

Three Arrested Following Bout With Local Police

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Mrs. Hiney police didn't disclose any relationship on the floor of a bedroom, fighting.

As they attempted to break it up, Mrs. Zeissler swatted one of the officers in the face with the magazine, the police report said. That led to her immediate arrest.

She was taken, struggling, to the patrol car, and in the melee at the car, the window was broken and the door sprung. An officer was posted to guard her.

Back into the house went Roseburg's finest. Hiney, said the report, came out of her corner to push an officer, and he was placed under arrest.

The elder Mrs. Hiney, apparently taken by a change of heart, pulled on Hiney from inside the house while police pulled on him to get him out to the patrol car.

That not working, the now-weary policemen said, Mrs. Hiney pulled a flashlight away from one of the officers and swung it. But a second officer blocked the blow with his hand and suffered a bad bruise in consequence.

Arrest No. 3 was made on the spot.

Hiney's wife later turned over a half-gallon wine jug, its contents partially consumed, to police for evidence the report said.

The three accused were to appear in municipal court today to tell the judge how it all happened.

Military Board Convenes To Hear Trial Testimony

FT. LEWIS, Wash. — A 12-man military board convened here Monday to hear testimony in the court martial of a West Point graduate accused of collaborating with the enemy while a prisoner of war in Korea.

Lt. Col. Paul V. Iles, 39, of Birmingham, Ala., said in a pre-trial interview he would plead innocent.

Iles, now a special service officer here, was captured by the Chinese Communists Oct. 28, 1950, and was released more than two years ago.

Iles is accused of advising prisoners to give military information to the enemy to avoid being starved, and of taking part in Communist indoctrination and propaganda programs and making disloyal statements.

Some 80 witnesses will testify at the trial which the Army said would last about a month.

Second Annual Safety Campaign Starts Today

WASHINGTON — The second annual campaign to promote traffic safety throughout the nation started today.

The campaign, involving a tally of all traffic deaths during the next three weeks, features S-D Day-Safe Driving Day—on Dec. 1.

But Vice President Nixon, urging all citizens to walk and drive safely "365 days of the year," said S-D Day "does not mean that we try to drive safely that day alone."

"It should mean to all of us," he said in a statement yesterday, "that we will not only avoid accidents on that day, but that we will try to avoid them every day."

The success of S-D Day will be measured by comparing traffic fatalities that day as compared to the 81 on the corresponding day in 1954 and for the comparable three weeks last year when 2,144 lost their lives.

Two Larcenies Reported To Roseburg Officers

CAA Board Views Crashed Airline Plane's Remnants

SEATTLE — Civil Aeronautics Board investigators studied the burned remnants of a crashed airliner Monday seeking the full answer to what caused an accident that took 27 lives.

Frank K. McKivene of the CAB Bureau of Safety Investigation said the probe of Friday's crash of a chartered Peninsular Air Transport DC4 probably will take several weeks and will include a public hearing.

The four-engine transport, loaded with 61 flying to their homes in the East for the holidays, crashed at two minutes after midnight Friday after taking off from Boeing Field here. Forty-seven of the 71 aboard survived.

William J. McDougall, 40, Miami, Fla., the pilot, said Saturday the immediate cause of the crash was propeller failure.

He said the propeller on the No. 4 engine (outside, right) failed to function properly when it failed a routine reduction from "full takeoff" power after the plane had reached an altitude of about 1,000 feet and speed of 135 miles an hour.

Attempts to "feather" the propeller (turn its edge to the wind) so power could be cut off from the engine were futile, McDougall declared. Instead, the propeller blades turned. This created a severe drag "like having a barn door out on your wing," and caused the plane to yaw, losing control and altitude.

McDougall said this could have been caused by failure in the engine or failure of the propeller mechanism.

Baghdad Defense Council Meeting

BAGHDAD, Iraq — The first meeting of the five-nation Baghdad defense alliance called to plan mutual defense against Communist aggression—opened Monday with an Iraqi pledge to aid any Arab state threatened by Israel.

Premier Nuri Said brought the Arab-Israeli feud into the meeting in his speech of welcome to British Foreign Secretary Harold Macmillan and the Premiers of Iran, Turkey and Pakistan.

Iraqi Nuri Said declared, "will not hesitate to use its resources for the assistance of any Arab state subjected to Israeli aggression in accordance with its obligation under the treaty of collective defense and economic cooperation between the states of the Arab League."

The Baghdad Pact was completed last month with the adherence of Iran, the only other Arab League member of the five-nation alliance. Egyptian opposition has kept other Arab nations out of the Western-backed lineup.

Officials of the association said that the United Fund attack was unfair. They pointed out that polio had been all but conquered by the March of Dimes drives and that they were working for a similar solution to their problems.

The United Cerebral Palsy Assn., which also was criticized by the United Fund, has scheduled a fund raising drive soon. Officials said they had decided to undertake their own drive, instead of joining the United Fund, in order to educate the public to the problems of the disease.

Directors of the United Fund said the two organizations should have joined the United Fund's money-raising drive and shared in its benefits.

Three Men Face Charges Of Rape

Three young men were to appear before Justice of the Peace Nina Pietzold at Canyonville today to face charges that they raped a 37-year-old Riddle woman Saturday night.

Charged are Eugene Leiford, 26, Parks Air Force Base, Calif.; William Kenneth McClure, 21, Myrtle Creek, and Sammie Jay Loney, 21, Myrtle Creek.

They were arrested by Roseburg police early Sunday after a call was put out by the sheriff's office, according to Sheriff Ira C. Hyrd.

Hyrd said the alleged crime occurred near Riddle after the young men had picked up the woman in a bar. All had been drinking, officers were told. City police said a fourth man may have been with the trio, but it was not known Monday morning whether he would be similarly charged.

Radio Contact Made With Ship

BOSTON — A shadow of hope was raised Monday for the Liberian cargo ship Daytona, and her 24-man crew feared lost in Sunday's storm, when Coast Guard cutters near her last reported position said they had picked up a fragmentary radio message.

The cutters Acushnet and Evergreen said it "might have been from the Daytona."

Last direct word from the 322-foot converted LST (Tank landing ship) was at 9 a.m. Sunday when her captain reported she was listing badly and taking water. Her position was about 75 miles off Gloucester.

Search for the vessel by sea and air was intensified Monday. The Coast Guard said that loss of radio contact would mean either that the Daytona had sunk or that she had lost her power. The latter case would throw her ballast pumps out of operation.

The Daytona was loaded with gypsum and was heading from Nova Scotia to Philadelphia.

Head-on Crash Takes 10 Lives

WATERBURY, Neb. — A head-on collision, believed to have been the worst in Nebraska highway history, snuffed out 10 lives last night—those of six teen-agers and four musicians.

Col. C. J. Sanders, head of the Nebraska safety patrol, said he could recall no other accident taking so many lives.

The teen-agers were returning to their farm homes near Ponca. The state safety patrol said a front tire apparently blew out. Their car rammed head on into one carrying the musicians, bound for an engagement at Norfolk, Neb.

The car carrying four members of the Jimmy Palmer orchestra, James E. Martelli, about 30, Springfield, Ill.; Jack Ream, about 25, Pittsburgh; Lon Case Jr., about 25, Rock Island, Ill.; and Don Sheffield, about 25, of Vermont, burst into flames after the impact.

The Nebraska killed were Rodney Hanks, Gary Stark, Robert Rakow, Perry Book, Richard Rahn and Ronald Nollbe.

Mountain Passes Still Remain Slippery Today

SALEM — Oregon's mountain passes remained slippery Monday under 2 to 4 inches of new snow, the Highway Commission warned.

The commission said tire chains are needed at Willamette Pass, Santiam Pass, McKenzie Pass, Ochoco Summit and Meacham.

Chains should be carried at Government Camp, Timberline, Warm Springs Junction, Pendleton, Green Springs, Lapine, John Day, Austin and Seneca.

The Pacific Highway through the Siskiyou was covered by packed snow, but it was sanded.

The commission also warned of falling rocks on the North Santiam Highway near Detroit Dam.

Abandoned Car Found On Street; Owner Is Sought

Roseburg police are curious over the whereabouts of the owner of a brand-new car found a week ago on Madrone Street, the keys still in the ignition.

No one has appeared at headquarters to claim the automobile, a 1955 Chevrolet four-door sedan in which a two-way radio had been installed. Police said the registered owner, identified through the National Auto Theft Bureau, is Claude A. Davis, Pecos, Tex.

Police Chief Stan Olson said Davis had moved from the Texas city. From papers found in the car, it appears Davis is an oil man, Olson said. Some clothing was found in the car trunk.

The car was impounded by Roseburg police last Monday, and officers said it had been sitting near Mercy Hospital for at least two days by the time they moved it.

The Auto Theft Bureau wrote Olson that the car hadn't been listed as stolen or missing.

A check of hospitals failed to turn up the car owner, Olson said.

Rural Firemen Want Old Street Addresses Called

Roseburg Rural Fire Dept. members have requested that residents in the fire district give their old house number address when calling in a fire alarm.

"We only know the old addresses," firemen said, "and until we can get a map showing the locations of the different blocks, we won't know the new location of numbers."

Firemen pointed out that use of the new street number and, in some cases street name, "could be critical."

"We don't have all day to walk down the street and try to find the fire," they pointed out Monday. Meanwhile, they're making a new 8-foot by 12-foot map which they plan to fill in when the numbering is completed. The firemen said they would let district residents know when they have the new locations listed.

Careless Smoker Blamed For Home Fire Sunday

A careless smoker was blamed Sunday evening for a fire which started in a bed of a home on Lookingglass Road, according to Roseburg firemen.

The occupant of the house was F. H. Martin. Owner is Frank Rogers.

About \$150 damage was caused, firemen estimated.

Seven Deer Hunters Die In Michigan Woods

DETROIT — Seven Michigan deer hunters, an average of one a day, have died from gunfire since the 16-day season opened last Tuesday.

Eleven other hunters have died of heart attacks, two have frozen to death, one has died of exposure and three have been asphyxiated sleeping in cars or tents. Another six hunters are missing and "presumed dead" by authorities.

U. S., Russia Square Off Again In United Nations

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — The United Nations 10th General Assembly went into its fourth quarter Monday with the United States and Soviet Russia squared off on all remaining major issues.

Three working weeks remain in the scheduled 12-week session. Still to come are a full-scale disarmament debate, passed to the Assembly after the Big Four foreign ministers' failure to agree at Geneva last week, and a debate to break the membership deadlock.

The Assembly is in the middle of disputes also over Korea, Palestine refugees, charter revision, economic aid for underdeveloped countries, and election of the 11th member of the Security Council for 1956.

The Assembly scheduled another plenary session today in hopes it could come to a vote on the charter revision issue.

The Soviet bloc argues that no conference to overhaul the basic law of the U.N. is necessary. The United States, yielding on an earlier stand that the charter should be revised to modify the big power veto in the Security Council, is pushing a revised resolution calling for a committee of all 60 U.N. members to study where and when such a conference might be held. It would report back in two years.

Winston Firemen To Help Eagles Annual Toy Drive

Winston-Dillard Rural Fire Department Chief Barney Shepherd has announced that the department will help Roseburg Eagle Aerie members in their annual toy drive.

Chief Shepherd said the department doesn't have facilities to work on toy repair. In the new arrangement the firemen will collect toys donated for the Christmas project by calling for them at homes. Toys may also be left at the fire hall. All toys will be repaired by the Eagles.

The Winston-Dillard firemen will take care of toy deliveries in their area. The chief said persons with toys to be picked up should see that they are not in "too bad repair."
