ALBANY, Ore. (AP) — Purchase of a timberland tract near here for \$1,460,000, was announced Sunday by the Willamette Valley Lumber Co. of Dallas, Ore.

C. L. and Helen Watzek of Portland were listed as the sellers. The 8,068-acre tract, known as the Roaring River Tree Farm, was re-seeded and planted in trees during and after World War II by Watzek. His firm, the Roaring River Logging Co., had logged the area earlier.

The parents said the girls went to school Tuesday morning, Tuesday afternoon, they said, the girls were taken to Albany by two Winston boys. They didn't take any personal possessions.

The boys, interviewed by the parents, said they left the girls in Albany. They ventured the girls might have gone on from Albany on a bus.

The parents said there was a report they might have cut and dyed their hair. They said they could find no apparent reason for the girls' having left, except they were "unhappy with discipline" at home.

Priscilla is described as having long, blonde hair; she is about 5-4 and weighs around 107 pounds. She was wearing a red corduroy jacket and a black-figured white dress with a full skirt.

Rinda also has long, blonde hair and blue eyes. She's about 5-3 tall and weighs about 119. She was wearing a red sweater, long blue coat and blue skirt. She has a scar on one leg from a burn received when she was a baby.

The parents asked anyone with information to contact Myrtle Creek police.

Camilla Wicks, Violinist, Will Appear Here Friday

Camilla Wicks, who will appear here Friday at 8:15 p.m., at the Roseburg Central Junior High School, is already regarded by many discerning audiences in the concert halls of the world as one of the greatest women violinists today. She is sponsored by the Community Concert Assn.

American born and trained, Miss Wicks began her extensive concertizing in Europe, choosing to test her ability to interpret the European "masters" compositions before their own audiences. She left the United States that first time with only one assured booking in Oslo, Norway. Her success was such that she played a total of 87 additional concerts before the conclusion of that tour, and the music critics of a dozen European countries linked their praises in as many languages.

In Finland, Jan Sibelius heard her performance of his violin concerto, and immediately invited her to visit him at his home—a rare privilege. Since then she has recorded this concerto with the Stockholm radio orchestra in Sweden, which has been released internationally and by Capitol Records in America.

Following this initial European tour, Miss Wicks has returned four times, playing a total of almost 300 additional concerts. She went most recently during this past year. She has recorded more than 20 compositions, including the violin concerto by Norway's Fartein Valen, and in Sweden she premiered the Hilming Rosenberg violin concerto. She has been soloist with the London Symphony Orchestra in Royal Albert Hall, with the Concerts Colonne Orchestra in Paris and with the leading orchestras of the other major European countries.

In April of 1933 the young violinist completed her first coast-to-coast American tour, which included a Carnegie Hall appearance under Dr. Bruno Walter with the New York Philharmonic-symphony.

College President Burned In Effigy

WAKE FOREST, N.C. (AP) — Dr. Harold Tribble, president of Wake Forest College, was burned in effigy by a crowd of 400 to 500 students who milled around his house Monday night, shouting "Down with Tribble!" "Down with Tribble!"

Carrying signs saying they wanted "Big Time Athletics," the students repeatedly called, "Why can't we get great athletes like we used to?"

Tribble told the crowd "no effort is being made at Wake Forest to de-emphasize athletics."

Although Wake Forest's enrollment is only about 1,600, the Baptist college is one of the strongest members of the Atlantic Coast Conference.

A native Californian, Camilla Wicks began her musical studies with her violin father and her pianist mother when only 3½ years old, and made her first appearance with orchestra at the age of 8, in Los Angeles. At 10 she moved to New York to continue her training with Louis Persinger and to study as a fellowship student at the Juillard School of Music. At 12 she made a successful recital in New York's Town Hall, and at 17 made her New York debut with orchestra at Carnegie Hall, playing with the New York Philharmonic Symphony under Arthur Rodzinski. During these years she also played numerous recitals and appeared with such orchestras as those of the Hollywood Bowl, Chicago, San Francisco and Los Angeles.

Both her second and third national tours, during seasons 1933-34 and 1934-35, were highlighted by New York recitals which won for her a collection of reviews from the New York press as is seldom accorded any performer.

Miss Wicks plays the famous "Duke of Cambridge" Stradivarius, dated 1725.
