MYRTLE POINT (AP) — A tree planter on a Bureau of Land Management reforestation program fell over a cliff and lay nearly 24 hours in the rain before being found.

He is Paul Highsmith, about 50, a transient worker from Tampa, Fla.

In Mast Hospital here today, his condition was called "satisfactory." He suffered multiple fractures and shock.

In early afternoon Tuesday Highsmith was found. He apparently had fallen over a 30-foot cliff, then had wandered, dazed, to a steep slope and rolled 200 feet down it before going over another 30-foot drop.

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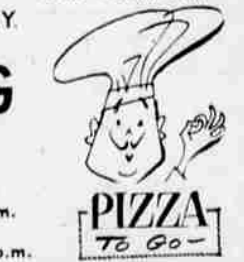
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
