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McCarran Act Revision Not Likely, Report

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two senators, one an opponent and the other a supporter of the McCarran-Walter Act, agreed Tuesday any major revision of the act at the next session of Congress is unlikely.

Sen. Lehman (D-NY) assailed the law in testimony before a Senate Judiciary subcommittee as "a pyramid of unfounded fears." He said he would be "less than honest" if he held out hope for revision.

"I think you are a true prophet," Sen. Watkins (R-Utah) told him. Watkins, presiding in the absence of Chairman Kilgore (D-WVa), said he felt there probably would be no action at the coming session of Congress.

Watkins, who voted in 1952 to write the measure into law over former President Truman's veto, said he did not contend it was perfect but thought Lehman had been "a little overemphatic" in his criticism of it.

Watkins said Lehman's testimony gave the impression the act was "a monstrosity." He said he couldn't conceive that two-thirds of the members of Congress would have voted for it if such were the case.

The act also came under attack from Rabbi Abraham J. Feldman who said it is "immersed in racist feeling."

Rules Relaxed To Allow Messages In Packages

WASHINGTON (AP) — Just in time for Christmas, the Post Office Department is relaxing its rules to permit inclusion of personal messages in packages and second-class mail. But you still have to pay the extra postage.

Heretofore putting a letter inside a package made the sender liable to as much as a \$100 fine. The new arrangement is effective Monday.

All that's necessary is to note on the outside of the package that a letter is enclosed and put an additional stamp on the package.

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Russian Leaders Visit India's Power Project

BHAKRA DAM, Northern India (AP) — Premier Bulganin and Nikita Khrushchev toured India's \$37-million dollar irrigation-power project Tuesday with American dam builder Harvey Slocum as their guide.

Spirited conversations between Khrushchev, the Soviet Communist Party chief, and Slocum, chief consultant on the dam, enlivened the tour in which the Russian party of more than 100 was guided through miles of construction work.

As Slocum showed the top Soviet leaders a view of the projected 680-foot concrete dam — to be the second highest in the world — the stocky Khrushchev turned to the American engineer and said:

"American engineers were helped to Russia in the early days. We learned a good deal from them, but now we are in competition and soon we will pass them."

"Competition is a good thing. It helps progress," Slocum replied. "It is very good," Khrushchev echoed.

Some 50 other Americans, employed as consultants and technicians on the dam project, worked at their jobs as the Russians went around.

The Bhakra-Nag project was the first stop on a 10-day, 5,000-mile swing around India by the Kremlin leaders.

As the Russians left New Delhi, most diplomatic observers felt their four-day stay in the capital had been definitely triumphant.

The Russians' itinerary calls for them Wednesday to fly to the tensest spot in India — Bombay — where 12 persons were killed and 250 injured Monday in riots led by Communists and extreme leftists.

Saudi Arabia Denies Try To Buy Red Arms

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Saudi Arabia has denied a "lies and fabrications" reports that she is trying to buy Communist arms.

A communique from the Middle Eastern kingdom's information department denied specifically reports that (1) King Saud had sought a meeting with Soviet representatives to discuss an arms deal, (2) the Arabian government is sending a delegation to visit Czechoslovakian arms factories, and (3) Soviet President Klementi Voroshilov offered arms in his message congratulating King Saud on the anniversary of his accession.

INTERESTS IDENTICAL

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP) — Pakistan's powerful Jamaat Islamis at its annual meeting here Tuesday adopted a resolution declaring the interest of Moslems and the West are "identical" as far as protecting democracy and fighting "the Communist menace" is concerned.
