accident, Goodwin was hurt when he jumped to dodge a log being loaded on a truck he was driving for John Bruesch. He seeks additional compensation until his condition becomes satisfactory, then award of compensation for permanent partial disability equal to 50 per cent loss of use of an arm.
