Six Persons Die In Detroit House Fire Early Today

DETROIT (AP) — Six persons, three of them small children, died Thursday in a fire which destroyed a two-story frame house occupied by two families.

Neighbors, awakened by screams of the victims, put ladders against the burning structure in rescue efforts and managed to get the father of one of the two families down to safety.

The six other occupants perished.

The dead were identified as Otto Harrison, 33; his wife, Pauline, 31, and their two children, Geraldine, 8, and Dolores, 3; and Mrs. Lucille Griffin, 34, and her 23-month-old son, Pleas Michael Griffin Jr.

Pleas Griffin, 38, the lone survivor, told police he was asleep in his family's second-floor apartment when he smelled smoke.

He opened the bedroom door and found the hallway a mass of flames.

Griffin said: "I smashed a window in hopes we could get to safety that way and called to my wife to come on. Apparently she went back for the baby. By then our apartment was full of smoke and fire and I tried to get to my wife, but failed, and finally managed to crawl onto the roof."

Neighbors extinguished Griffin's blazing clothing and took him to a nearby hospital. He was reported in serious condition.

Minister George Yeh on the latter's return from a conference with Chiang said: "There is no change in our position."

Gov. Patterson Sees Need For Federal Aid To Build Schools In Distress Areas

SALEM — Gov. Paul Patterson said Thursday he is convinced the federal government should help Oregon solve its school building problem.

But, he cautioned, he does not believe in federal aid for operation of the schools.

He returned this week from Washington, D. C., where the White House Conference on Education recommended federal aid for construction of school buildings.

The State Department of Education says that Oregon will need \$5 million dollars worth of school construction by 1960.

The problem is critical in residential areas outside Portland. Those districts couldn't build the schools they need even if they bonded themselves to their limits.

These are the so-called "distressed districts," and they are the ones the governor believes should be helped by the federal government. He says the state doesn't have the money to do it.

A minority of the conference supported federal aid for operation and maintenance of schools. Patterson opposes this, saying it would bring federal control of the schools.

"The Oregon delegation to the conference wants federal aid for distressed districts," the governor said.

"I concur heartily. But we must solve our problems on the local level to the fullest extent possible. Once we start taking federal aid, I fear it might grow, and bring about federal control of education. All states should finance their schools as far as possible, so they can keep education in the hands of the local people."

"An individual family's voice couldn't be heard if there were federal control."

"Our educational system is the foundation of the strength of our form of government. Regardless of how well meaning a group at the national level would be, federal control would bring about regimentation of education."

Another serious problem is to find enough teachers. There aren't enough now, and the shortage is expected to become severe in the next four or five years.

Patterson said he concurs with the conference's recommendations. These call for giving teachers the same status and prestige that is given to other professions, paying them large enough salaries to compete with other professions and giving them responsibility, freedom, and challenges to their initiative.

Oregon had 18 delegates at the meeting. Total attendance was about 2,000.

"The delegates," the governor said, "came home to Oregon with the feeling that the road we are traveling has been the correct one. We have the feeling that Oregon is not falling behind in its educational efforts, and that we are
