Pistons Reverse Losing String

The Fort Wayne Pistons, defending Western Division champions of the National Basketball Assn., are showing the rest of the teams that first impressions can be mighty deceiving.
The Pistons, after losing six of their first seven games, captured their third straight by defeating the fading New York Knickerbockers 104-99 in a Madison Square Garden doubleheader Tuesday night.
In the other game, the Boston Celtics moved into third place in the Eastern Division by trouncing the Syracuse Nationals 105-97. The loss dropped the Nats into the cellar of the Eastern Division.
In the only other game, the red-hot St. Louis Hawks, leading the Western Division, knocked off the Eastern leaders, the Philadelphia Warriors, 108-95 behind the 40-point scoring spree of Bob Pettit.
The Pistons, leading most of the way, opened up late in the fourth period as the tiring New Yorkers played sloppy ball and fouled continuously. Both teams scored 27 field goals, but the final difference was measured at the foul line where Fort Wayne scored on 30 of 38 tries. The Knicks made good with only 23 of 35.
Veterans Larry Foust and Mel Hutchins led the winners with 28 and 23 points, respectively, while rookie Ken Sears and Jimmy Baechtold tied for New York scoring honors with 18 apiece.

League Studies Miami's Value

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Miami's fate as a potential member of the American Assn. hung in the balance today as league directors studied a "dry run" schedule to determine mileage and expenses of travel to the Southern city.
One baseball man said in all seriousness, "The best thing would be for each club to buy its own plane."
The association made a conciliatory move yesterday toward the Milwaukee Braves, who persist in trying to shift their Toledo franchise to Miami despite solid league opposition. It asked for a sample schedule. One was drawn up calling for two trips to each city, including two 2,100-mile hops between Miami and Denver.
There were indications, however, that the opposition was weakening in view of the association's new headquarter at Louisville. The Boston Red Sox, who have operated at Louisville since 1938, put the franchise on the market Monday night after they bought the San Francisco club of the Pacific Coast League.
Johnny Murphy, Boston farm director, promised to give the association a definite statement of policy by Saturday, if possible. Boston has advised Fred Grimm, Louisville general manager, to try to negotiate a sale to local interests. An outside group, which would operate in Louisville, also is bidding.
Ed Doherty, association president and a former Boston executive, was confident the Red Sox would do "the honorable thing." This was interpreted to mean the Red Sox would operate at Louisville, sale or not.

Field Goal Rivalry In Ram-Colt Game

LOS ANGELES (AP) — If their last two meetings mean anything, the field goal will be an important item of business in Sunday's National Football League encounter between the Baltimore Colts and the Los Angeles Rams.
With leadership of the NFL, Western Division again at stake, the Rams will depend on Les Richter's improving toe and the Colts have their virtual automatic, Bert Rechichar, who holds the league's record—a 36-yard field goal.
Richter and Rechichar booted one apiece as the two clubs fought to a 17-17 standoff in Baltimore Nov. 21. Last Sunday Richter's three field goals accounted for a 23-21 Ram victory over Philadelphia, with the winning kick coming in the final 7 seconds.
Rechichar, incidentally, booted three field goals here last year, and Gary Kerkorian chipped in two, to upset the Rams, 22-21. It was one of the greatest displays of foot in the history of the game, and the fans are expecting their kicks again.

MUNSAN, Korea (AP) — The Communists were wrong 93 per cent of the time in accusing the U.N. Command of air violations over the Korean armistice line, the Allies said Tuesday.
Of 486 Red air violation charges during the 2½ year armistice, 456 have proven false, U.S. Navy Capt. David L. Roscoe Jr. told North Korean Col. Li Yong at the 14th meeting of Allied and Red secretaries of the Joint Military Armistice Commission.

Windigo Pass Timber Sale Topic Of Hearing

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — The proposed sale of some 75 million board feet of timber in the Windigo Pass area of Umpqua National Forest will be discussed at a public hearing in Portland Dec. 15.
Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone said the hearing had been ordered because of appeals to the secretary of Agriculture against the chief forester's approval of the sale.
The timber is located in the northeastern part of Douglas County and includes sub-alpine species.
The hearing, opening at 9 a. m. in the Department of the Interior Building, will be conducted by C. Carlisle Carlson, Agriculture Department counsel.
Protests against the sale have come chiefly from the Bend and Klamath Falls area.
