Police arrested Maury at his home. He offered no resistance.

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## Too Much Emphasis Placed On Trivial Actions, Says New York Pediatrician

BOSTON (U.P.) — A New York pediatrician said today parents place too much importance upon trivial actions—like finger sucking—by their children.

Dr. Harry Bakwin told the American Medical Assn.'s ninth clinical session that finger sucking by babies is no more a psychiatric problem than "gum chewing in children and cigarette smoking in adults."

Most such "behavior problems" are trivial, even when they seem of major importance, he said. The family doctor can handle them by giving "a few simple, commonsense suggestions," he said.

He warned in a prepared address that even more serious problems of childhood may not be psychiatric and it is a mistake to assume that these usually arise from parental mismanagement.

Before blaming it on the parents, he said, the family doctor should make sure the child is not suffering from such things as minor brain damage, visual or hearing defects or chronic disease.

"There are so many behavior problems that the general physician must treat them because

there are not enough psychiatrists," he said. "Unfortunately the general physician has been frightened by fear, engendered by the psychiatrists, that he may 'do harm' by the incompleteness of his knowledge."

Dr. Harold Jacobson, assistant commissioner of the maternal and child care services of the New York City Department of Health, told the session that accidental poisoning of children isn't really accidental.

A recent study, he said, shows that poisonings occur in direct proportion to the degree of accessibility of the poisoning agent.

Out of 454 cases studied, Dr. Jacobson said, 40 per cent resulted from agents available in open places and 16 per cent were from agents in closed but unlocked places easily reachable by a small child.

## Gov. Griffin Hanged In Effigy In Coast City

ASTORIA, Ore. — Georgia's Gov. Marvin Griffin was hanged in effigy here Monday night, the second time that has happened in recent days in Oregon.

Bob Chessman, publisher of the Astorian-Budget, said that whoever did it took some pains to get publicity. Chessman said he got a phone call at his home Monday night telling him the effigy was hanging from a tree in the post-office lawn.

Then, said Chessman, after there had been time for him to send a photographer, police got an anonymous call telling them of the effigy hanging in apparent protest to Griffin's proposal that Georgia Tech's football team pass up the Sugar Bowl because its opponent, Pittsburgh, has a Negro on the squad.

A sign said: "Down with Griffin and his kind in Georgia or anywhere. They have diseased our country. Stop them at once. Write your congressman."

A similar incident occurred on the University of Oregon campus over the weekend.

## Freezing Weather Hurts Washington Berry Crops

OLYMPIA, Wash. — The late November cold snap which gripped Western Washington for four days caused crop damage estimated Monday by Governor Langlie at more than 12 million dollars.

In announcing that he has asked federal aid for stricken farmers, Langlie said berry growers were the hardest hit by winter's sneak preview, which sent the temperature sliding to near zero readings west of the Cascades.

Langlie said a survey indicated berry growers, and strawberry growers in particular, suffered damage estimated at \$9,483,120.

Langlie said some 9,000 of the 10,500 acres of strawberries under cultivation in Western Washington will have to be replanted.

The state's chief executive said the survey indicated there will be no commercial crop of raspberries in Western Washington next year.

The balance of damage was suffered by nurserymen, holly growers, Christmas tree farmers and seed-growers.

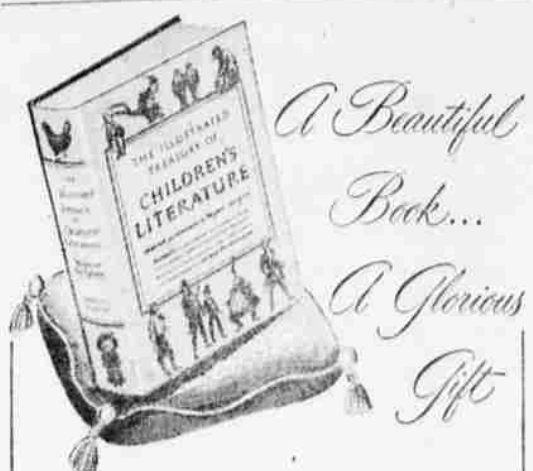
