

Young Psychologist Wins \$64,000 Prize On Television Show

NEW YORK (AP)—A pretty young psychologist who became interested in boxing through her husband answered a knotty question on the sport last night to pocket \$64,000 in television winnings.

The contestant, Dr. Joyce Brothers, 28, of New York City became the second person to win the top prize on the CBS show the \$64,000 Question. The first was Marine Capt. Richard S. McCutchen, whose category was cooking.

Dr. Brothers, wife of a hospital interne, had as an assistant last night Eddie Eagan, ex-olympic boxing champion and former New York State Boxing Commission chairman. The show allows an expert to help at the \$64,000 level. She named Gustus as the special gloves gladiator in the final round. Daniel Mendoza as the first of scientific boxers to become champion of England. In 1791, Gentleman John Jackson as the English champion who taught boxing to post Alfred Lord Byron. William Hazlitt as the essayist who wrote "The Fight" after seeing Bill Neat defeat Thomas Hickman in England in 1821 and "Hickman The Gasman" as the latter's nickname.

She also answered that John Sholto Douglas was the full name of the Marquis of Queensbury. Rome was the city and Pauline O'Donoghue the opponent in Primo Carnera's heavyweight title defense in 1933, and that Jack Dempsey knocked down Luis Firpo nine times in their famous bout and that the fight lasted 3 minutes and 37 seconds.

Dr. Brothers said she knew all the answers herself, but she checked some with Eagan to make sure.

Realty Board Favors Sewer Bonding Issue

The Douglas County Realty Board is another group which has gone on record in favor of the \$1,100,000 sewer bond issue and the method of sewer assessment charges.

The announcement was made by Pete Serafin, a committee member of the organization in charge of study of the issue. He said it is the board's opinion that it is the "best thing for the community in the long run." He said the decision was reached after extensive study of the engineering information.

He said this statement is true both for those on the present sewer system and those not yet served. He said the present system is "antiquated" and will have to be replaced in the near future.

Serafin said all indications point to an increase cost of construction in the future, so it would be cheaper to start construction in 1956 than in a later year.

He said the major point the board decided in favor of the sewer service charge is the fact it will prevent future additional ad valorem taxes. "As a matter of fact," he said, "it may tend to decrease taxes because the service charge would eventually replace the tax for present sewer maintenance."

Turning to another point, Serafin reported that FHA and VA guaranteed loans are virtually stopped for those not presently on the sewer system. He said the reason is the great number of septic tanks now in use. He said the two agencies feel the ground has reached its absorption point.

Americans' Income Has Another Sharp Increase

WASHINGTON (AP)—Another sharp increase in Americans' personal income during October raised the 10-month total to the rate of 391 billion dollars a year, the Commerce Department reported Wednesday.

This figure is 14 billions higher than the annual rate for the first 10 months of 1954.

For October, personal income reached a record high rate of 39.9 billion dollars a year, more than 14 billions higher than in September.

Two-thirds of the rise was attributed to bigger wage and salary payments, reflecting both increases in wage rates and gains in employment. Wage increases were a major factor.

The other one-third of the increase represented a continuation of the year's rise in interest and dividend payments and the income of the proprietors of business.
