

House Investigators End Hoover Commission Report Hearing Held In Portland

PORTLAND, Ore. — A House subcommittee investigating the Hoover Commission report on power resources, wound up two days of hearings here Tuesday with 29 witnesses having been heard.

Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said the report was biased in favor of private power companies. Utility firms oppose multi-purpose dams because they threaten private power monopolies, he said. He also objected to a Hoover Commission proposal that river users be charged for operating on the rivers.

"The private utilities hope to discourage both navigation and power projects because power and navigation are twin results of river development, and an increase in federal power is regarded as a threat to monopolies in this field," Neuberger said.

Allan Smith, an attorney representing the private utilities, said

that the cost of dam building was becoming so great that private firms want to share the cost on a "partnership" basis with the federal government.

Lewis A. Stanley, Oregon state engineer, urged the committee to support legislation to assure state sovereignty over non-navigable waters within state boundaries.

State Sen. John C. F. Merrifield, Portland, told of the action of the last session of the Oregon Legislature in setting up a water resources board and a ground water code.

Vivian Jones, of Tacoma City Light, urged legislation for "partnership" construction as well as sale of facilities to regional public bodies.

O. H. Johnson of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce said Congress should recognize the right of state control except for navigation and other power specifically granted the federal government.

Gus Norwood of the Northwest Public Power Assn. and Henry Alderman, publisher of a REA magazine, urged opposition to Hoover recommendations which would weaken the position of public power.

Others testifying included: R. E. Kerr of the Farm Bureau; Ken Billington of the Washington Public Utility District Assn.; Clyde Riddell of the Southwest Washington Public Utility District Assn.; Oregon State Sen. Monroe Sweetland; and A. Lars Nelson of the Washington State Grange.

GOP Administration Favors Sugar Grower Demands On Market

SCOTTSDALE, Neb. (P.—Rep. Hill (R-Colo.) told the National Sugar Beet Growers Federation this week the Eisenhower administration is favorable to the domestic sugar growers' demand for a share of the annual increase in the U.S. market.

He made the statement after the federation executive secretary, Richard W. Blake, Greeley, Colo., said the group's program calls for the domestic growers to get 55 per cent of increases in consumption beginning in 1956.

Fixed quotas of the present law are penalizing the American farmer for his hard won gains in efficiency, Hill declared.

"Instead of being able to profit from a 20 per cent increase in per acre yields since 1948, the American sugar farmer has been forced to cut back his plantings by thousands of acres to keep production within the rigid marketing quotas," Hill said.

As the law now stands, 96 per cent of each year's increase goes to Cuba and the remaining four per cent to foreign countries, Hill said.

Reyes Has Visit With Mother Before Trial

CORVALLIS, Ore. — Martin B. Reyes, 23, Seattle, went on trial for murder here today minutes after a surprise reunion with his mother on the courthouse stairs.

His mother, Mrs. Mary Verzola of Seattle, was struggling on crutches up the steep stairs when Reyes came out of the courtroom just before the jury drawing began.

He saw her on the stairs and tried to smile. She looked up and he ran to her. She sobbed in his arms, then he helped her into the law library where they were allowed to talk briefly before he was taken before Circuit Judge Fred McHenry.

Reyes is charged with shooting down James R. Applegate, father of three, in the course of an escape from the jail at nearby Eugene Oct. 24. Applegate had grappled with him rather than give up his car in which his family was sitting, and was shot in the struggle.

Mrs. Verzola was on crutches because of an injury suffered when hit by a car. That accident happened the same day Reyes left home in Seattle on the trip which led to his arrest.

Charge Dropped Because Of Publication Failure

Because regulations of the Oregon Fish Commission weren't published twice in a newspaper of general circulation in Douglas County, the illegal fishing charge against a Reedsport woman was dismissed in district court Tuesday.

Edith Louise Maupin was arrested by state police near Reedsport May 27 and charged with fishing for shad with a dip net tied to shore.

Her attorney, however, claimed regulations hadn't been published. The state admitted the fact and moved for dismissal of the case because of insufficient evidence.

The dismissal came just before the woman was to have stood trial on the count. She had pleaded innocent.
