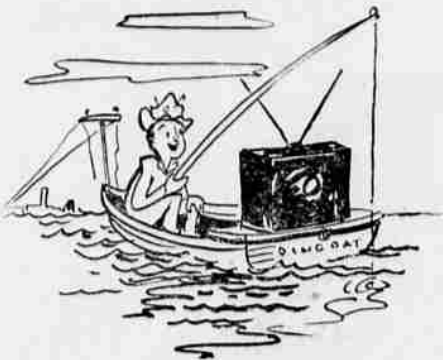
OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — It sounded like a simple assignment

## Christmas Spirit Envelopes Scores Of Oregon Towns

A bright, new Christmas star appeared on the Lane County horizon and Roseburg planned a shopping tour for underprivileged children as the yule spirit enveloped scores of Oregon cities.

Klamath Falls arranged a special hookup as youngsters could telephone Santa Claus and tell him their heart's desires.

Santa, of course, is getting to be the busiest fellow in the country these days and will become even more so as visits are scheduled to hundreds of civic, church and school programs.

At Baker, the County Historical Society made arrangements to have Mrs. Claus accompany him over the Oregon Trail. They'll occupy a trailer house on the city's main street Saturday.

An 18-foot neon star was planted atop Skinner Butte at Eugene beside the Easter Cross, in a new tribute to Christmas.

Welfare units are co-operating for the annual "Operation Christmas Basket" as civic, lodge and

church groups in the Eugene-Springfield area appear to be making their biggest effort to take the holiday spirit into every home in the district.

The Springfield Police Department and the Marine Corps Reserve are collecting and repairing toys to be given to the needy.

A community sing is on tap at Eugene Friday night.

The Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a shopping tour for underprivileged children, and Santa Claus will be available there by telephone, too.

As usual, patients of the Veterans

Hospital will portray a big outdoor nativity scene. Lighting will be emphasized there, including a cross on Mt. Nebo, in West Roseburg.

The Eagles lodge will help Santa distribute toys to the needy.

At Grants Pass, the civic chorus will, add to the Christmas spirit by serenading shut-ins and the high school senior class plans a free Christmas show. High School art students are competing in a contest, painting windows of downtown offices and stores with Christmas scenes. Santa made his annual public visit a week ago.

Fifty children, portraying angels, carolers, wise men and shepherds

will present "Christmas Vignettes" at Pendleton Saturday in a program sponsored by the American Assn. of University Women.

A choir of 16 boys will present background music.

The Toy and Joy Makers of the Portland Fire Department and the Sunshine Division of the Police Department are busy, as usual, gathering toys and food to be delivered to the less fortunate.

One group assisting the Sunshine Division is the Hollywood District Boosters who are erecting a basket 9 feet high, 9 feet wide and 18 feet long, which they hope to fill with donations of food and clothing before Christmas time.

## Britons Oppose Russians' Visit

LONDON (AP) — Britons voted overwhelmingly in a newspaper poll here against their government's entertaining Soviet Premier Bulganin and Communist Party boss Khrushchev.

The two Soviet leaders are scheduled to visit England in April as official guests of the government.

The conservative Daily Sketch reported a poll of its readers showed 69.6 per cent in favor of canceling the invitation Prime Minister Eden extended at the Geneva summit conference last summer.

The paper did not say how many persons answered its questionnaire.

Informants have said the Eden government so far has no intention of calling off the visit despite the Soviet leaders' bitter attacks on Britain during their current Asian tour.

**Lyons, Gath Winners In Turkey Divisions**

McMINNVILLE (AP) — The grand championship in the bronze tom and hen divisions in the Pacific Coast Turkey Exhibit were won here by Lyons Triple B Turkey Farm of Portland.

Gath Bros., Turner, won the championship for live birds other than bronze with their Empire Whites.

## Fourth Bid Lost In Damage Suit

SPOKANE (AP) — Rowland C. Bartlett and Robert J. Price have lost their fourth bid to collect \$1,125,000 in damages from the Dahl family of Elk, Wash., in connection with a uranium site dispute.

Judge Louis F. Bunge said the amended complaint was substantially the same as three previous complaints Bartlett and Price directed against the Dahls.

"There is nothing here but the bare allegation that the plaintiff was damaged in the sum of over one million dollars," the judge said.

Bartlett and Price contended the Dahls agreed to lease them land which later proved to have uranium deposits of commercial quality. Daybreak Mining Co. is operating on the land now.

Bartlett ran for Congress in Portland in 1948. He also was a candidate for mayor in Seattle at one time.

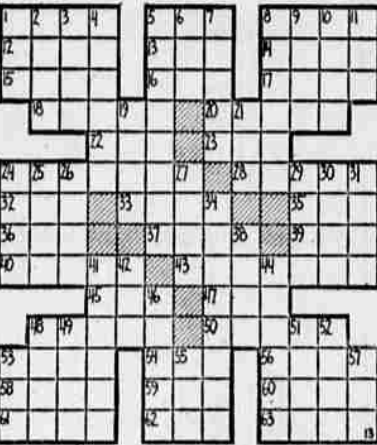
