

AFL-CIO Charts Huge Enlistment Plan For Workers

NEW YORK (AP)—The AFL-CIO today charted a giant organizing drive to enlist "millions" of new members in the two years before the next AFL-CIO convention.

Both George Meany, former AFL president and new AFL-CIO chief, and Walter Reuther, former head of the CIO, now a vice president in the merged organization, pledged an all-out recruiting campaign.

Stepped-up organizing was the major theme of the final session of the AFL-CIO founding convention yesterday. Reuther reported that former CIO unions have already pledged four million dollars as an organizing fund. Former AIF unions are also expected to contribute.

The chemical, textile, and paper industries were mentioned as initial targets for union organizers as well as office and building industry workers.

"I am sure for the spirit I have seen at this convention, that we can do this job," Meany told delegates. "We can do it in a way that will warm the hearts of the veterans of our movement."

Reuther said that by organizing and obtaining higher wages for presently nonunion workers, the AFL-CIO could turn them into "first-class citizens," increase purchasing power and raise living standards.

Graveside Services Held For Veteran

Graveside funeral services for a former Roseburg resident were held at the Veterans Cemetery here this morning. He was Harry S. Sargent, 56, who died Dec. 3 in a veterans' hospital in Spokane.

Sargent was a lifelong resident of Oregon and a veteran of World War I.

Surviving are four brothers, Arve of Springfield, Oscar of Coquille and William and Clifford of Bandon; and two sisters, Mrs. Grace Birch, Myrtle Point, and Mrs. Ella Wilson, Clifton, Calif.

The Rev. Nathaniel Wallen, VA hospital chaplain, officiated at the services. Roseburg Funeral Home was in charge of local arrangements.

Multnomah Co. Sheriff's Post Is Questioned

SALEM (AP)—Gov. Patterson has asked Atty. Gen. Thornton for an opinion on whether the governor should remove Terry Schunk, Multnomah County sheriff, from office.

The governor said he doesn't believe the law required him to, but he is asking Thornton's opinion to try to settle the matter.

The question was raised after a circuit court jury recently awarded a Grants Pass woman a \$12,870 judgment against Schunk. She said Schunk's staff had failed to serve a summons in a damage case.

Schunk is bonded at \$10,000. A state law says, "The governor shall declare vacant the office of every officer required by law to execute an official bond whenever a judgment is obtained against such officer for a breach of the conditions of the bond."

But Schunk appealed from the circuit court decision, and William Langley, Multnomah County district attorney, said he believed that stopped action on the bond. "There has been considerable political speculation on the case, because Schunk is mentioned prominently as a Democratic candidate for secretary of state."

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Mountain Roads Again Covered With Snow

SALEM (AP)—Oregon's mountain highways were covered with packed snow Friday, the Highway Commission warned.

Chains were required at Williamette Pass, Austin and Bly.

The commission said that chains should be carried at Government Camp, Timberline, Green Springs, Santiam Pass, Meacham and Seneca.

The heaviest snowfall in 24 hours was 14 inches at Austin and 12 inches at Santiam Pass. Amounts at other mountain stations varied from 3 to 6 inches.

Packed snow at other points was sanded.

Wolf Discloses Early Life At Portland Hearing

PORTLAND (AP)—Victor Lawrence Wolf told of his early life and his two unsuccessful marriages Friday as his attorneys sought to keep him from the gag chamber.

A jury in the court of Judge James Crawford is hearing the case to determine Wolf's punishment for setting a bomb that killed attorney Oliver Kermit Smith here last April.

He confessed doing it and under a rarely used law is having a hearing to determine the degree of his guilt.

His attorneys called him to the stand Friday to tell the story he has told before—that he killed Smith because of his love for and at the urging of Mrs. Smith.

Mrs. Smith, acquitted of a murder charge in the case, testified Thursday, following in large part the story she told in her own trial in which she won freedom.

She agreed she had sent Wolf a Valentine only eight days after remarriage to her husband, but she said she had no significant relationship with him as she did with her first husband.

One of his early references to Mrs. Smith Friday was to say that she referred to her rooming house where he lived, as "the house of divorce."

Democrat Given CAB Appointment By Eisenhower

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP)—President Eisenhower has picked G. Joseph Minetti, a New York Democrat, to succeed former Sen. Joseph R. Eastman on the Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB).

Minetti's recess appointment, announced late Thursday, ticks him for the CAB post when Lee's six-year term ends Dec. 31. The New Yorker is now a Federal Maritime Board member, appointed by Eisenhower in August, 1954.

Lee's departure from CAB, plus reports that chairman Ross R. Wiley leave soon also, could lead to some uncertainty concerning the board's recent important decision affecting nonscheduled airlines.

Last Nov. 15 the five-man board which sets the economic regulations for the nation's air carriers handed down a 3-2 decision aimed at strengthening the non-scheduled airlines, no longer confined to irregular and infrequent flight.

Riley, Lee and Democratic member Joseph P. Adams made up the majority while Republicans Chan Gurney and Harman Denny strongly dissented. With Lee and possibly Riley out of the picture, the regularly scheduled airlines—buter rivals of the non-scheduled—might ask and win CAB reconsideration of the Nov. 15 decision.

The meeting will open at 10 a.m. according to Curtis T. Boscher, central committee chairman. The meeting will include orientation for party members and discussion of plans for the coming campaign.

A business session is scheduled at 1 p.m., following recess for lunch.

Army Issues Draft Call For 6,000 In February

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Army Friday issued a draft call for 6,000 men in February, the lowest quota since drafts were resumed in September, 1950, after the outbreak of the war in Korea.

At the same time the Defense Department said the previously announced draft of 8,000 men for the Army in January had been reduced to 6,000.

The Navy, after asking for 10,000 draftees in November and the same number in December, announced that its volunteer enlistment and re-enlistment progress makes further calls on selective service unnecessary.

JAUNTIER MAILMAN

WASHINGTON (AP)—Keep your eye out for a jauntier mailman. The Post Office Department has approved a restyling of the garb for 100,000 letter carriers and special delivery messengers. Trousers and jackets will continue to be cadet blue-grey, but hereafter there will be blue instead of green shirts and maroon ties and uniform trim instead of the present black.

GOP Said Trying To Pin Tammany Tag On Harriman

WASHINGTON (AP)—Comments of Republican senators added up today to an apparent GOP attempt to pin a Tammany Hall label on Gov. Averell Harriman of New York, eyed as a prospective Democratic presidential aspirant next year.

In the wake of a jab at Harriman by White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty, Sen. Hickenlooper (R-Iowa) said in an interview that "I've assumed he is a Tammany Hall candidate."

In a somewhat similar vein, Sen. Francis Case (R-S.D.) said that Harriman may not be a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination but "at least the leader of Tammany Hall seems intent on making him one."

Sen. Watkins (R-Utah) said that Tammany Hall wanted to name a candidate in the past but that no one who had a chance for the prize wanted "the handicap of Tammany Hall."

Carmine DeSapio, Tammany leader, is Harriman's chief booster for the Democratic nomination. He described Tammany Monday in a radio talk as the New York County Democratic organization and said that "except for the myth that has been created... it is no different from any other organization."

Harriman has said he is not an "active" candidate, but he allows himself to be put in a candidate's position by the leader of Tammany Hall.

DeSapio had said earlier that Harriman would be more than a "token" candidate.

Hagerty referred to DeSapio's statement yesterday in telling newsmen that Harriman was the first man in history to be "nominated" for the presidency by Tammany Hall.

"For a man who isn't a candidate," said Hagerty "it seems to me a curious thing that he allows himself to be put in a candidate's position by the leader of Tammany Hall."

Soldier Relates Swallowing Notes In Prisoner Camp

FT. LEWIS, Wash. (AP)—A soldier told an Army court Thursday he swallowed notes while a prisoner of war in Korea to keep them from the enemy.

Chief Warrant Officer Dwight E. Cox, 32, Fresno, Calif., was called to defense before No. 13 at the court martial of Lt. Col. Paul V. Liles, 29, Birmingham, Ala., being tried on charges he collaborated with the Communists while their captive.

Cox said Liles had given him in a prison camp at Pyongyang, before his repatriation, and he had hidden them in his uniform.

The witness said he got rid of the notes when the Communists started a shake-down of the camp. "When I saw they were making a thorough search," he said, "I took the papers out and chewed them up."

Cox did not tell the court what was in the papers.

He testified, however, he had copied an escape plan hatched by Liles for helicopter rescue of 70 POWs while they were at a camp near Pyongyang, on a 480 inch sheet of paper. The paper was hidden in a belt in hope one of the POWs would be repatriated and could carry it to America Army officials, he said.

Medal Winner Jailed On Charge

BALTIMORE (AP)—A Medal of Honor winner of World War I convicted of shooting at a woman in an argument about a former girl friend.

Junior J. Spurrier, winner of the Medal of Honor and the Distinguished Service Cross, the nation's two highest awards for courage, was charged with assault with a deadly weapon.

He fired a pistol shot into the floor near Mrs. Josephine Neece, who was trying to prevent him from seeing Mrs. Mary Murphy, a resident of the same house.

Spurrier told Magistrate Simon Schofield he pulled the gun when Mrs. Neece wouldn't let him talk. "I didn't think it was loaded," he said. "I just pulled the trigger. It went into the floor, not even near her."

Mrs. Neece, however, said, "He shot at me."

French Jockeying For High Position

PARIS (AP)—With less than 48 hours until final final time, political leaders throughout France jockeyed feverishly today for alliances to improve their chances in the election of a new National Assembly Jan. 2.

The legal period for posting electoral alliances expires at midnight tomorrow in each of the nation's departmental provinces. In many cases leaders held back until the last moment for local tactical reasons.

Two main currents already are visible, however.

One is based on a "Republican Front" grouping unveiled yesterday by Guy Mollet, secretary general of the French Socialist party, and former Premier Pierre Mendes-France, leader of the leftist wing of the Socialist party.

The Socialist had 101 seats in the Assembly dissolved Nov. 30 by Premier Edgar Faure's Cabinet. The Radical Socialists had 70 members, with about half of them controlled by Mendes-France.

The left wing of the Social Republican Gaullist party and the Union of Democratic and Socialist Republicans (UDSR) also are considered part of the "Republican Front."

More Witnesses Take Stand In Reyes Trial

CORVALLIS (AP)—The prosecution brought more witnesses to the stand Friday in its attempt to convict Martin B. Reyes, 23, Seattle, of first-degree murder.

Ten state witnesses testified Thursday as the prosecution opened its case against Reyes, who is accused of shooting James R. Applegate, 39, Corvallis, last October.

These included Roy Chamberlain Corvallis, who said he was at the scene when Applegate was shot Chamberlain identified Reyes as the gunman.

Dist. Atty. Sidney B. Lewis Jr., who is demanding the death penalty, said Reyes broke out of jail at Eugene after being arrested on a car theft charge. In Corvallis he attempted to commandeer the car in which Applegate's two daughters were sitting, Lewis said. Applegate was shot when he tried to stop Reyes, he added.

Soil Bank Plan Alternate Is Talked At Meet

PENDLETON (AP)—The Oregon Wheat Growers League spent considerable time Thursday discussing a possible alternate to the soil bank proposal.

The league will decide before the close of this annual meeting Saturday whether to endorse the soil bank proposal or an alternate suggestion.

William Lorenzen, Pendleton farmer, presented the alternate plan that was discussed Thursday. He would have high-producing wheat farms contribute to a fund from which payments would be made to other growers to retire marginal lands from production.

He estimated payments of 50 cents a bushel would induce farmers with a 10- to 15-bushel average to retire their land. He also estimated it would take 210 million dollars to bring about retirement of 12 million acres of marginal land. That would mean a levy of 27 cents a bushel from growers who stay in production, Lorenzen estimated.

At full parity price, that would leave them a return of about \$1.95 a bushel, he said.

Tongay In Padded Cell; Suicide Attempt Told

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Former swimming instructor Russell Tongay, sentenced to Florida prison for manslaughter in the death of his Aquator daughter, is in a padded cell here Friday.

He made what a jailer termed "an insincere suicide attempt" Thursday.

The jailer, Will Roe, said he found Tongay, 39, with both wrists slashed, apparently from a double-edged razor blade. A note nearby included a Bible quotation. But the jail physician said the cuts were superficial.

The jailer reported Tongay had been despondent since his arrest here on Nov. 21, eight days after he escaped from a prison guard in New Orleans. He is awaiting return to Florida.
