Glendale Masonic Temple Is Being Redecorated

The Glendale Masonic Temple is undergoing extensive modernization and redecoration, according to Mrs. G. B. Fox, correspondent.
 The building, long known as the city auditorium, was purchased from school district 77 in 1954. It had been used by the school district as a gymnasium skating rink and a youth center. In previous years the old building served as dance hall, theater and community center.
 The old stage at one end of the main room still has curtains and backdrops dating back to pioneer times.
 The present owners are lowering the ceiling for modern appearance and simplified heating. Members have been working on the ceilings, on putting in partitions for the entrance hall, reception room and preparation room.
 The stage will be left in place, but new curtains will be hung. An oil furnace has been purchased and installed. The building is being wired for modern, indirect lighting, Mrs. Fox said.
