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VOTE OF CONFIDENCE

Roseburg voters Thursday gave a resounding vote of confidence to the community's future. By approving the two issues submitted at the special city election — proposals to issue bonds for a sewage disposal system and construction of trunk lines, together with a service fee to cover bond retirement and maintenance costs — voters evidenced their belief in continued growth of the community. They further expressed their determination that Roseburg shall continue to offer a clean, sanitary environment; a desirable place in which to build homes.

I must admit I was pleasantly surprised by the outcome. I imagine many other residents were likewise surprised. I thought the improvement projects had little chance when the rain gods chose election day to dish up one of the worst storms of the season.

Normally, when weather is so disagreeable, the opposition, less easily discouraged, polls a greater percentage of its strength than does the pro faction. I believe we can safely assume that such was the case in Thursday's election. Thus, the fact that the projects were approved by a substantial margin, even in a light vote, would indicate an even stronger general sentiment favoring the issues than was shown by the ballots.

Need Is Evident

As was to be expected, the areas most in need of sanitary facilities went overwhelmingly in favor of the two projects. West Roseburg and Huerfano were almost unanimous. Yet the residents of those sections, in addition to the costs borne by all of us, will have the expense of connecting to the new trunk lines.

The vote in those areas, when considered in the light of what residents there must spend, is indicative of the urgent need for the proposed facilities.

I don't know how you feel about it, but I am proud of the showing made in Douglas County in recent months in connection with improvement projects.

Throughout the county we have seen favorable votes for sanitary projects, school expansion, improved water districts, fire protection, and others. Douglas County residents are evidencing a most progressive attitude. It is evident that our people plan to stay in Douglas County, and they want it to be a good environment for themselves and their children.

SALUTE TO RADIO STATION KRNR

Radio Station KRNR will celebrate its 20th anniversary Monday. The station's first full day of broadcasting was Dec. 12, 1915. The first broadcast was heard for a few hours on the afternoon of Dec. 11, but the station's first full-time schedule was presented on the 12th.

Aaron Roe, KRNR commercial manager, has arranged a unique celebration. Listeners will hear programs of the same pattern as those of the first day on the air. Some programs, in fact, will be identical. Sponsors also are arranging some tie-in surprises.

I'm getting a personal "kick" out of the celebration because of the opportunity to return, for one day only, to my old role of "Seven-Thirty Stanton," the only job from which I was ever fired. I was forced out of my morning news broadcast when the station took a commercial network program. The 7:30 a.m. news broadcast Monday will be virtually identical with the one of 20 years ago, using 20-year-old news.

The anniversary program will give listeners an opportunity to compare the programming of 20 years ago with the more interesting and efficient practices of the present.

At the time KRNR went on the air, Roseburg was the smallest city in the nation to have its own radio station. KRNR also was the first, so far as we have been able to learn, to use the vertical tower which was approved by the Federal Communications Commission as an experiment only. KRNR's efficient operation with that type of tower, resulted in similar installations for virtually all subsequent small stations.

The station has performed an important service and made a valuable contribution to its area during the past 20 years. We salute and congratulate KRNR on its anniversary.

France for once has offered a new twist to a nation and a world weary of endless cabinet crises. This time the defeated premier, Edouard Faure, brought the house down with him.

So the lawmakers who did Faure in by voting "no confidence" in his regime find they must stand for re-election this coming Jan. 8.

It seems there's an old law on the books which says that when a cabinet falls twice within 18 months, the National Assembly may be dissolved and new elections ordered. With a show of nerve and perhaps no little spite, Faure invoked it. And for the first time in 78 years, the lawmakers will have to face the voters before their normal terms have expired (next June).

AS USUAL IN French politics, complex personal and political rivalries lay at the root of this latest government collapse. Pierre Mendès-France, Faure's predecessor in office and a member of the same Radical Socialist party, has been working steadily to regain power.

Recognizing this, Faure had proposed to advance the June election by six months, hoping this to force Mendès-France's bid it was generally believed it would take the latter about that long to weld together the Center-Left Coalition he has been building.

In that grouping are some Socialists, others non-communists, and about half the Radical Socialists.

Supporting Faure were most of the other Radical Socialists and va-

nous other party elements to the right of Center.

THE FORCES BEHIND Mendès-France evidently felt they were on pretty sure ground when they took down Faure's regime. But he lost them by digging out the law that had lain in disuse since 1877. Now Faure gets what he wants—an early election.

Whether a newly elected assembly will give him or some other Right-Center leader the chance for a more stable government is anybody's guess. The new election will be held under a 1931 law that favors alliances in the Center at the expense of extremes of Right and Left. But Faure's action has badly split his own party, and it is hard at this stage to measure what sort of alignment may emerge from the January balloting.

Probably it is best to take a cheerful outlook. Government in France could hardly be more unstable, so perhaps it may get better. Hope springs eternal that the French may one day tire of their silly parliamentary merry-go-round and put in lawmakers whose purpose is to govern long and responsibly under far-sighted leadership.
