

Spartans, Bruins Have Rose Date; Other Bowls Decided

It's Michigan State-UCLA in the Rose Bowl and Oklahoma-Maryland in the Orange Bowl Jan. 2. And if you think you've heard that song before, you're right.

Those same four powers met in the same two New Year's Day extravaganzas in 1954. Michigan State beat UCLA 28-29 and Oklahoma beat Maryland 7-0.

Once again, Michigan State and UCLA are once again. The Spartans lost only to Michigan 14-7 this season, while only Maryland upended UCLA (7-0). Maryland, the 1953 national champ, again has

a 10-0 record, while Oklahoma, 9-0 with one game left and apparently heading for the national title, was once beaten and once tied going into the '54 Orange Bowl.

UCLA expected to receive official blessing from the Pacific Coast Conference today after a token poll of members. The Bruins won their third straight PCC championship by thrashing Southern Cal 17-7 Saturday.

Michigan State received its Rose Bowl credentials from the Big 10 yesterday although getting the bid as a runner-up. Ohio State, barred

from two consecutive Pasadena pastimes, won the Big Ten title again by booting Michigan out of the picture 17-0 while Michigan State walloped nonleague Marquette 33-0.

Oklahoma and Maryland, the only major unbeaten clubs remaining, got their bowl tickets before last weekend's games in which the Sooners won their 10th straight Big Seven title by whipping Nebraska 41-0 and Maryland clipped George Washington 19-0.

Half of the bowl berths now are filled, with Texas Christian gain-

ing the Southwest Conference host spot in the Cotton Bowl by humiliating Rice 35-0. That leaves the Dallas bowl selectors still looking for another team.

The Sugar and Gator bowl committees also are still on the prowl and they'll have their teams by week's end with Mississippi, Georgia Tech, Auburn, Navy and Pitt waiting to say yes.

To give the selectors a good show, Mississippi plays Mississippi State, Georgia Tech meets Georgia, Auburn takes on Alabama and Navy tangles with Army as

college football takes one last fling this Saturday.

Pitt's record already is bound up for inspection with Saturday's 20-0 decision over Penn State capping a season that listed victories over Duke and West Virginia.

The Southeastern Conference champ generally fills one of the Sugar Bowl berths and Mississippi (8-1), Georgia Tech (7-1) and Auburn (7-1) are the contenders. Vanderbilt (7-2) also has a chance. Vandy plays Tennessee, knocked for a loop by Kentucky 23-0, this weekend.

Navy, which returned to the post-season business last January in the Sugar Bowl, likely will have a Cotton Bowl invitation in hand if it can beat Army. If the Middies fall, Pitt or one of the SEC teams may make it.

Pitt also qualifies for the Sugar Bowl, although the New Orleans promoters could do worse than match a SEC pair.

The Gator Bowl, set for Dec. 31, probably will have to wait until after the Cotton and Sugar bowls make their moves before getting replies to its bids.

Albany, Medford Keglers Advance In Timber Meet

Albany entries in the men's division and Medford entries in the women's division of the first annual Timber Capital Fall Handicap bowling tournament made serious breaches into the leadership of individual and team events in Saturday and Sunday action at the Roseburg Alleys.

New leaders in singles and all-events took over in men's events while new leaders took over in both the team event and three individual women's events.

Medford women particularly made a shambles of previous tourney marks, taking over top spot in each event and completely dominating women's singles for the top five places.

Local Man Tops Singles
Roseburg's Ed Klemmer and Jack Weiss of Albany shared the singles lead with 689's following Sunday's play. The first two-week leader, Aubrey Pierson of Roseburg, tumbled to third place on his 679 count.

Wildcats Bow To Culver In State Six-Man Finale

Glide reached the end of the winning trail after 15 straight six-man football successes, falling to Culver 32-14 in a state championship game played on the rainy Culver field Saturday.

The Wildcats fell off their lofty defending champions' perch abruptly Saturday after holding a 14-13 halftime lead in the game. But the combination of high altitude, 2,663 feet, and Culver's sustained attack finally exhausted the losers in the second half.

Dick Smith scored all of Glide's points, getting eight in the first period and six more in the second. Both touchdowns came on runs of six yards and the conversion came after the first touchdown.

The Wildcats led 14-13 after Smith's second scoring effort.

Culver Nabs Lead
Earlier in the game, Culver drew ahead 13-0 when halfback

Rich Youngs broke away for a 39-yard TD gallop and then ran back an interception 21 yards to score again. Youngs also ran the extra point.

A third period touchdown in which a disputed play figured gave the home team a permanent lead. Youngs took a pass from Tom Herringshaw and reached the Wildcat 19 where he lateraled to teammate Doug Humphrey who moved into the end zone.

Glide Coach Jack Forsythe protested to no avail that the "lateral" was thrown forward and constituted a rule violation.

As things turned out, the play was allowed and the 39-yard play gave Culver a 19-14 lead. Later in the period, Youngs broke loose for a 53-yard touchdown run and then added the conversion on a run for a 26-14 margin.

The winded Wildcats were un-

able to make any threat in the final stanza and the winners finally put the issue beyond recall as Youngs plunged from the one-yard line to score. This made it 32-14 and was the ninth straight win of the season for Culver.

Forsythe commented after the game that the winners were "a fine ball club" and that Youngs was "a good runner."

He said that he felt that the high mountain altitude tired the Wildcats in the second half and hurt their chances. Forsythe did not say that the third Culver TD on the disputed "lateral" play cost the Wildcats the game, but he definitely felt that an incorrect judgement had been made.

in a traditional, the University of Oregon flapped all over the favored Oregon State Beavers Saturday to take a surprising 28-0 shutout.

The Beavers had been a pre-game favorite, and had a chance to win the Pacific Coast Conference football title.

But Oregon wasn't impressed with the Beavers' clippings, and slashed and sliced through the OSC defenses at will to compile four touchdowns, while keeping the Beavers mired.

Halfback Jim Shanley specialized in slashes to the left, turning in two touchdowns. And halfback Dick James did his slashing to the right.

While the Beavers were trying to cope with them, quarterback Tom Crabtree hammered the middle for two scores.

The four Oregon touchdown drives went 65, 51, 71 and 61 yards.

Shanley, a sophomore from North Bend, gained 160 yards on 27 carries while James rambled 114 on 22 tries.

After the game, Oregon coach Len Casanova announced that James, a senior from Grants Pass, had been selected to play for the West team in the Shrine All-Star game at San Francisco Dec. 31.

Huskies Bump Cougars, 27-7

SEATTLE — Everything was Green and lovely around the University of Washington campus Monday after Coach Johnny Cherb's Huskies closed out the football season Saturday with a slightly "incredible" 27-7 victory over the Cougars of Washington State.

A big fat chunk of the Homecoming Day triumph, played in the stop before a crowd of 39,000 belonged to "Incredible" Credell Green, junior fullback from Richmond, Calif.

He shredded the Cougar defenses for 238 yards and two touchdowns and pulled off a pass interception that paved the way for one of his own tallies.

Washington State dominated the first quarter, twice getting into range for field goal attempts. Both went wide of the mark.

Right after the second miss by Frank Rame, the Huskies took command scoring twice in the second and twice in the third period. Steve Roake got the first one on a plunge and Bobby Herring the second on a 24-yard pass play from Sandy Lederman.

The third stanza was Green all the way. He ran 18 yards for one tally and 30 for the other, helped by excellent blocking.

The Cougars finally got their passing attack working in the last period and drove for the counter that averted a shutout. Dennis Rath plunged one yard for the tally.

It was Washington's first victory in three starts against the Cougars and gave them a season record of 3-4-1. Washington State won only one game — from Idaho — and tied California and San Jose State.

In other Coast Conference "civil war" clashes, John Brodie led his Stanford teammates to a 19-0 win over California, and Idaho dropped Montana in freezing weather, 33-0. UCLA stopped USC, 17-7 to win the PCC title and probable bid to the Rose Bowl.

Another valley AAU body—the Registration Committee—imposed the penalty Oct. 30 on grounds Santee had accepted excessive expense allowances for three California track meets last May.

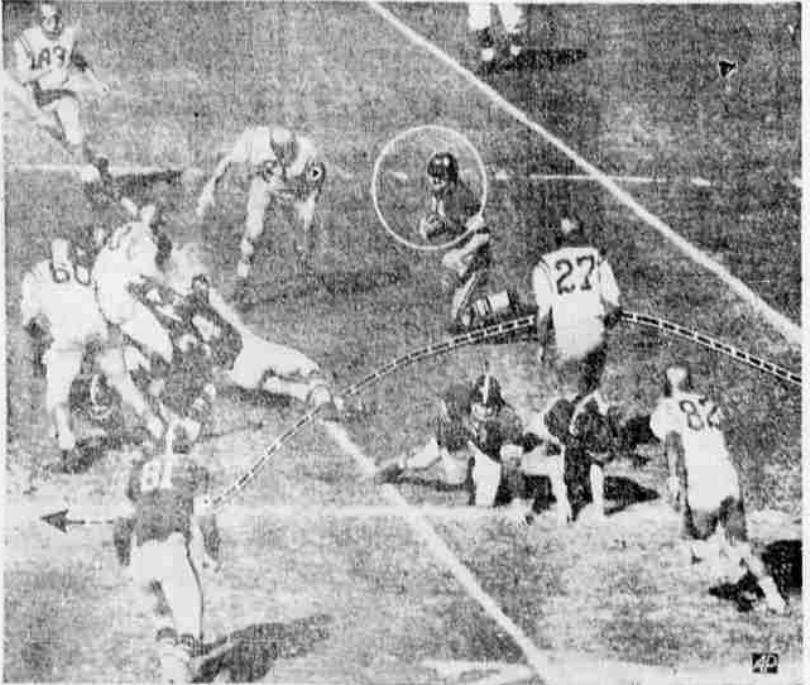
Santee, maintaining he had never violated amateur athletic standards, appealed to the higher board. The Board of Managers voted 21-7 to reject the registration committee's decision.
