Wilson States U. S. Retaliatory Power Unequalled

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Secretary of Defense Wilson said Monday the retaliatory power of the United States armed forces "is unequalled in the world and we plan to keep it so."

In an address prepared for the American Municipal Assn., Wilson said the threat to world peace is continuing. He said there is no "darker date" and no single form of possible enemy action to which defense should be directed.

Because of the destructiveness of modern weapons and the increasing efficiency of long-range planes and missiles, Wilson said, the United States has reason, for the first time, to be "deeply concerned" over the serious damage a sudden attack could inflict.

"We must, therefore, maintain the capability to deter an enemy from attack and to blunt that attack if it comes—by a combination of effective retaliatory power and a continental defense system of steadily increasing effectiveness. These two tasks logically demand priority in all our military planning."

Bulgarian Says Colonialists Threaten War

MADRAS, India (AP) — Soviet Premier Bulganin Monday night charged that "the same powers which supported colonialism" were threatening a new war through the extension of military pacts.

But he added that if peace-loving nations—such as India and the Soviet Union—stood united "no warmongers will start a new war in the face of our united strength."

"Your government made a wise decision in refusing to enter any kind of military grouping," he told more than 200,000 citizens of Madras at a civic reception on his tour of India.

It seemed Bulganin's remarks were aimed particularly at the new Baghdad Pact of Iran, Iraq, Turkey, Pakistan and Britain. Moscow charged in a note to Iran Saturday that the pact endangered Russia's southern frontiers and that Iran would be held accountable.
