Symphony Orchestra, Dance Group Entertain Audience

The Roseburg Symphony Orchestra initiated its fifth concert season Tuesday evening with a program flecked with sheer beauty and near perfection.

Playing before a record-sized symphony audience of nearly 500 persons at Roseburg's Central Junior High School, the 33-member orchestra was capably assisted by a guest group — the Ralph Patterson Ballet Group.

The opening half of the evening featured the orchestra in "Air and Rondo" by Puccini and an orchestral suite from "The Water Music" by Handel. At its best the Handel number was superb. Besting a slow and uninspired opening, the players proceeded to embellish several portions of the suite magically. The selection provided a nice showcase for Will Jelaski, oboe; Phyllis Davis, flute; and French horn players Glen Garrett, Eugene Lootens, Stanley Borg and Edward Graver.

The latter portion of the program displayed, aptly, the talents of the orchestra and the dance participants.

Strikingly attired in black leopards, the ballet troop danced in silhouette on the elongated stage, with the orchestra sealed behind them. The youngsters (only Patterson surpassed the age of 17) displayed remarkable precision and ability for interpretation in two numbers: Vivaldi's "Concerto in D Minor" and Alfred Newman's "Street Scene." And, in "Street Scene" both groups were outstanding.

The somewhat overwhelming brass section of the orchestra had ample musical meat here. In the dance portion Patterson's choreography offered much for county balletomanes. It included an interesting semi-hesitation step. Miss Helen McGuire and Patterson were appealing in their pas de deux, as the ensemble executed intricate movements as background.

Concluding the concert was a plus version of an Irish jig, which more than any portion of the evening's fare, indicated the potential of the orchestra. In the jig, well mastered by the musicians, the audience was treated to a tasty nightcap which drew lengthy applause and required an encore, a second playing of the number.

Paternity Suit Against Grocery Heir Dismissed

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A paternity suit against grocery chain heir Huntington Hartford II has been dismissed.

Atty. Bernard B. Cohen, who filed the suit on behalf of Edward Barton Colt, 17, said there was no settlement but declined further comment.

The suit was brought by Colt's maternal grandmother, Mrs. Florence Barton Brangerberg, 60. It sought to compel Hartford, 44, to acknowledge paternity of Colt so the youth could travel abroad and join the armed forces under his true name.

The complaint did not seek support, saying Colt receives \$800 a month from a \$295,000 trust fund set up for him by Hartford. It stated that Colt was born to Miss Mary Barton, night club dancer who later died of an apparent overdose of sleeping pills.

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Carpenter, Wife Feared Victims Of Maniac

LEBANON, Ill. (AP)—A carpenter and his attractive wife, who vanished mysteriously, were feared victims of a maniac after their home was found spattered with blood.

An extensive search for Harold Smith, 30, and his wife Arlene, 35, started last night after Mrs. Smith's parents visited their home. The couple was last heard from Sunday night.

"This is the crime of a maniac," Clifford Flood, deputy sheriff of St. Clair County, declared. County and state authorities theorized the couple had been slain in their home and the bodies dragged into a car and taken away between 8 and 8:30 p. m. Sunday.

Nehru Declares India Not Drawn Into Communism

CALCUTTA, India (AP)—With the Soviet Union's two top leaders listening, Prime Minister Nehru said Wednesday the world need not fear that his Russian guests will draw India into the Communist bloc.

He told an enormous crowd, here to welcome Soviet Premier Bulganin and Communist Party secretary Nikita Khrushchev, that India is sticking to its "basic policy" of not joining any "camp or alliance."

Then in an apparent reference to the blasts against the West by Khrushchev and Bulganin in previous speeches in India, Nehru declared:

"We try to be friendly with all countries whether we agree with them or not. That is the reason why we refrain from criticizing other countries, even when we disagree with their policies, unless circumstances compel us to explain our viewpoint."

Millions of wildly enthusiastic Indians packed Calcutta's streets and parks to greet the two Kremlin chiefs. The turnout was believed the greatest in India since the funeral of Mohandas K. Gandhi.

Thousands upon thousands had trekked hundreds of miles from Bihar and the interior of West Bengal. Some men, women and children had been camping for more than 36 hours in Maidan Park, in the center of Calcutta, the scene of Wednesday's joint appearance by Bulganin, Khrushchev and Nehru.
