Wine Drinking Boost Voted Down By U.N. Branch

ROME (U)—The U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization has side-stepped the question of encouraging wine drinking.

The maneuver came when the FAO voted to recommend that its 71 member nations adopt policies to encourage trade in "grapes and grape products."

The original resolution before the organization read "grapes and wine" instead of "grapes and grape products." It was warmly supported by such wine-making countries as France, Spain, Italy, Belgium, Germany and Greece.

The grape products term was substituted after Nazir Ahmad of Pakistan asked:

"I wonder if it would be appropriate for the FAO to be promoting drunkenness in the world?"

A British delegate, referring to the matter as a social problem, said he didn't see how, as a representative of Britain's government, he could go on record favoring an increased consumption of wine.

Norway and Sweden also opposed the original resolution.

Compromise Opposed

Michel Cepede of France and other delegates from wine-producing lands defended the inclusion of wine as an important agricultural product.

Cepede commented that wine and other products like tobacco, tea and coffee were the base of "a certain number of agreeable things in modern civilization."

The compromise wording making the resolution read "grape products" was proposed by U Thet Su of Burma.

The FAO, winding up a three-week meeting, concluded that the best way to get food to the millions of hungry people in the world was to put more money in their pockets.

It had no new or startling suggestions for a solution but it stressed the need for a concerted attack by member governments on the problems of surplus food in some countries and bad nutrition in others.

It also outlined a long-range program to survey the world's food resources.

Money, Eyes Bequeathed By Former Movie Star

NEW YORK (U)—Julia Hoyt, an actress of the silent movie era and former wife of actor Louis Calhern, willed most of her million-dollar estate to charity.

She left her eyes to the eye bank of sight restoration.

The will was dated last June 6 and filed for probate under the name of Mrs. Julia Robbins Hoyt.

Giles. Born Julia Robbins, she was married in turn to Lydig Hoyt, a wealthy lawyer; Calhern and Aquila C. Giles, a motion picture executive.

She died of a heart attack on Oct. 31 at the age of 58.

Chances Of Surviving Atomic Blast Said Good

TOKYO (U)—The director of the Atom Bomb Casualty Commission in Hiroshima said Tuesday that "statistically, chances are quite good of surviving an atomic blast."

Further, declared Dr. Robert Holmes, "We have found no changes in the first generation survivors of Hiroshima or Nagasaki and the probability is x x x very small that we will find changes in later generations."

Holmes spoke on the general effects of atomic radiation to the Foreign Correspondents Club.

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Truman Makes Denial Again At News Conference

LOS ANGELES (U)—Former President Truman denied at a news conference this week that he used profanity in referring to Vice President Nixon Sunday.

The Los Angeles Times quoted him: "I don't like the ——— and I don't care who knows it."

The Los Angeles Examiner quoted him: "I don't even want to discuss that ———. Don't even mention his name to me."

In denying such language, Truman said, "I can't understand how it came about. My secretary, Mr. (David) Lloyd, was with me and he didn't hear it. No such statement was ever made."

Both newspapers said the quotes were Truman's response at the airport when reporters asked what his reaction would be to Nixon becoming the 1956 Republican candidate for President.

Asked the same question at the news conference, the Democratic leader replied:

"No comment."

A spokesman previously said that Truman's answer to the question Sunday night had been:

"You know how I feel so don't talk to me about Mr. Nixon."

Second Honest John Rocket Blast Set Off

CHITOSE, Japan (U)—The second test firing of the Honest John rocket took place Tuesday amid an angry chorus of 1,000 labor demonstrators near this air base on Hokkaido, Japan's northernmost main island.

Honest John, capable of launching an atomic shell, used a concrete warhead, as in its first test in Japan on Mt. Fuji Nov. 7.

The Americans notified the Japanese that a third test firing will take place on Mt. Fuji Dec. 9.

TO CUT CONSCRIPTION

VIENNA, Austria (U)—Romania is to cut conscription for its sailors and soldiers by one year starting Dec. 1, according to the Bucharest newspaper Romania Libera. Soldiers will have their service cut to two years, and sailors to three years.

CLAMOR LOUDER

TAIPEI, Formosa (U)—The clamor here for Nationalist China to veto admission of Outer Mongolia to the United Nations is getting louder and angrier. Newspapers urged the government to disregard any suggestions to withhold use of its veto power.

Evangelist Graham Says Delinquency Very Serious

NEW YORK (U)—Evangelist Billy Graham said Tuesday juvenile delinquency in the United States "is so serious that it almost equals communism in the problems we face today."

Graham made the comment to newsmen on arriving at Idlewild Airport from a five-week speaking tour in England.

Graham blamed parents for the delinquency problem.

"The young people of our country today are neglected by their parents who are drinking and carousing," Graham said.

"If one were to take a survey they would find no delinquency in homes where children are taken to Sunday School faithfully, where there is Bible reading and the saying of grace at the table."

Near Normal Travel Conditions Are Reported

SALEM (U)—Travel conditions on Oregon highways were almost normal Tuesday after flood waters receded.

The Highway Commission reported only two short pieces of one-way traffic because of slides. They were on the Columbia River Highway five miles west of Clatskanie, and on the Siletz Highway four miles east of Kernville.

Pavement was bare at all points except Meacham, which reported sanded packed snow.



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
