NOVA GOA, Portuguese India — A communique said Monday nine armed raiders attacked the Channel customs outpost Saturday night.

After exploding a bomb which partly wrecked the building, the raiders looted the post, injuring the superintendent and a guard, the communique added.

It did not identify the raiders by nationality. Indians and Goans have been staging marches on the Portuguese colony for several months in an effort to force its union with India.

Russian H-Bomb Blast Steps Up Radioactivity

PARIS — The explosion of the new Russian hydrogen bomb has shot up radioactivity in the Paris atmosphere seven fold, a municipal expert said Monday.

The observer at the City Health Laboratory said the sudden rise in radioactivity—still not harmful—began Saturday. Similar increases have been noted elsewhere in the world.

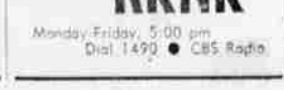
PETITION IN BANKRUPTCY

Mary and Jean romped into the station waiting room, where a woman and her small son took refuge in a telephone booth, a porter fled upstairs and two ticket sellers hot-footed it to the top of their counter.

And—Asst. Trainmaster E. T. Smith saw his new \$15 hat become an adornment for an elephant's left hind foot. Smith was under a counter at the time. Mary was on one side of him. Jean was on the other.

Mary and Jean finally backed up, and joined their companion on the platform. While Smith quickly ordered train traffic halted in both directions, the pachyderms lumbered down the C. & O. mainline.
