Graham, Ameche Take Pro Titles

PHILADELPHIA — Otto Graham and Alan Ameche appear to have the passing and running titles respectively all wrapped up for delivery after next weekend's final regular season National Football League games.

Graham, who last Sunday completed a brilliant job of pitching the Cleveland Browns to their sixth straight divisional title, increased his lead over runner-up Eddie Brown of the Chicago Bears. Graham has amassed 1,480 yards and 12 touchdowns on 85 completions of 160 passes. He has averaged 9.25 yards per pass.

On the ground, Ameche, the Baltimore Colts star rookie full-back, now holds a 133 yard lead over Cleveland's Fred Morrison. The former Wisconsin ace leads the league in attempts with 197 on which he has gained 932 yards, and average of 4.7 per carry. Morrison gained 104 yards against Pittsburgh last Sunday to move from third to second place with 146 attempts for 799 yards. His average of 5.5 is tops in the league.

Leaders in other departments: Pete Pihos of Philadelphia, the pass receiver, with 31 receptions for 750 yards, and 7 TDs; Doak Walker, Detroit, the scorers with 85 points on 6 TDs, 25 conversions and 8 field goals; Norman Van Brocklin, Los Angeles, the punter on a 44.3 yard average.

Texas Aggies Caused Most Raised Eyebrows

 Football experts in the Southwest readily admit they can't predict the outcome of the Southwest Conference race and the team they pick to finish last is just as likely to finish first.

But the Texas Aggies, the pre-season choice to occupy the cellar in that league, caused more eyes to pop and eyebrows to rise than any other football team in the nation during the 1955 season.

They did it merely by stepping out in front at the start of the season and staying there almost until the last game had been played.

Only one other team even came close in the balloting to pick the biggest surprise of the season. That was Michigan State, which also went far beyond pre-season expectations.

Of 149 sportswriters and broadcasters replying to the annual Associated Press post-season questionnaire, 58 named Texas A&M and 37 tabbed Michigan State.

Notre Dame drew seven votes for its surprisingly good showing and Army six for its failure to live up to pre-season forecasts. The ballots were returned before the Notre Dame-Southern California and Army-Navy games, which might have changed a few of these opinions.

Nashua, 61 Others To Be Up For Sale

NEW YORK — A Nashua, 3-year-old champion and leading money winner of 1955 whose earning power still is estimated at more than \$500,000, no longer will run under the familiar white-and-red dotted colors of the Belair stud.

The first step in the dissolution of the famous stable, rumored since the death of William Woodward Jr. Oct. 30, was taken yesterday when executors of Woodward's estate placed Nashua and 61 other thoroughbreds up for public sale.

The executors called for sealed bids by Dec. 15.

Lefty O'Doul To Boss Vancouver PCL Team

OAKLAND, Calif. — Clarence (Brick) Laws, president of the Vancouver 100, west franchise holder in the Pacific Coast Baseball League, announced Tuesday he has appointed Frank (Lefty) O'Doul to manage the team.

As 1955 manager of the Oakland club owned by Laws, O'Doul was reported to have been paid \$18,000 a year. The Oakland franchise was transferred to Vancouver after the close of the season.

O'Doul, 38, managed the San Francisco Seals for 17 years, then went to San Diego where, in 1954, he won the Coast League pennant.

Shanley Among NCAA Top 10 In Ground Gain

NEW YORK — George Welsh, who served as Navy's air-arm, is the individual total offense champion of major college football, but only by a scant 35 yards over Arizona's Art Luppino, who made all his gains by running and romped off with his second straight rushing title.

Welsh, the individual passing king as well, topped the Arizona junior in the final game of the season by picking up 155 yards against Army. Luppino, meanwhile, was checked at 68 yards by Arizona State for his lowest one-game output of the season.

That gave Welsh a season total of 1,348 yards in nine games, according to final NCAA Service Bureau figures released Wednesday, while Luppino collared 1,313 in 10 games.

The NCAA's top ten rushers also included Sam Brown of UCLA, No. 5, with 829 yards in 10 games, and Jim Shanley of Oregon, with 711 yards in 19 games.

Luppino, first ever to win the rushing crown in two consecutive seasons, also is the first to finish as high as second in the total offense race on rushing alone. With one season remaining, he's just 154 yards short of the all-time college career record of 3,212 yards set by Wisconsin's Alan Ameche.

Welsh won his offense crown with just 203 plays, tying the all-time low by a champion set by Oklahoma A&M's Bob Feinmore in 1945.

All-America Earl Morrill of Michigan State had the top average gain for rushing-passing plays with 9.1 yards, third best in history for a minimum total gain of 1,000 yards. Notre Dame's Paul Hornung had the single-game rushing-passing high, gaining 394 yards against Southern California in the finale.

Final formation of the Industrial Basketball League will be held at a meeting late in December as yet unnamed specifically.

Six teams are definitely expected to take part, according to basketball Commissioner Lewis McAllister and any others interested in representation should be present at the late-December confab. The league is expected to start play around Jan. 5 with one round scheduled to be played.

All Salmon, Steelies Have Fins Clipped At State Hatchery

To evaluate the use of hatcheries in the propagation of salmon and steelhead and to more accurately determine fish migrations, all salmon and steelhead reared at the Oregon Game Commission hatcheries are being marked for future identification.

Fins clipping of young fish is now being carried out at several game commission hatcheries. Up to Nov. 15, more than 91,000 steelhead were marked and released from the Willamette hatchery during the year, 100,000 chinook and 27,500 silver salmon from the Rock Creek hatchery, 27,500 silvers from the Bandon hatchery, and 6,000 silvers from the Cedar Creek hatchery.

The young steelhead and salmon are being marked as they reach migrant size from 6 to 8 inches in length. More than 750,000 steelhead and salmon are scheduled for release this year.

The concerted marking program has been under way since 1951. Since it takes from 2 to 3 years for the migrants to return, a maximum of marked fish is expected to show up in sport and commercial catches this year.

Accurate studies are being conducted on several coastal streams. Studies on the Umpqua River show that of the 1954 total run of 842 silver salmon, approximately 20 per cent were from game commission hatchery origin. Of the 1955 run, approximately 12½ per cent were from game commission releases. Along the south coast 123 approximately 15 per cent — of 812 silver salmon examined in the sport and commercial fishery had game commission markings.

Although marked fish have been obtained from other coastal streams where game commission releases have been made, the information is as yet too meager to analyze. Sportmen are urged to take their marked fish to game commission fishery agents for careful scrutiny and positive identification.

NEW YORK — Johnny Saxton of New York, Duilio Lo of Italy and Fred Galiana of Spain were elevated today to top ranking in their divisions in the latest boxing ratings of Ring magazine.

Saxton, Loi Boosted in Ring Mag Rating

Saxton, an ex-champion, replaced another doped welterweight king, Tony DeMarco of Boston, in the No. 1 contender's berth in the 147-pound class. DeMarco, who was stopped last Wednesday for the second time by champion Carmen Basilio, dropped to third.

Basilio was named "Fighter of the Month" by Editor Nat Fleischer. Loi, who recently defended his European lightweight title and has a long victory streak alive, was named the leading challenger for champion Wallace (Bud) Smith.

Johnnie Carter, ex-champ, was demoted to second.

Galiana, who captured the European featherweight crown from France's Ray Fumechon, jumped from eighth to first among the challengers of 126-pound ruler Sandy Saddler.

France's Charley Humez moved back from third to second among the middleweights while Argentina's slugging 160-pounder, Eduardo (KO) Lausse, climbed from fourth to third.

The retirement of Toronto's Earl Walls and the defeat of Germany's Heinz Neuhaus by light heavyweight Gerhard Hecht created two vacancies in the heavyweight class. They were filled by Johnny Summerlin, Detroit, in seventh place, and Harold Carter, London, "V" in the ninth spot. Ezzard Charles, former heavyweight king, was dropped to eighth.

Other heavyweight ratings behind champion Rocky Marciano were (1) Archie Moore, (2) Bob Baker, (3) Nino Valdes, (4) Tony Jackson, (5) Jimmy Slade, (6) Johnny Holman and (10) Franco Cavicholi.

The first southpaw to win the American Bowling Congress tournament singles title was Marshall Levey of St. Louis. He tied with a 624 series in 1907 at St. Louis, then won the rolloff.
