Death Penalty Sought In Martin Reyes' Trial

CORVALLIS — The state seeks the death penalty for Martin R. Reyes, on trial here for first degree murder.

Reyes, 23, of Seattle, is accused of shooting James H. Applegate here the night of Oct. 24. The state contends Reyes shot Applegate while trying to take his automobile. Reyes had escaped from the Lane County jail earlier in the day and was fleeing from police at the time.

In questioning prospective jurors at Tuesday's opening session, Dist. Atty. Sidney B. Lewis Jr. indicated he would ask death in the state gas chamber and questioned each juror about his views on capital punishment.

Twelve jurors were seated temporarily Tuesday.

Applegate's widow, Francis, and their 16-year-old daughter, Elaine, were spectators at Tuesday's session. So was Reyes' mother, Mrs. Mary Verola, and his half-sister, Diane Verola, 16, both of Seattle.

Glendale Ponders Joining County Library System

The Glendale City Council is now considering whether or not to include the Glendale library in the Douglas County library system.

Miss Carol Trimble, county librarian invited the council to consider such a move at its regular meeting this week, according to correspondent Mrs. G. B. Fox.

Miss Trimble stated that under the county library system books would be rotated to give the Glendale library a new supply regularly. She said further that certain rare and out-of-print books might be retained, according to local decision.

Under the county system, Glendale would be asked to provide the building, lights and heat. The city already has these. The city can also recommend a librarian. The county will provide circulation of books and pay the librarian.

The librarian also visited the Glendale library with two assistants while in Glendale.

The City Council was not asked to make an immediate decision, but appeared to favor the incorporation into the county system, Mrs. Fox said. The county library board will meet with the council at a later date to determine the matter. The county library system will go into operation July 1.

Other business on the council agenda were:

1. Discussion of complaints by several restaurant and garage proprietors concerning the 20-minute parking regulation on the business side of Pacific Avenue. The council voted to retain it. It decided, also, to allow two-hour parking on a cross street.

2. Rejected bids on purchase of a station wagon for the police department. It would double as an ambulance. Instead, it was decided to make repairs on the present police car.

Jet Pilot Flying Blind Brushes Escort, Crashes

RICHMOND, Va. — A Navy jet fighter, whose pilot was flying blind in a hooded cockpit, brushed against an escort plane high over Richmond Wednesday, then dove into a fashionable residential area where it exploded and burned.

Two homes were set afire, a housekeeper suffered burns and an infant was rescued by a nearby workman. There were no other reported injuries.

The pilot made a safe parachute landing after ejecting himself from the crippled Banshee jet at 20,000 feet.

Lt. Edward R. Bristol of Virginia Beach, flying the escort craft, made it back to his Oceana, Va., station. There the Navy disclosed the crash was caused by a collision in flight—a fact of which the downed pilot apparently was unaware. The Navy said one of the planes clipped the other's tail controls.

Ens. Robert Ammann, 22, landed unscathed 15 minutes after the bailout, unaware of the havoc his aircraft carried with it out of the cold overcast skies.

Jury Verdict Favors Defendant In Law Suit

A verdict was returned in favor of the defendant Tuesday in an automobile accident suit for damages in circuit court.

Gayle Fletcher, through her guardian, Marjorie Fletcher, had asked \$25,000 general and \$207.50 special damages of Jack Salburg. The jury ruled in favor of Salburg after the trial had continued for more than a day.

The suit was the result of an accident near Olatia Aug. 14, 1954. Salburg was driving one vehicle, while the girl, then 14 years old, was a passenger in the other.

HOLLYWOOD — The late James Dean, emotion-torn hero of "East Of Eden," and Jenifer Jones, Eurasian doctor of "Love Is A Many Splendored Thing," has been named the top movie performers of the year by the first audience awards poll.

An estimated 15 million fans also voted "Mister Roberts," the best picture and Peggy Lee "Pete Kelly's Blues" and Tah Hunter "Battle Cry" and "Track Of The Cat" the outstanding new personalities.

The first mass polling of moviegoers produced results that could have important bearings on the award of Oscars next March. Certainly Dean, and perhaps Miss Jones, loom as top contenders for Hollywood's premier honor, The Academy Award.

Bad Heart Blamed In Death Of Sutton

A heart condition was blamed Tuesday for the death of John Clare Sutton, 66, who died at his home at noon, according to Coroner L. L. Powers after an autopsy had been performed.

Sutton laid down to rest after he had lunch at his home on Melrose Road and succumbed. He had been a resident of Roseburg for the past 22 years.

Sutton was born at Emerson, Iowa, March 31, 1889, and was married to Laveta Neville at Briggsdale, Colo., May 18, 1924. They came to Roseburg from Loveland, Colo., in 1932. For the past 18 years, he had been a postal employee.

A veteran of World War I, Sutton was a member of Umpqua Post 16 of the American Legion and also of the Federal Postal Employees Assn.

His wife survives, as do eight children: Mrs. Nancy (Anna May) Roth, Milford, Utah, and Mrs. Robert (Maxine) Finch, Mrs. James (Dorothy) Hopkins, Mrs. John (Jacqueline) Parsons, Duane Sutton, Mrs. David (Beulah) Clingman, Clare Sutton and Rita Sutton, all of Roseburg.

His father, Edwin Sutton of Loveland, and two brothers, Vance Sutton of Redding, Calif., and Harold Sutton of Loveland, also survive, as do 12 grandchildren.

Funeral services will be in the chapel of Long & Orr Mortuary Friday, Dec. 9, at 11 a.m., with the Rev. Newell Morgan of the First Christian Church officiating. Concluding services will be under the auspices of the American Legion in the Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

Youth's Story Thought Hoax; Suffers Burns

CLEVELAND — A frail 17-year-old boy's story of being burned into a human torch by three youths who chained him to a tree may be a hoax, detective David E. Kerr said Wednesday.

There were so many discrepancies in the boy's account that further investigation may show the three youths existed only in his imagination, Kerr said.

He is head of the police department's homicide bureau.

Earl R. Fryman, suffering second and third degree burns over about 85 per cent of his body, was in poor condition in a hospital.

Naked, and with a tree branch chained to his waist, he hunched into Fairview Hospital Tuesday night through a kitchen door.

He said three youths had drenched him with turpentine and lit it. He told of walking a mile to reach the hospital, through a heavily wooded valley of the Rocky River in Metropolitan Park.

Missing Girl Found, Suffers From Amnesia

PUEBLO, Colo. — A missing 19-year-old daughter, at first feared the victim of an abduction, was found Wednesday walking on the highway near La Junta, east of here.

Police Capt. James Rafferty said the girl, Donna May Upton, seemed to be in a dazed condition and could not explain her capture.

There was no evidence, he said, to show she had been taken forcibly from her home.

She was dressed in men's clothing and her hair had been clipped short, Rafferty said.

The girl was taken to Parkview Hospital here. Physicians said she had not been raped and her clothing and body showed no signs of a struggle.

Rafferty said the girl told officers at La Junta, "My name is Henry and I am from Baltimore."

He said he learned Miss Upton has a boy friend in Baltimore.

The girl said little else and seemed unable to respond to questioning, Rafferty said she appeared to be suffering from an emotional or mental upset.

Judge Directs Default Judgment

Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich directed a default judgment of \$10,962.50 against a former Riddle man Tuesday.

The judgment was declared in favor of a 2-year-old Riddle boy, Donald Clifford Smalley, and against James Gilmore, the driver of a pickup truck which struck the boy last June 28 in Riddle.

Attempts by the plaintiff's attorneys failed to reveal the whereabouts of Gilmore. The suit was filed in the fall's behalf by his father, Granvel C. Smalley.

The original complaint asked for \$25,000 general and \$962.50 special damages. But Judge Woodrich reduced the amount of general damage to \$10,960.

The boy suffered brain concussion, a fractured leg and lacerations in the accident.

Tenneson Expected From Red China Next Week

HONG KONG — Richard R. Tenneson, American GI who chose to stay in Red China after the Korean War and then decided to leave, is expected to arrive at the Hong Kong border next week.

Officials said Wednesday this word had been received from the British Embassy in Peking.

The British Red Cross said Nov. 30 it had been informed by the Chinese Red Cross that Tenneson, 22, of Alton, Minn., had been released and was free to leave.

Joseph Pope, 82, Dies In Hospital

Joseph Owen Pope, 82, well known resident of Roseburg, died at a local hospital Tuesday following a prolonged illness.

He was born at Nashville, Tenn., on July 31, 1873, and moved to Jacksonville, Ore., about 1900. Later he resided at Murphy, Ore. He was married at Gold Hill on Dec. 26, 1905, to Grace May Eaton. He came to Roseburg in 1927. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Roseburg.

Survivors include the wife, Grace, Roseburg; one son, Roland E. Pope, Roseburg; a sister, Susan Jane Pope, Mansfield, Mo.; two brothers, William C. Pope of Mountain Grove, Mo., and John W. Pope of Fairfax, Mo.

Funeral services will be held at the chapel of Long & Orr Mortuary Thursday at 2 p.m., with the Rev. Henry Fox of the First Baptist Church officiating. Concluding services and interment will follow at Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

E. Germans Arrest Two American GIs; Identity Not Given

BERLIN — East Berlin Communists, exercising new Soviet-granted sovereignty, announced Wednesday they have arrested two American soldiers.

The two were not identified, and the U.S. Army could not immediately confirm the announcement broadcast by the East Berlin Radio.

But it raised speculation the Communists would use the two soldiers as an example, put them on trial before one of their courts, and thus demonstrate that East Berlin, as the Russians declared last week, is no longer occupied territory.

The Communist East Berlin newspaper, Bz Am Abend, said however East Berlin police had turned the Americans over to Soviet military authorities.

The Bz also did not name the soldiers, but it used a picture of a uniformed American holding his hand over his face, with the caption "one of the gangsters."

The radio said the two were arrested after beating a male cabaret performer unconscious. The performer was identified as Werner Lierck.

The radio announcement was later confirmed by the official East German news agency ADN.

ADN said the two soldiers attempted to flee by jumping into a taxi and ordering the driver to take them to the East-West sector boundary. The driver agreed, and drove them until he found two Communist policemen.

ADN said the incident occurred at 2:45 a.m. as Lierck and his wife were leaving a bar in East Berlin.

The soldiers had also been in the bar, ADN said.

The East Berlin Radio said the two soldiers made "provocative" remarks to Lierck as they were leaving the bar. Lierck replied that they were on "territory" of the East German "Republic" and that he forbade such utterances.

This angered one of the soldiers, and he beat Lierck into unconsciousness.

A special meeting of the Roseburg school board "to plan for the continued growth of Roseburg schools" will be held Wednesday at 8 p.m., according to Supt. Mike Deller.

The meeting, to be held in the superintendent's office of the Central Junior High School, is open to the public.

Colorful visual aids will be utilized to show the progress of growth of Roseburg schools and their expected growth over the next five years. According to the plan of growth depicted by these aids and based on compiled statistics, expansion in the Roseburg system will parallel that of other fast-growing sections of the nation, Deller said.

The visual aids chart this growth and indicate that expansion of facilities here will be necessary to meet the expected five-year development, he concluded.

Supt. Deller extended a welcome to the public to attend.
